

## Roy Kimberlain Dies Suddenly

Roy Kimberlain, 606 N. Wall,  
died unexpectedly Friday night.  
He suffered an apparent heart at-  
tack at his home about 9:00 p.m.  
and was taken to a Wichita Falls  
hospital, where he died a short  
time later.

A well known and loved citizen  
of the area, Roy was born Nov.  
15, 1925, in Pikeville, Ky. He was  
in the air force during World War  
Two and was stationed at Shep-  
pard Field for a while. During that  
time he met Miss Nell Reaves and  
they were married Dec. 19, 1943.  
He later served in the Burma  
theater of operations.

Following his discharge, Roy  
was associated with his late father-  
in-law Claud Reaves in the gro-  
cery business for several years.  
He later owned and operated a  
filling station.

At time of death Kimberlain  
owned several coinomatic laun-  
dries in Wichita Falls area.

He was a Bible class teacher in  
Iowa Park Church of Christ and  
former member of the Volunteer  
Fire department.

Funeral service was conducted  
Monday afternoon in the church  
by Boyd Taylor, minister. Burial  
was in Highland cemetery under  
direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

Surviving are the widow; a son  
Royce and a daughter Mrs. Dicky  
Findley; his mother Mrs. Anne  
Kimberlain and sister Mrs. Foster  
Meade, both of Pikeville; and a  
brother Hoyt of Dayton, Ohio.




