Many local friends also attended during the afternoon.

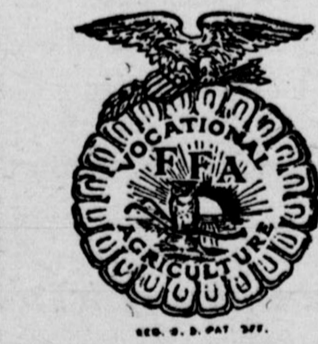

First Wheat to Earn Bonus

Starting Wednesday, area farmers will have access to a brand new business in Iowa Park. E. C. Holder is completing his scales and tanks and pits this weekend so he can handle any grain available.

The new business is located at 401 South Jackson, just three blocks south of Herman's Panhandle Station. A new Fairbanks-Morse 100,000 lb. capacity scale has been installed, along with a large pit and hydraulic lift to give area farmers better and faster service with their grain handling.

When the first load of wheat comes to the new elevator, a bonus of \$100 plus has been donated by local merchants, and a grand opening celebration has been planned with the arrival.

Requirements for the bonus are: the wheat must be Wichita county grown, not more than 14% moisture and must be a load of at least 50 bushels, and must be new wheat, penalty free.

Mr. Perry D. Cox, 80, of Lower Charlie Road community near Wichita Falls, and father of Mrs. Frank Rauscher of Iowa Park, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Monday morning, May 19, after a year of illness.

Water Bonds Paid for 1978-80

Property owners in Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 (which is the city limits of Iowa Park) were saved \$18,610.42 by the water board this week. The way it was done is quite simple, according to Dr. C. J. Simpson, president, and long time member.

Through the past several years the board has managed the water district finances so that money was available to pay off the final three years of bonds in one lump payment. Bonds due in 1978 and 1979 and 1980, totaling \$25,000, were paid in full, with interest, with a payment of \$26,114.58.

Had the bonds been left unpaid until maturity, they would have cost \$19,725.00 in interest. By making payment now, the interest was only \$1,114.58.

ORDINANCE NO. 248

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that the following rules and regulations shall govern the operation and parking of automobiles and other vehicles on the streets of said City of Iowa Park, to-wit:

1. All provisions of the Penal Code of the State of Texas relative to the operation of vehicles, motor or otherwise, upon the public highways of the State are hereby adopted as a part of this ordinance.

2. No vehicle shall be parked nearer than ten feet to a fire plug.
3. No vehicle shall be parked nearer than ten feet to the corner of any sidewalk.

4. No vehicle shall turn on any street except at intersections of streets.

5. No vehicle shall cross from one side of the street to the opposite side except by going to the intersection of the streets and then turning to make such crossing.

6. All vehicles parked on Bank Street from Jackson Street to Bond Street; on West Park Avenue from Jackson Street to Bond Street; on Cash Avenue from Yosemite Street to Bond Street; on Jackson Street, Yosemite Street and Wall Street, respectively, from the Burlington Railroad Tracks to Bank Street; and on Bond Street from Cash Street to Bank Street, shall be parked at an angle of 45 degrees with the curb-line with right front wheel against the curb.

7. No vehicle shall be permitted to stand parallel to the curb with another vehicle between it and such curb, except that vehicles may stop to unload passengers or merchandise as quickly as possible. In no event shall a passenger vehicle stand double parked for more than five minutes; or without a driver at the wheel or in the vehicle.

8. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

Legumes

Landowners and operators who planted winter legumes last fall have had excellent results this spring.
Albert Finkler of the Bowman-Huff community had 28 acres of Austrian winter peas that was planted around the first of October and fertilized with 100 lb. of 0-45-0 per acre at time of planting. During the first week of November, 28 yearlings and 2 cows were turned into this field. It was continuously grazed for 95 days except for a few days when the soil was too wet. During the grazing period only a small amount of dry hay was fed to prevent scouring. The yearlings made an average gain of 100 pounds each during the 95 days of grazing.
On May 9, Finkler worked the peas into the soil surface. A representative sample was taken from the field at that time by the Archer City Soil Conservation Service technicians. They found the top growth to be over 20,000 pounds of green material per acre. What crop can beat this for grazing and soil building?

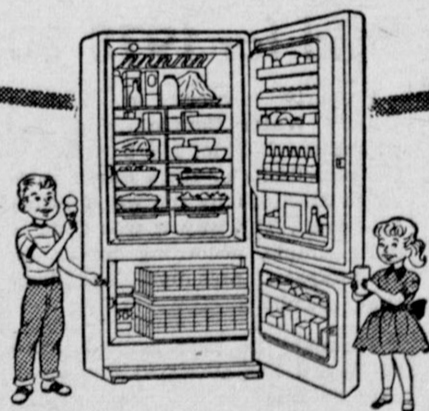

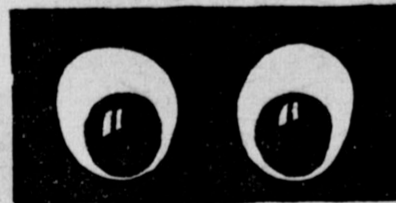

Connell Aspires to Become State Lawmaker

Jack Connell Jr., a law major at Texas university, announces he is a candidate for State Representative in District 81, Place 2, subject to the Democratic primary of July 26. The district embraces Wichita county. Connell is seeking the legislative post presently held by J. B. Walling.

A native of Wichita Falls, Connell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Connell of Wichita Falls.

After graduating from Wichita Falls high school, Connell enrolled in the University of Texas.

He is married to the former Miss Nancy Breedlove of Midland. They maintain their permanent residence in Wichita Falls.

Connell is a member of First Baptist church of Wichita Falls.

Driver Enters Judge Race

A Wichita Falls attorney, Temple Driver, has announced he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for County Judge.

Driver, who has practiced law for five years, is a former City Prosecutor of Wichita Falls. He is opposed by the incumbent County Judge, Guy McNeely.

Driver is 34 and moved to Wichita Falls in 1935. He was born in Benjamin, Knox county, Texas. His father is J. J. Driver, Justice of the Peace in Benjamin. His mother is Charlotte Dickson Driver, a native of Seymour in Baylor county, and a former Wichita Falls resident who now lives in Houston.

Driver said, "I am campaigning on the basis of my personal qualifications. I believe that my business and legal education and experience qualify me for the administrative and judicial duties of this office."

Driver is a 1941 graduate of Wichita Falls high school. He attended Midwestern university while working as a newspaper route carrier in the Kamay-Valley View area. He worked as an accountant for the Panhandle Oil company before going into the navy.

Driver served 3½ years in the navy in World War II, entering as an apprentice seaman in San Diego, Calif., Boot Camp, and he was later commissioned as a Supply Corps officer. He is now a lieutenant in the naval reserve unit in Wichita Falls.

Driver received a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1947, at the University of California at Los Angeles. He worked for three years as reporter and sports editor of the Laredo Times before going to law school. He graduated from the University of Texas law school in 1953 and returned to Wichita Falls to begin his law practice.

Driver was formerly associated with the late Judge John Daventport and Henry J. Anderson, Jr. He has been associated in law practice with Stayton Montgomery Bonner the past two years.

Driver is a director of the State Junior Bar association for the 13th Congressional district, and he is chairman of its state speaker's bureau. He was treasurer of the Wichita County Bar association in 1956.

He is a former Jaycee director and has been chairman of the Junior Tennis tournament in Wichita County district for the last five years. He is also a director of the University Kiwanis club. He is a former Eagle Scout and assistant scoutmaster.

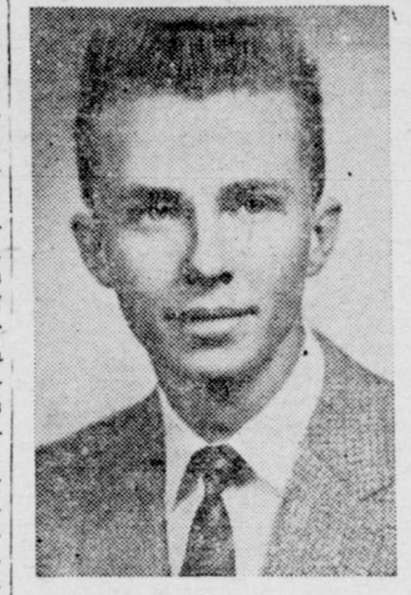
Temple Driver is active in the church, is a Sunday School teacher, and was formerly president of the men's group of First Presbyterian church of Wichita Falls.

During summer vacations Connell has worked in the oilfields as a roustabout.

If elected, Connell said he would continue his education except during sessions of the Legislature, and he would advocate and support legislation to carry out the program sponsored by the Hale-Aiken committee on educational progress.

Believing that the principal use of a free government is to direct the united strength of the people in the best effectual manner to protect it against those who seek to profit unjustly from it, Connell said he will oppose, seek out and expose corrupt practices in public office, supporting a tighter code of ethics for governmental officials, and will honestly represent the best interest of all the people of his district.

Connell stated that he will advocate incentive legislation to promote student interest in scientific courses in high schools and colleges. He will back legislation for increased benefits to old-age pensioners, disabled and incapacitated persons nearing retirement age, and will support measures continuing the state program of construction and improvement of farm-to-market roads.

Connell said he will endorse legislation favoring state agricultural and mechanical colleges, and a broadened program for vocational agriculture and home economics courses in high schools and colleges. He will back increased agricultural extension and research facilities.

Other planks in his platform are support of legislation to benefit farmers and soil conservation districts and the increased establishment of farm marketing co-operatives, legislation for the benefit of the public interest in the development of the water resources of his district and the state, and other legislation that would be in the public interest.

Connell favors, and advises that he will insist upon, advocate and support, laws and other steps in connection with the civil defense of Texas citizens.

Believing that the highest political distinction should have no attraction for a man unless it is the unsought reward for personal worth, character, mental ability and a blameless record, and that such political distinction obtained in any other way is a disgrace to the man who holds it, Connell advises that he will make this race, running upon his own merits.

Connell advised that he would try to contact every resident of his Legislative District before the July primary.

McNeely Asks for Re-election

A campaign based on his record will be conducted by County Judge Guy McNeely, who announced formally last week for re-election.

The incumbent will be opposed by Temple Driver in the Democratic primary July 26.

Judge McNeely has served nearly 11 years as county judge. He held the office in 1941-44. Commissioners court appointed him to the post Sept. 13, 1951, when Arthur Tipps resigned to accept appointment as judge of 30th District Court.

Judge McNeely has occupied the office continuously since his selection. Without opposition he was elected to a two-year term in 1952 and a four-year span in 1954. He seeks another four-year stretch.

Judge McNeely said Saturday: "The office of county judge is both judicial and administrative. "It is judicial in that your-county judge sits in judgment upon one of his fellow citizens when such citizen is charged with the commission of a misdemeanor offense, and also in the appointment of guardians and administrators. "The office is administrative in that the county judge is, under the law, chairman of your commissioners court to which the business of the county is entrusted."

Judge McNeely said: "In performing the duties of county judge it has always been my policy to render equal justice to all and special privilege to none. "I believe I have kept faith with the people and have conducted the office of county judge as they would want it conducted. "If the people of this county feel that I have done so, I would appreciate their vote and support for my re-election to the office."

A native of Bonham, Tex., and a Wichitan since 1919, Judge McNeely and his wife, Ruby, live at 1628 Wilson. He is 56.

Judge McNeely was assistant district attorney in 1945-46 and city attorney in 1949-50. He resigned the city post to run for county judge.

Judge McNeely is a trustee of the Grand Lodge of Texas, Independent Order of Odd Fellows; secretary of Pioneer Lodge 49, Knights of Pythias, and a member of the University Methodist church.
