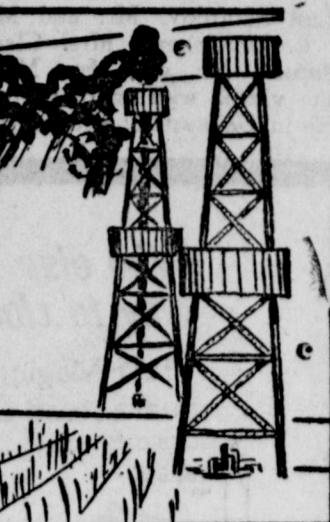

Charles Roby Reported Missing after Plane Explosion in Vietnam

Lt. Col. Charles Roby was listed as missing in action on March 3 in Vietnam. He arrived there on Feb. 28 from Eglin AFB, Fla., and was on his second mission over Vietnam.

The official communication said the plane in which he and another pilot were flying over enemy territory burst into flames and that no parachutes were observed leaving the plane.

Charles is son of Mrs. J. C. Roby. He was graduated from IPHS in 1946. He entered the air force in 1949 and earned his wings in 1950. He was graduated as an electrical engineer from the Air Force Institute of Technology in Dayton, Ohio, and from the Air Force Test Pilot school at Edwards AFB, Calif.

At Eglin AFB he was in charge of the Air Shows Nationwide and just recently directed one in Ft. Worth.

Charles's wife and two daughters, Carolyn 13 and Lisa 10, reside in Fort Worth, Texas.

As Charles flew an F4C jet to Vietnam, he stopped in Honolulu to spend the night with a brother Major James Roby and family.

James intercepted the message that his brother was missing in action in Honolulu and called another brother Col. Harold Roby (Ret.) in San Antonio to go immediately to Iowa Park to be with their mother. He and his family got here at 7:00 a.m. Saturday and broke the news to her before she was officially notified by the Department of Defense in a message relayed by a Sheppard AFB representative.

James called Charles's wife's parents in Ft. Worth and told them to start to Florida at once to be with their daughter.

James arrived in Iowa Park about 1:00 a.m. Sunday. R. A. Williams and son Wayne Williams met him at Love Field, Dallas, and brought him by car to Iowa Park.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Roby and children, Maj. James Roby and their mother, and Sam Ferguson (father of Mrs. Harold Roby), left Iowa Park Tuesday for San Antonio.

From there, the brothers plan to go to Florida to be with Charles's family for a few days.

Mrs. Quentin Roberts of Lancaster, Wyo., has kept in close touch with the family since she was informed that her brother is missing in action.

When Mrs. J. C. Roby left Tuesday she had not received any further message.

'23 Study Club

Keynote of Texas Day program for '23 Study club meeting last Thursday was a history of Iowa Park given by Miss Ethyle Kidwell, principal of the elementary school which bears her name.

Mrs. Sam Hill introduced the speaker. She referred to her as one of the best loved and most popular persons in the area. She has served the local schools as teacher and principal 45 years. Named Citizen of the Year for 1966, she is active in church, civic, club and PTA work.

Miss Kidwell said Iowa Park made a bid for county seat in 1882 and lost the election.

She described the migration to Iowa Park between 1885 and '90. Col. Herman Specht bought land along Red river and formed Specht's Colony. His house was located on the north limits of town on land now owned by J. D. Padgett.

Many persons from Iowa were among the first settlers, and the original plat showed many parks, hence the name "Iowa Park."

The town's first school was a one room building on South Yosemite, constructed in 1889.

Baptist, Presbyterian and Christian churches were organized in 1890 and Methodist in 1899.

Records show that on May 29, 1891, there was a petition for an election to be held to incorporate and on June 27, 74 votes for incorporation were cast.

City Council minutes started in 1892. Iowa Park school district was organized in 1891. The bank was organized in 1900.

Miss Kidwell described the oil boom in 1918 and said that a refinery sold for \$1,000,000 in 1919.

Chamber of commerce was organized in 1921, and that year bonds in amount of \$50,000 were voted for waterworks and sewer system.

In 1924 the Volunteer Fire department was organized; W. F. George high school was built in 1925.

Miss Kidwell touched upon the growth of Iowa Park within the past decade and asked "What kind of history will we make?" She concluded by stating that the town needs the efforts of all ordinary persons, not just important people, and that all citizens should unite in getting things done which are necessary to continued growth.

Preceding the address, Mrs. Carroll Duke presented a meditation which portrayed two aspects of heritage, and she closed with a prayer by Peter Marshall.

Fine arts number featured poems of yesteryear by Mrs. Earle Denny.
