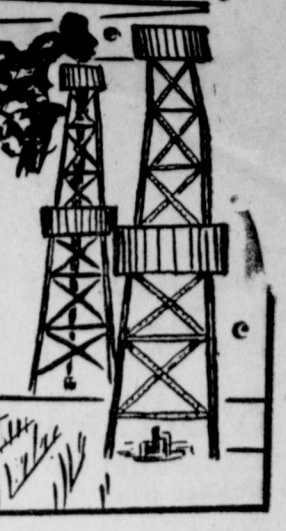

 the Methodist church.



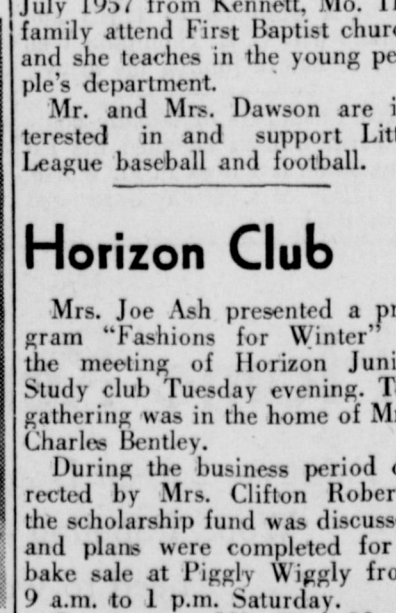
Miss Roma Gayle Newman, a

 2nd stanza the Hawks tried the
 halfback pass from Bill Bickley
 to Rusty Spruiell and it worked
 for a score. Tiger defensive star
 Rex Stafford stopped the PAT
 play short.
 Hawks scored again when Bick-
 ley ran 24 yards on an end-around
 play. Jim Clapp threw the block
 that set him free.
 Tigers took to the air in the
 third quarter with McFarland
 tossing to end Joe Sasser for a
 25-yard scoring play.
 Hawks added 3 points in the
 final quarter when Jim Clapp hit
 Bickley with a 12-yard pass. Jim
 rumbled over the PAT.

 offside and illegal motion.

 pions of the American conference
 in Boys club play, will meet the

Mr. and Mrs. Ardyce Sanders of Holliday are now living in Kamay.

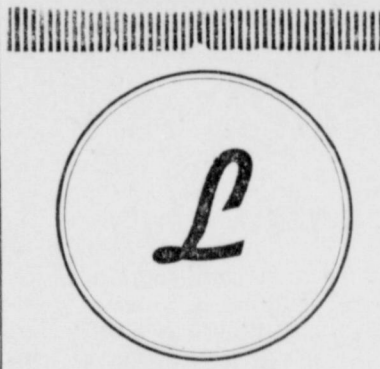
Judy Meador of Avery is visiting Mr. and Mrs. Jack Forbes.

62 Years

Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Banks celebrated 62 years of married life Wednesday. They were honored at a surprise covered dish luncheon given by the Ladies Bible class of the Church of Christ.

Last Saturday evening Mrs. Banks, assisted by her sister Mrs. R. R. Brubaker, entertained the grandchildren and great-grandchildren who live in Wichita Falls at a dinner.

Mark Banks and Miss Cora Sherrod were married Nov. 20, 1901, at the bride's home near Lewisville, culmination of a childhood romance. She was 11 and he was 14 when they first met while attending a little school east of Lewisville.

When the Big Pasture country opened in the spring of 1907, Mr. and Mrs. Banks went there. Although he bid on some land, he wasn't lucky so they bought an Indian lease near Devol, where they stayed until November 1910. They moved to a farm northeast of Iowa Park.

In 1920 Banks started carrying mail and four years later moved into town. He retired as mail carrier in 1940 and drove a school bus for 6 1/2 years.

Mrs. Banks recalls an incident 56 years ago when she went with their eldest son, then six weeks old, to Wichita Falls to buy clothing for the winter. With less than an hour to shop, she explained her needs to a pioneer merchant, Marvin Smith at McClurkan's, and with his help bought \$40 worth, had it boxed and ready to go.

The couple have two living children: Marvin of Tomball and Horace of the home. Four children are dead.

Grandchildren are Paul Mark Banks, Mrs. Darwin Burlison, Miss Linda Ann Young of Wichita Falls, Marvin Banks jr. and Joel Banks of Tomball, Jerry Butcher of Novack, Calif. There are four great-grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Boyd received a "Familygram" recently from their son Tex, who is serving in the navy on the Herbert J. Thomas.

The letter said, in part: The Herbert J. Thomas is preparing for her journey home. We have stopped counting the days we've been here and started looking forward to the few weeks remaining. The ship just left Yokosuka, Japan, after her last upkeep period alongside the destroyer tender before returning to Long Beach.

During the six months the ship has been in WestPac we have logged over 36,000 miles, more than 12 trips across the U.S. The weather on the way over was smooth and quiet but it didn't last long. Along our WestPac cruise we played tag with five typhoons while burrowing through 20-foot swells into 45 knot winds and taking rolls up to 45 degrees with water crashing over the bridge. Since we have been with the 7th Fleet we have spent more time at sea than on shore.

Our expected time of arrival in Long Beach is late November.

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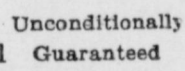

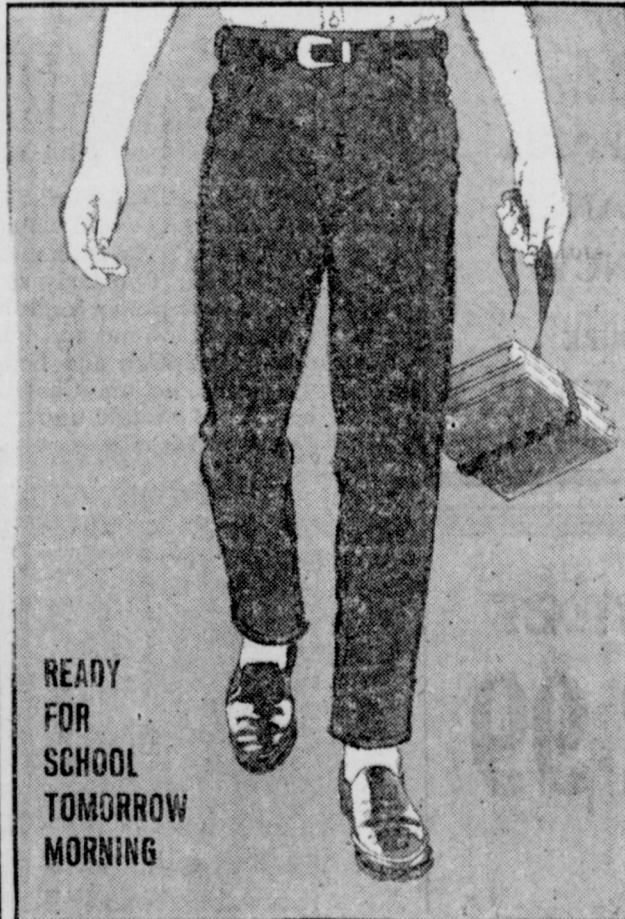

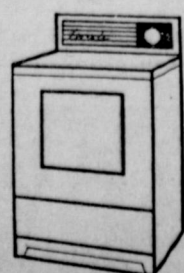
