Safety award: 1. Conform to the speed of general traffic. This practice minimizes costly "stop and go" driving and eliminates the need

for others to pass or cut in ahead of you. 2. If you're going to stay on the same street for some distance, pick the least obstructed lane and stay in it. Always signal - and look — before changing lanes. When preparing to turn, move into the appropriate lane well in advance, and signal your turn. advance, and signal your turn.
3. Always slow down at intersections; your view may be obstructed. And when you stop at an intersection, be sure not to block the pedestrian crosswalk.
4. Never double-park; you'll block traffic, or worse, force other deivers to take danger.



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
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


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
