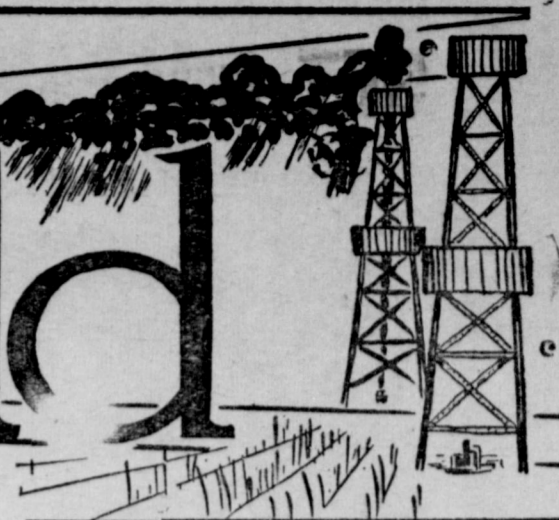

Borger Youth Center Offered as Headquarters for Iowa Park Fans

Iowa Park students who follow their football team to Borger for the battle on Nov. 20 between the Hawks and the Phillips Blackhawks have been invited to use facilities of and to participate in activities at Borger's Youth Center, located only a stone's throw from the gate to the stadium where the two giants of Class AA will go to war that night.

Mrs. Nola Jackson and the teenage board of governors have issued an invitation for folk from Iowa Park to use the Center as resting place prior to the game.

Mrs. Jackson said the Center will be opened about 1:30 and will close in time for the game. Then it will be re-opened for a Center-sponsored dance immediately after the contest.

The Nomads, a favorite band among younger residents of the Panhandle North-Plains, has been employed to provide music.

Dance admission will be \$1. Should the football teams decide to remain, members will be admitted to the dance if accompanied and identified by their team coaches.

Parents of Iowa Park students are invited to use the Center's facilities and are invited to join the adult sponsors for the dance.

Our New Garbage Ordinance

State of Texas, County of Wichita, City of Iowa Park:

ORDINANCE NO. 305
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, in regular session assembled on this the 26th day of October, A.D. 1964, with all members of the Council being present, with the mayor:

1. This ordinance shall be known as the "garbage ordinance" of the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

2. The term "premises" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theaters, hotels, restaurants, cafes, catina houses, tourist camps, apartments, sanitariums, rooming houses, schools, private residences, vacant lots, and other places within the city limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, where refuse, either garbage or rubbish, accumulates.

3. The term "refuse" shall be interpreted to mean all wastes including garbage and rubbish.

4. The term "garbage" as used in this ordinance shall mean all putrescible wastes, except sewage and body wastes, including all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, and carcasses of small dead animals and dead fowls from any premises within the city limits.

5. The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean tin cans, bottles, papers, tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding 3 feet), papers, etc., from any premises within the city limits.

6. "City Health Officer" as used herein shall mean the City Health Officer of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, or his authorized agent.

7. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where garbage or rubbish accumulates, to provide, and at all times to maintain in good order and repair on any said premises, a portable container or containers, for refuse, which shall be made of galvanized metal not easily corroded, rodent and fly proof, with a tight-fitting lid which shall not be removed except when depositing or removing the contents of the receptacle, and with handles on the sides, and of sufficient capacity and in sufficient numbers to accommodate and securely keep all the garbage and rubbish that may be accumulated between collection; provided, that each such container shall have a capacity of not less than twenty gallons nor more than thirty-two gallons. Provided further all containers shall be kept clean and free from accumulation of any substance remaining attached to inside of container which would attract or breed flies, mosquitoes or any other insect.

8. It shall be the duty of every person, firm, or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place the daily accumulations of garbage and rubbish in the container or containers required in Section 2, Item 1, and it shall be the duty of every person placing garbage in any such

Hawks Win Right to Play Phillips in Bi-district with 35-0 over Tigers

Iowa Park clinched a chance for bi-district play-off with Phillips last Friday night by running and passing over Electra, 35-0.

Hawks made 22 first downs and limited Tigers to 7.

Electra gained 19 yards rushing while Iowa Park amassed 279.

Eight completed passes accounted for 128 yards gained by the Hawks; 83 yards were earned by the Tigers on 6 completions.

First half play was a beauty to behold as the Hawks punched out 21 yards and never lost the ball by punt or failure to make first downs. It was marred by one fumble deep in Electra territory.

Electra managed only 31 yards total during the first half.

Hawks made two long passes pay off in the second half, one for 24 yards and another for 58.

Iowa Park plays at Childress this Friday at 7:30 p.m. to wind up the most successful season in history. Only a loss to Childress and win by Quanah can force Iowa Park to share the district title with that school.

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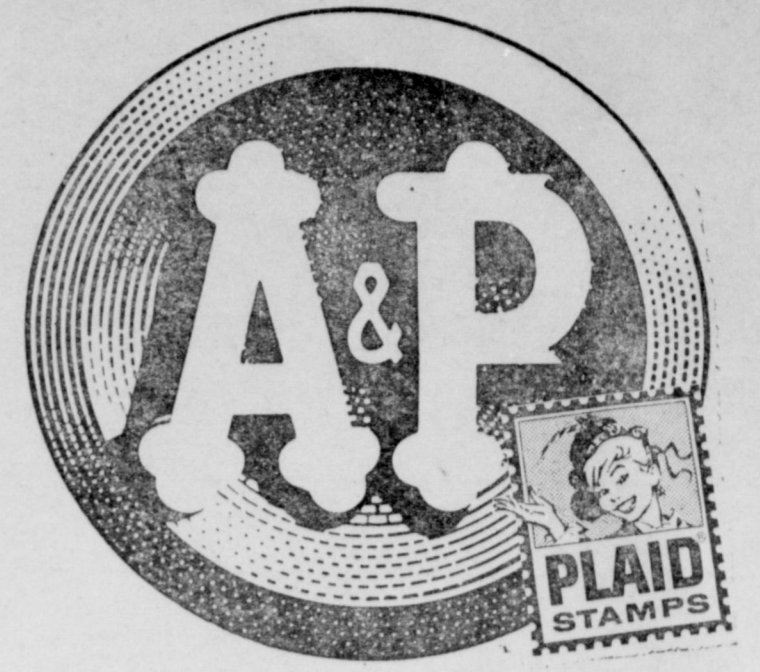

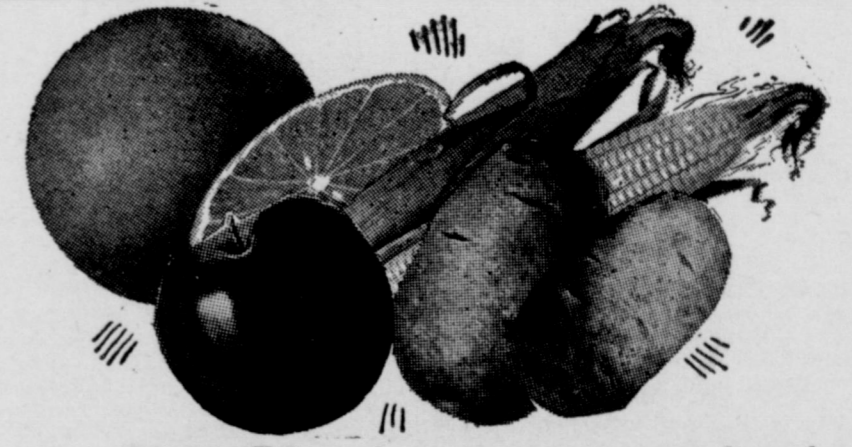

Burial of G. Washington Told in Old Paper at Lees'

Mr. and Mrs. Jim Lee, owners of Jim and Mae's New and Used Furniture store at 104 W. Cash street, have in their possession a newspaper dated January 4, 1800.

Some of the stories are dated September, October, November & December 1799.

The Lees traded some merchandise for the paper a few weeks ago. They do not know for certain the newspaper is an original copy, but even if it is reproduction, the reading is most interesting and intriguing.

It is also somewhat difficult to read because in most instances small "f" is used to represent small "s."

Banner of the paper is "Ulster County Gazette, Saturday, January 4, 1800, published at Kingston (Ulster County) by Samuel Freer & Son."

One of the most interesting stories is the entombment of George Washington at George Town, Dec. 20, 1799, which reads:

On Wednesday last, the mortal part of Washington, the Great—the Father of his Country and the Friend of man, was consigned to the tomb, with solemn honours and funeral pomp.

A multitude of persons assembled from many miles around at Mount Vernon, the choice abode and last residence of the illustrious chief. There were the groves—the spacious avenues, the beautiful and sublime scenes, the noble mansion—but alas, the august inhabitant was now no more. That great soul was gone. His mortal part was there indeed; but ah; how affecting, how awful the spectacle of such worth and greatness thus to mortal eyes, fallen: Yes, fallen, fallen.

There was much more, but we will hurry on to other items of interest.

The paper contains a reply of President John Adams to the reply of the American Congress to the President's address at the opening of the session. Part of his words were:

As long as we can maintain with harmony and affection the honor of our country consistently with its peace, externally and internally, while that is attainable, or in war. When that becomes necessary asserts its real independence and sovereignty, and sup-

port the constitutional energies and dignity of the government—we may be perfectly sure under the smiles of Divine Providence, that we shall effectually promote and attend our national interests and happiness.

Any person inclined to purchase may know the particulars by applying to John Schoonmaker, Jun, at Rochester.

Strayed—A red Bull branded on both horns P.T.B. Any person having taken up said bull will be thanked by giving information thereof to the printers.

Second Notice—Of my wife, Hannah, is hereby given, forbidding all persons whatever from harboring or keeping her, and from trusting her on my account, as I am determined to pay no debts of her contracting. Matys Van Streenbergh.

Bird Dog Conditioning

As the hunting season approaches, both man and his bird dog need to get into condition. Your dog's training should start six weeks before the hunting season opens since he may have grown soft over the summer and put on a little weight. You shouldn't starve off your dog's look of prosperity... you must work it off. A two-foot high platform in his kennel or pen for him to jump up on will provide some exercise for him each day.

An important part of his early conditioning is "roading." Put a leather harness on your dog with a long leash attached and let your dog pull against you at a walk on a street, trail or field for at least twenty minutes. Afterwards turn him loose to run for fifteen minutes. Gradually increase his running time until the dog is able to hunt for a full two hours without tiring. Then, he is physically able to hunt.

When your dog is conditioned for runs of an hour or more turn him loose in a field where he may find birds. Work him in the cover where he'll hunt during the season, and it will make him long winded as well as sharpen his hunting skills.

And, if your state game laws permit, take a gun in the field and fire blanks. This will remind both him and you to be steady to shot and make both of you better hunters. Funeral service was conducted Wednesday morning in Tanner Chapel of Iowa Park by the Rev. Howard Taylor. Burial was in Highland cemetery.

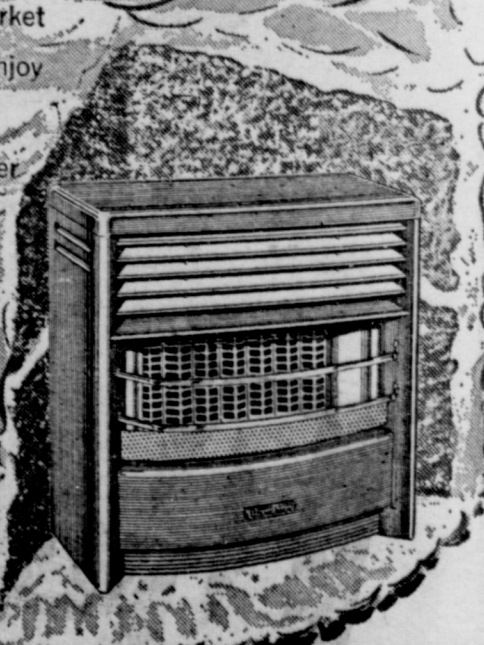
Born Jan. 27, 1880, in Waxahatchie, she was married to Charles Bearden on Jan. 5, 1908. He died in 1936.
