Rest Will Cure Your New Year Vertigo And Headaches

You're probably resolving all over the place these days, taking a backward look in order to see where you've been before looking forward to see where you are going. The division of years is a time to take stock and find out the aim and purposes of your life.

Resolutions mean re-solving, a clearing up of the difficult and complex, putting things in simpler forms.

After the fun of the holiday season there is likely to be a letdown in the spirits as this backward and forward glancing turns itself into re-solving the complexities of life, putting aims and ambitions into understandable terms. And when the holiday season has been too gay, too tense, too strenuous, there are not only mental letdowns but physical signs too that you've been overstretching yourself a bit.

Headaches, dizziness, the shakes and that plumb-tiredness are about the leading physical symptoms of the aftermath of tension. They may be expected after any excess, whether it be eating, drinking, playing or partying.

Headaches may also arise from too much smoking, constipation, fatigue, insomnia, poor ventilation and noise. If the headache is part of the holiday hangover, it is usually a temporary thing easily controlled by rest. But if it is continuous or returns often, a headache should be a warning that you need medical attention.

Headaches across the front of the head may indicate an inflammation in the sinuses or nerve pains. When a headache causes pain on one side of the head, it may be due to eye strain. Headaches that strike the top of the head may be traced to worry, anxiety or emotional conflict of some kind. Some headaches are felt in different places at different times, creating a combination of the pains named, arising from many different causes.

Some headaches pound and hammer, some take the form of a band of pain around the head and some feel like they are splitting the head. It is often significant to your doctor exactly where you feel those pains and the form the pains take.

Different kinds of dizziness have different medical meanings. Stress and change in your regular routine of living may make you feel dizzy or giddy; when you say everything's been a mad whirl, you might be speaking literally.

Dizziness, called vertigo, is not a disease itself, it is considered a symptom of stress or a symptom of disease when it returns to bother you again and again. It may be a feeling of whirling or it may be a feeling of bewildering lightheadedness. In the whirling type of dizziness, whether it's you that whirls or the things you look at that whirl, the source of the disturbance may be in the small canals that control balance associated with the ear or with the nerve connections of these semicircular canals with the brain.

That disturbance may be caused by too much fluid in the body, too much salt in the body, allergies, infections, neuritis or even by tumor of the nerve which connects the organs of balance with the brain.

The light-headed type of dizziness, when it persists, is thought to originate in the higher centers of the brain because of blood pressure disturbances, glandular changes, eye troubles, infections and sometimes even brain concussion.

So like most symptoms of disease, dizziness can be a minor matter or if persistent, it may be an indication of something quite serious.

Tension, excitement, fatigue and exertion can also cause the shakes, the trembling of hands. Even quiet normal people may have tremors at such times, the kind of shakes that start up when you start to do something, go away while you're doing your task, and then return when you relax from your task, such as a task as stretching clear out to take the star down from the very treetop of the Christmas tree or putting the decorations away in that corner where you have to stretch so hard. You can make your fist shake. Clench your fist, arm and shoulder muscles. Your fist shakes. That is a voluntary tremor. It looks exactly like the involuntary tremors, the ones you have no control over.

In addition to fatigue, stress and the other causes mentioned, drugs

and alcoholic beverages can also cause involuntary tremor.

Tremor responds best to rest. If rest and resuming a sensible, non-exerting routine do not restore your control over the shakes, then it is wise to have a medical checkup.

Mental and physical overwork and overplay can also leave you tucked out. Lack of rest, snacking, instead of eating balanced meals, and driving yourself beyond the normal realm of your activities can all lead to fatigue, which has a way of sneaking up on you right after the holidays. Rest in bed or at least as limited physical activity as possible is the first necessity for overcoming fatigue; stimulating drinks such as tea, coffee and cola drinks should either be cut out entirely or else cut down to a minimum.

You can't re-solve your complex pattern of life when you're head-achey, dizzy, shaky or tired out. The year ahead deserves a better outlook than the one you can give it with any of these symptoms. Obviously, your first resolution should be to avoid excesses of any kind; and the other resolutions may have more meaning if you take a good rest first and simplify your aims and purposes after you get rid of your holiday jitters.

Citizenship Contest Offered by WTCC On County Level

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce this week announced a "Fundamentals of Citizenship Contest" aimed at stimulating interest of poll taxes, voting in the primary and general elections and attending at party precinct conventions.

Eligible to enter are local chambers of commerce in the 132-county area served by WTCC and other affiliated organizations. In some smaller communities service clubs serve as chambers of commerce.

The contest opened January 7 and will end November 11. Awards will be made on a county basis in four groups—those of 50,000 or more population; 20 to 50 thousand; 10 to 20 thousand; and less than 10,000.



Youth and Democracy Studied by Lions Club

"Youth Looks at Democracy as a Way of Life" was the subject chosen by Ray Farabee, Wichita Falls high school senior, for his speech to the Lions club of Iowa Park, Tuesday.

Ray was introduced by O. T. Freeman, superintendent of Wichita Falls schools, as winner of many forensic honors and as youth governor of Hi-Y in Texas.

The speaker defined "democracy" by using Abraham Lincoln's words: "Of the people, by the people and for the people." He declared that our form of government should be enshrined in each individual and a living part of that person.

As for the youth of the nation, Ray said they are giving serious consideration to current events—knowing that soon many of them are to face death in fighting for the principles of democracy.

He said that there are three ways in which we as a nation can avoid a world conflict. First by seeking divine guidance and letting it influence our thinking and our course of action. Second, by choosing proper leadership to steer us through the treacherous currents of world mistrust. Third, by unselfish thinking on our part.

Mr. Farabee continued by outlining the problems we Americans face in bringing our own standards up to par, so that we can present a strong, united front to bear upon our enemies. He said the greatest threat to the country is communism, followed immediately by racial and religious prejudices. These prejudices are evident all over the country and must be subdued if the nation is to survive against communism.

The third problem, according to Ray, is lack of interest. The youth of the nation cannot vote, and they look to their parents and other adults to take active parts in attaining the reforms he outlined. If this generation of voters lets the youth down, then the young folk will have a greater task to perform when they arrive of an age to take over the job.

In conclusion, the speaker voiced the opinion that only through conviction, courage, humility and insight can America save democracy as a way of life for the entire world.

Survey Reveals Many Business Changes in Town During 1951

1951 brought about many changes in the business area of Iowa Park. These changes involved new businesses, shifts in businesses and expansion of facilities or remodeling programs.

The Thompson Manufacturing company located at the east edge of town on the Wichita Falls highway, opened for business in November. Fred Thompson is owner of the concern. Home of the company is a new red brick tile with a floor space of 3400 feet. The company is manufacturing an automatic sampling device for sacking samples on dotary rigs. The shop is equipped for all kinds of commercial welding and repairing oldfield equipment. It also has a portable electric welding unit which is used for field service.

The Farmers Supply operated by L. S. Cooksey shifted locations in 1951. The Thompson Manufacturing company now stands on the site formerly occupied by Farmers Supply. Mr. Cooksey built a new shop in the rear of his home at 701 East Railroad. Dimensions of the red brick structure are 24 by 50 feet plus an 18 by 20 feet breezeway. He specializes in electric and acetylene welding and mechanical repairs on farm equipment. Farmers Supply also builds feed troughs, trailers and various other things for use on the farm.

Iowa Park Florists is a new business which is a most valuable asset to Our Town. Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Wilson have already proved almost indispensable because of their effort to please their customers. They fill orders for funeral sprays, bouquets, corsages, and decorate for weddings and parties. They also have a line of decorative accessories for the home and office.

The Carl Sullivan Construction company had its beginning during the past year. Carl has been one of the busiest men in town. Recently he completed work on the new PMA office and redecorated the interior of the Herald office. He is supervising work on the new Methodist parsonage at present.

During 1951 new places of worship were erected by the Church of God, the Assembly of God and the Pentecostal church.

Dr. John L. Steele opened an office for private practice at the Park Clinic hospital January 1, 1951.

Dr. Lowell L. Spruiell started his veterinary clinic at 901 East Bank early in the fall. Before opening the clinic here he had spent 22 months in Mexico where he served as sub-district supervisor of a Mexican-U.S. government project.

Jim Lee took over the old Tower service station at 201 East Railroad several months ago when W. R. Wilcke went out of business. The place is now called Lee's Service Station.

The Drive Inn on the Wichita Falls highway is a new business started last year. It is operated by Mr. and Mrs. W. B. (Doc) Maggart, who moved here from Berger, early in May. Charlie Metz sold his cafe to Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Roling, to devote all his time to selling gas and electric appliances. At first he was located in the Duke building on West Cash. Later he took over the Iowa Park Residence formerly owned by A. L. Reed. Metz Appliance is now located at 107 West Cash.

In January 1951, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. A. Lewis bought the Park Feed Store from Harrell Sullivan, who was called back into the service of his country. The Lewis family has recently moved into a new home at 200 West Texas street.

Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Beall assumed management of the Park hotel, and Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Palmer took over the Helton hotel during the past year.

The Wichita county PMA office was located in Iowa Park late in December.

Another business which changed hands during 1951 was the Osborne grocery and filling station on So. Yosemite. Mr. and Mrs. Chester Alder bought the business from M. Sidney E. Osborne, who left to join her husband in Arabia where he is an engineer for Atlas construction company.



You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 78th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 4th day of February A.D. 1952, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 20th day of December A.D. 1951, in this cause numbered 49743-B on the docket of said court and styled Lowell L. Spruiell and Mary Katherine Spruiell, Plaintiffs, vs. All of those persons first named in this writ and to whom the same is directed, Defendants.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: This is a trespass to try title suit wherein the plaintiffs allege that on or about October 1, 1951, they were and still are the owners in fee simple of Lots 5 and 6 in Block 56 and Lots 5, 6, 7, 15, 16, 17 and 18 in Block 76 of the Original Townsite of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas. That on the day and year aforesaid defendants unlawfully entered upon and dispossessed plaintiffs of such premises and withhold from them the possession thereof to plaintiffs' damage of \$100.00. Plaintiffs further plead the ten year Statute of Limitations, alleging that plaintiffs and those under whom they claim by mesne conveyances and those whose title they hold have had peaceable possession of the property above described, cultivating, using and enjoying the same, paying taxes thereon, for more than ten years preceding the filing of their petition herein, claiming under deed or deeds duly registered purporting to convey such lands and tenements, and that such lands have been actually enclosed for more than ten years by a substantial fence, and that plaintiffs and their predecessors in title have claimed same openly, adversely and notoriously as owners during said period aforesaid.

Wherefore, plaintiffs pray that citation issue and that on final hearing they have judgment for title and possession of said lands, for damages, for costs of suit, and for such other and further relief as they may be entitled to, either in law or in equity.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

1950 FARM CENSUS

According to a preliminary summary report, the number of farms in the U.S. in 1950 was 300,000 less than in 1945 and 500,000 less than in 1950. The average size of farms increased from 174 acres in 1940 to 194.8 acres in 1945 and to 210.5 acres in 1950. The percentages of farms operated by tenants declined from 38.7 in 1940 to 31.7 in 1945 and to 26.7 in 1950. In 1950, 221,000 more farms had telephones, 1,402,000 more farms had electricity and 500,000 more farms had motor trucks and tractors than in 1945. In 1950, 1,444,000 more tractors were on U.S. farms than in 1945.

FILE 1952 CONSERVATION PLAN

1952 Conservation Plans have been mailed to all farms in the county. Many of these have been filled out and returned to this office.

If you have not made out your plan and returned it to this office, you are urged to do so at once. It is necessary that this plan be filed before any conservation work is done under the 1952 program.

If you have lost or misplaced your copy, let us know and we will send another one.

SPRAYING OF MESQUITE

Spraying of mesquite with 2-4-D is not, at present, listed as one of the approved practices for Wichita county. We have been advised that specifications for this practice will be prepared sometime this month. As soon as the practice is ready we will let you have all the details.

BUY BETTER SEED

Under the 1952 program, payment rates on seed will be based on the quality of the seed.

Rates will either be determined on the grade of the seed or the pure live seed content.

Pure live seed content of 100 lbs. of seed is obtained by multiplying the germination by the purity by the number of pounds of seed. For example: 100 lbs. of Buffalo Grass with a germination of 40 per cent, purity 80 per cent, would have 32 lbs. of pure live seed.

If payment rate is based on grade of seed, the grades for Hubam and Madrid Clover are as follows:

Grade	Min.	Germ.	Min.	Purity
No. 1	90	97		
No. 2	85	95		
No. 3	80	95		

Maximum weed seed content is 2 per cent for all grades of seed except grade No. 1—Madrid Clover. Maximum for this grade is 1 per cent.

COTTON ACREAGE REPORT

Wichita county farmers are being asked to file a report on their 1951 cotton acreage. Cards for this purpose are being mailed to all farms in the county.

The importance of filling out the cards and returning them to the county office cannot be stressed too strongly. The reporting of this acreage may mean a great deal to your individual farm and to Wichita county under future cotton allotment and marketing quota programs.

We hope you will give your card immediate consideration and return it as soon as possible.

In the event no cotton was planted on the farm in 1951—please write "No Cotton" across the card and drop it in the mail.

A reliable record of the cotton history for the farm can be obtained by having the 1951 cotton acreage measured.

Measuring of this cotton acreage will be done if requested at the expense of the farmer. The cost is \$3 per farm plus \$1 per plot for each plot over one.

If you want your cotton acreage measured you should contact this office. It might be a pretty good thing to do.

Gordon Turner Flying With 22nd Bomb Wing As Training Unit

For the third time since World War II, the B-29 superfortresses of the 22nd Bomb Wing (Medium) are streaking contrails high across Europe's skies, but this time there is a big difference. There are many recent civilians at the controls.

Although essentially a California outfit stationed at March Air Force Base near Riverside, the 22nd has drawn on flying talent from virtually every state. One of these is Capt. Gordon L. Turner, 26, navigator, from Iowa Park. His wife, Mrs. Marion C. Turner is currently living in Tucson, Ariz.

The 22nd has dozens of "Four Headed Monsters"—men who are qualified as pilot, navigator, bombardier and radio-radar men.

Flying from three airfields in East Anglia the men are squeezing every possible flying hour out of their planes. The flying goes on around the clock with 10 hours being a normal mission. You can cover a lot of Western Europe in 10 hours in a B-29, and the crews are rapidly becoming familiar with the face of Europe.

Every mission has a definite purpose and is carefully planned and co-ordinated. Planes might disperse in small groups in many flight patterns over Europe, and then suddenly rendezvous for a simulated mass raid on Paris or London. Oftentimes they fly in conjunction with RAF bombers, including RAF B-29s which the English call "Washingtons." Coming back into England from Europe, the American bombers can count on being intercepted by RAF jet fighters which are directed by radar. The British are still sharpening up the famed intercept system which won them the Battle of Britain and probably staved off a German invasion of the Isles.

The fields used by the Americans hum with activity, and security is almost on a wartime basis. Super-

ports are widely dispersed, and any time you go near one of them you will be challenged by a guard carrying a loaded shotgun. You've got to have a valid reason for being near a Baker two-niner.

Runways are being extended, and more taxiways are being added. US ack-ack crews man their gun emplacements. Hedge-hopping British jets flash in low on these crews, and keep them constantly on their toes. The fields are so spread out that nearly everyone has a motor scooter, motorcycle or a bike.

Their bailiwick in England is that picture book countryside northeast of London and south of "The Wash." Across the Channel due east lie the Netherlands. The ancient and historic cities of Cambridge, Ely, King's Lynn and Bury St. Edmund provide relaxation for the airmen.

They like the English and the RAF, even to taking up dart, but they are looking forward to rotating to the States soon.

Ashton started with the railroad in 1936 as assistant advertising agent. Previously he was an editorial writer for the Mobile (Ala.) Register, night city editor of the Milwaukee (Wisc.) Sentinel, and reporter for the San Francisco (Calif.) Examiner.



Overbey to Display Fair Catalog in Dallas

Receiving praise as "an outstanding publication," the 1951 Texas-Oklahoma Fair Catalog will be featured in a display of such books at the 1952 convention of Texas Associations of Fairs and Expositions in Dallas early next month.

In a letter to Ted Overbey, T-O Fair manager, Program Chairman Tommie Randolph of Gladewater singled out the local book for attention and asked Mr. Overbey to make up a display of catalogs and fair publications for the Dallas meeting.

Ted has collected a large group of catalogs and printed matter used in 1951 and earlier years by members of the Texas Fair association, and is compiling information concerning them for use in the display, and a paper entitled "The Promotional Possibilities of Fair Publications."

The 1952 version of the T-O Fair Catalog is now underway, according to Mr. Overbey, and will be distributed earlier this year. Features of the 1951 book which received approval will be used again, he said, although some of the ideas used in the earlier book will be dropped to provide Fair exhibitors with more premium information and data about the 1952 show.

Also currently receiving attention is the entire program of work for the 1952 Fair, with department chairmen being appointed and plans made for each phase of the Fair. Mr. Overbey said. Recent trips to points in Southwest Oklahoma indicate interest is already being shown, he said, in most divisions of the Fair. County agents and vocational agriculture instructors in both Texas and Oklahoma are now making plans to attend in large numbers, Ted said, and the Fair's junior livestock department is shaping up as the largest ever seen in this area.

The 1952 Texas-Oklahoma Fair is scheduled for September 22 thru 27. Printing of the 1951 catalog was done by the Iowa Park Herald.
