T-O Fair Adds Twirling Contests

Bonnie Baxter, well known twirling authority, teacher and judge, has announced the addition of a twirling contest to the 1958 Texas-Oklahoma Fair at Iowa Park.

Twirlers from the second grade through high school are eligible to compete, and affiliation with a band is not required.

The Juvenile division will be for twirlers from 2nd through 6th grades. Twirlers from the 7th, 8th and 9th grades will be in the Junior division.

Senior division will be for twirlers in the 10th, 11th and 12th grades.

Certificates will be given to winners in the Juvenile division, and trophies will be presented the first four places in the Junior and Senior divisions. Entries must be completed before June 25.

Wheat Harvest

The first load of 1958 wheat with no penalty requirements was delivered to E. C. Holder Grain company last Friday, May 30.

D. O. James, who farms one-half mile south of town, cut the load from part of a dryland 50-acre field. The 55-bushel load tested 14 per cent moisture content and weighed 60 pounds to the bushel.

B. J. Mills delivered the first load to the Farmers Union Co-op last Saturday. His wheat also was tested 60 pounds to the bushel.

Wheat this year is exceptionally good and producing 12 to 15 bushels per acre on the average. Some farmers are reporting as high as 35 to 44 bushels an acre in spots.

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 78th District Court of Wichita County, at the Courthouse thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, by filing a written answer at or before 10 o'clock, A.M. on the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 7th day of July A.D. 1958, to Plaintiff's Petition filed in said court, on the 19th day of May A.D. 1958, in this cause, numbered 61,416-B on the docket of said court and styled G. C. Hodges and wife Daphna Hodges, and A. R. Hodges and Wife Thelma Hodges, Plaintiffs, vs. L. W. Frisbie, M. E. Frisbie, W. A. McCutchen, C. C. Drake, A. N. Harris, and their unknown heirs, devisees, legatees and/or assigns, Defendants.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: This is a trespass to try title suit wherein plaintiffs allege that on May 1, 1958, they were the owners in fee simple of all that certain lot, tract or parcel of land situated in Wichita County, Texas, and described as follows:

Lots 5, 6, 7, and 8, Block 119, Original Townsite of Iowa Park, Wichita County Texas

that on said date the defendants herein unlawfully entered upon, and dispossessed them of such premises and withhold from them the possession thereof, Plaintiffs would show to the Court that they have made demand of the defendants for possession, and that they have failed and refused to give these plaintiffs possession, to plaintiffs' damage. Plaintiffs further allege that they and those under whom they claim by mesne conveyances, and those whose title plaintiffs hold, have had peaceable and adverse possession of the lands and tenements described above, cultivating, using and enjoying the same for more than ten years preceding the filing of this petition, during which time such lands and tenements have been actually enclosed by fence, and plaintiffs and their predecessors in title, have claimed same openly, adversely and notoriously and peacefully as owners during such ten year period.

Wherefore, premises considered, plaintiffs pray that the defendants

be cited to answer this petition and that plaintiffs have judgment for title and possession of the above described premises, for their damages, for costs of suit, and for such other and further relief as they may be entitled to either in law or in equity.

As is more fully shown by Plaintiffs' Petition on file in this suit. If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

Miles Thompson and Sgt. Workman appeared before the Lions club Tuesday noon to emphasize the importance of civil defense and especially of the Ground Observation Corps.

Workman announced Thompson is serving as chairman for the Iowa Park unit of this important link in civil defense.

The plane spotter station now is located at the old city lake, and volunteers, mostly explorer scouts, will man the station when alerts are sounded.

Child Safety Arouses Women

WHEN CHILD SAFETY becomes an issue, women go to work. Take the case of Janelle Brimball of Provo, Utah. Hoping to make neighborhood youngsters more safety-conscious, she taught bicycle ordinances to a small group of children, coached them in proper signaling and handling of their bikes.

Soon more requests than she could handle poured in from other sections of town and Janelle's program was taken over by the Police Dept., PTA, Board of Education and the City Recreation Committee.

To climax the program, the mayor proclaimed an "All Bellaire Safety Day", and most citizens attended neighborhood safety meetings.

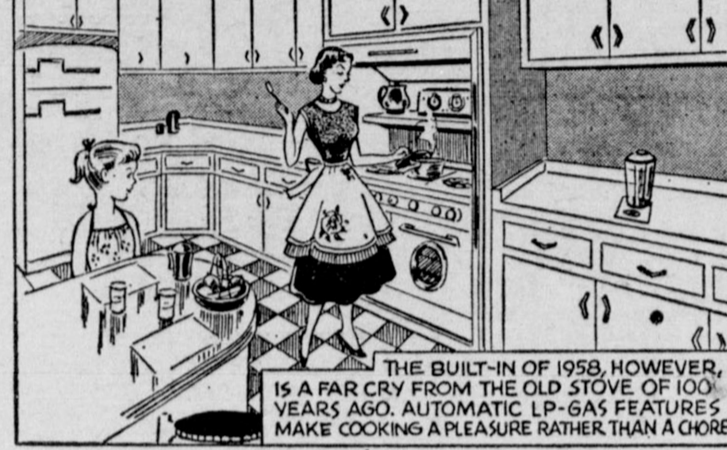

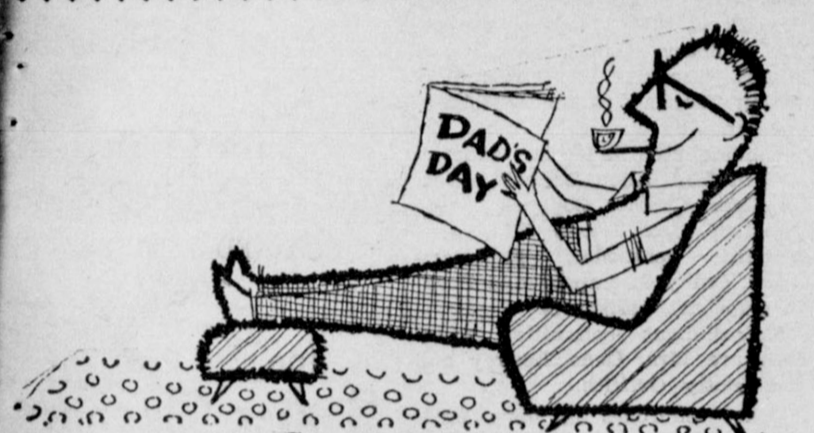

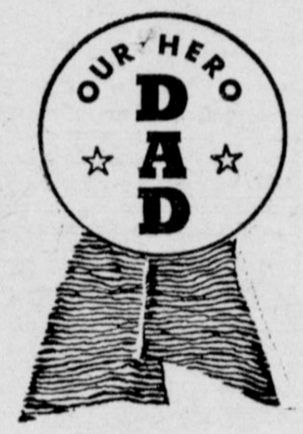

Driving In City Traffic

By Jeanne Smith, Dodge Safety Consultant

CITY TRAFFIC is the driver's acid test.

Bristling with problems of every kind, the average city mile requires as many driving decisions as many miles of country motoring.

Here are some suggestions for city driving from John J. Hall, safety education expert and winner of the 1957 American Museum of Safety award:

1. Conform to the speed of general traffic. This practice minimizes costly "stop and go" driving and eliminates the need for others to pass or cut in ahead of you.
2. If you're going to stay on the same street for some distance, pick the least obstructed lane and stay in it. Always signal — and look — before changing lanes. When preparing to turn, move into the appropriate lane well in advance, and signal your turn.
3. Always slow down at intersections; your view may be obstructed. And when you stop at an intersection, be sure not to block the pedestrian crosswalk.
4. Never double-park; you'll block traffic, or worse, force other drivers to take dangerous chances. When leaving your parked car, always use the door on the curb side. And when you're driving alongside a line of parked cars, watch for the telltale opening door on the street side — it may be the sign of an accident in the making.
5. Always be alert for pedestrians — a special city-driving hazard. Don't expect them to understand your driving problems.
6. Slow down and be especially alert whenever you see children afoot or on bicycle.
