FIREWORKS ORDINANCE

NUMBER 39 (239) An ordinance relative to the sale or explosion of fireworks within the City Limits; and providing a penalty for such offense. Be it ordained by the City

Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

That it shall be unlawful for cluding firecrackers, torpedoes, rockets, roman candles, and any other types of explosives commonly used for such purposes, within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

Any person, firm, or corporation guilty of violating any provision of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1.00 and not exceeding \$100.00 for each separate offense. Passed and approved on this






