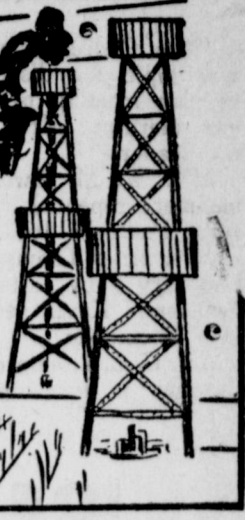

## Beverly Birk Reports to Church on Mexican Tour by Youth Group

Beverly, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Birk, was in charge of the Sunday night worship service of the Presbyterian church recently and showed slides and described a recent trip to Mexico.

Miss Birk was one of 27 young people who with seven sponsors made up the 4th Presbyterian caravan to Mexico sponsored by the central Texas presbytery last summer. The trip is made alternate years and young people who have just been graduated from high school or who are seniors are allowed to make the trip.

The group met in Waco and travel to Laredo in cars; there they boarded a bus that had come from Mexico to get them.

Before leaving Texas they visited the Presbyterian Pan-American school in Kingsville. The school is for high school students and its purpose is to train for church leadership for all the Americas. Students come from the U.S., Mexico, Guatemala and Cuba.

First stop was at Monterrey, where the travelers were special guests of young people of El Buen Pastor Presbyterian church, which is national Presbyterian church of Mexico. On a sight-seeing trip they went through the Garcia caverns and rode a funicular train up the side of the mountain to the entrance of the caverns. Beverly learned the trip is a project of Lions clubs of Mexico.

From Monterrey the group went to San Luis Potosi. Enroute to Mexico City the caravan stopped at Zitacuaro and met Benjamin Alvarez, pastor of the Presbyterian church there. He is moderator of the Mexican general assembly.

In Mexico City they were guests of Pricipe de Paz Presbyterian church, the largest in the nation. They attended a worship service. Though the service was in Spanish, tunes of the hymns were familiar for the most part. They noticed that each person brings his own hymn book to church, and offerings are gathered in velvet bags.

In Mexico City they visited Chapultepec Park, National Cathedral and National Palace, where Maximilian, the French ruler, lived for awhile. They also went to the Mexican Folklore Center and witnessed the history of Mexico in dances; and the Palace of Fine Arts, which has sunk two stories since it was built.

Next stop was Morelia, where they went through the Sanatoria la Luz, Presbyterian hospital. An accredited school of nursing is conducted here.

Beverly is an IPHS senior. She belongs to the Spanish and German clubs, National Honor Society, National Thespian Society, pep squad, and is assistant librarian. She is secretary of UCYM and is vice-president of the senior high fellowship of the local Presbyterian, and is a member of the choir.

Miss Birk had study piano with Mrs. James A. Sewell 11 years.

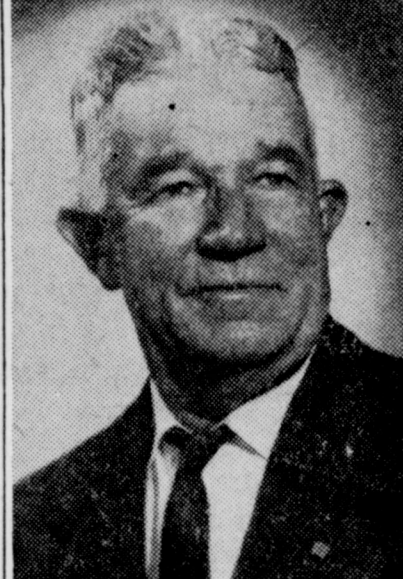
The certificate was signed by Col. Norman J. Cranford, commander.

## Hawks Clip Eagles 50 to 6; Get Set for District Play at Seymour

Surprising Iowa Park pulled a 55-yard pass on the first play of the game last Friday, and the Holiday Eagles never recovered enough field position to halt the high flying Hawks.

They did stop the Hawks' first offensive drive when a 4th down pass failed. The Eagles found running tough against the big Green and White line, and were forced to punt.

Billy Jackson put them right back in the hole with a punt return to the Red and White 25.

Robert Dawson then passed 23 yards to Jackson, and Terry May forced through left guard to produce the first 6 points.

Holliday made 8 yards on two running tries and then lost 14 trying to pass. Again came Jackson. He took Patsky's punt on his own 40, faked to Thompson and twisted and turned to the Eagle 20. Five plays netted a TD with Larry Thompson carrying for the final one yard.

The Eagles managed first down before they kicked again. Dawson tossed a good 16-yard pass. Fullback May rambled 17. Two plays netted 10 more, then Dawson hit End Ronnie Berry for 20 yards and the 3rd TD.

May cracked the line for two points.

Thompson stole an Eagle pass and returned to their 20. Jackson got 6 yards and then another Dawson pass hit Berry for the payoff.

May again added the 2 points. The half ended with Hawks 28, and the Eagles had crossed the 50-yard stripe only once.

Holliday stalled again and had to kick. Dawson faked a pass and May cracked 54 yards through the surprised visitors. Dawson kicked the PAT and the Hawks had a comfortable 35 point lead.

Coach Watkins gave his starters a rest, and Holliday took advantage with a 44 yard run by Freddie Crampton.

Before the final whistle, May had added another 6 pointer with Dawson again kicking true. Dennis Hill showed his potential when he made 41 yards in two running plays. Mike Brookman added 6 points with a 21-yard end run. Then Drew Sawyer ran the conversion to make the final score 50 to 6.

This Friday the Hawks open their district title campaign at Seymour. Let's all go to Baylor county and cheer our boys on to victory!

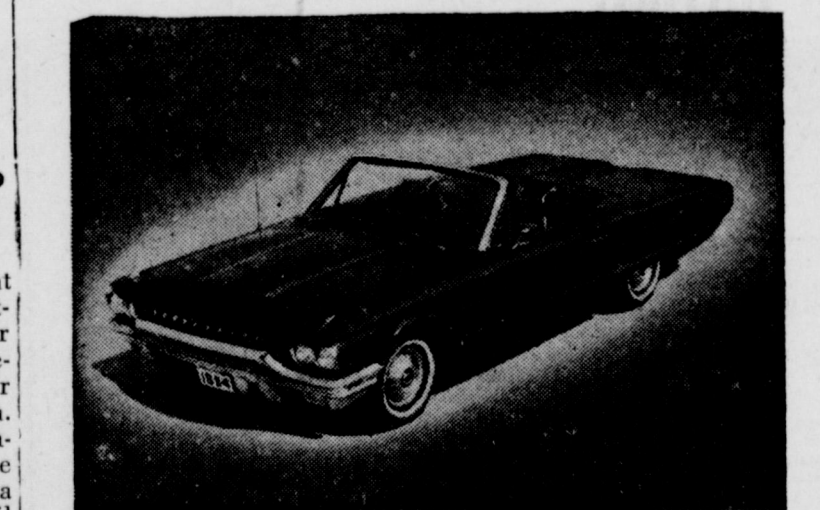
