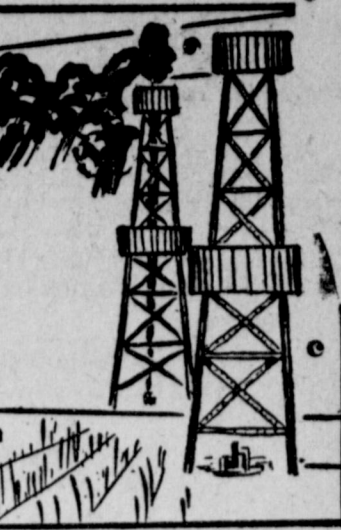

Hawks Lose 8-26

Several hundred Iowa Park fans saw the Hawks eliminated last Thursday afternoon from further state honors, and every one of them came home praising their never-say-die attitude.

Denver City Mustangs showed early in the game that they had the speed, strength, and team coordination to play a great brand of football. They jumped into an early lead and fought Iowa Park for every yard of turf, on the offensive and defensive alike.

And still the Hawks bored in, holding their own in heroic fashion, gambling when the situation called for taking chances. Some paid off, but the big one slipped away.

With about 6 minutes left in the game, trailing by 8-13, and facing 4th down and 5 to go, the Hawks called time out. After the short strategy meeting, they lined up for a running or passing play and put the ball in motion. The Mustangs solved the play and held the Hawks on their own 36.

From there on, the Hawks had had it, and never again were they in position to get the go-ahead position.

With the Hawks in final submission, Denver City was able to punch across two touchdowns and add 1 PAT, making the final score 26-8.

Statistics of the game show the Hawks put up a great fight. Much of the rushing yardage piled up by Denver City came in the final moments when they drove 69 yards in 11 plays after Iowa Park had definitely been eliminated.

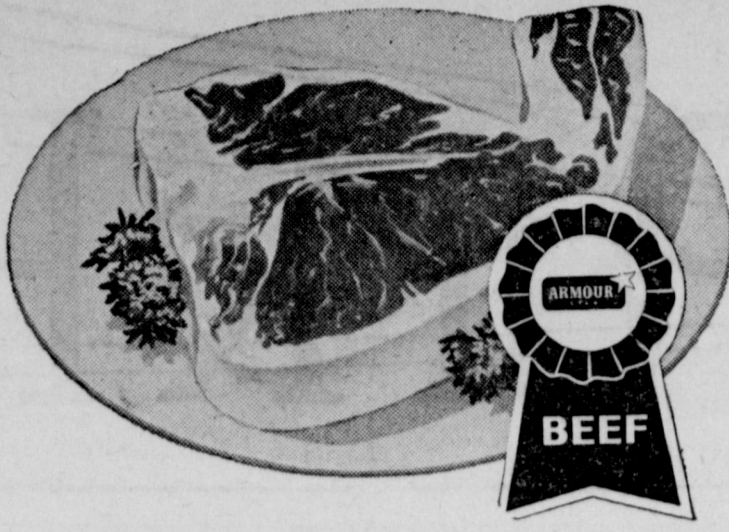

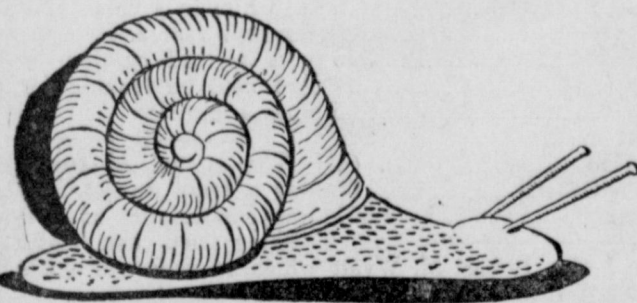
