Trick Or Treat

An army of American youngsters over 3 million strong will turn out with masks and jack-o'-lanterns October 31 in their annual campaign on behalf of 850 million children they've never seen.

The 3 million will be the youthful participants in the Halloween Trick-or-Treat program sponsored by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF). Last year, this young corps from all 50 states collected more than \$2 million in pennies, nickels and other small change. This year, the figure is likely to be higher.

On the receiving end of this fun-with-a-purpose are the 850 million ill, underfed, poverty-stricken boys and girls in the 116 countries that UNICEF serves.

The project started humbly in 1950. A Philadelphia Sunday school class decided to renounce candy, apples and traditional Halloween loot in favor of small coins to be turned over to UNICEF for its worldwide humanitarian work with children. The idea quickly spread nationwide. Contributions rocketed.

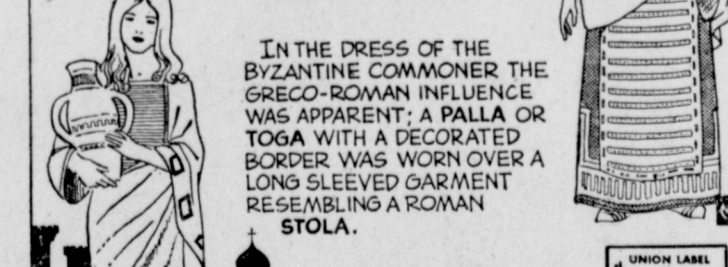
Today, it is the world's most direct and successful children-to-children aid program.

Last Friday night the Hawks went to Olney to do battle with the Cubs. Olney was an overwhelming favorite with most news reporters.

The Hawks overcame four costly fumbles, one pass interception and several other mistakes, to tie the Cubs 6-6.

Olney scored in the first quarter after recovering a bobbled punt on the IP 23. They ran only six plays with Palmer scoring from the 2. Rick Rowntree and Billy Jackson stopped Palmer and caused him to fumble on the two-point try.

Olney dominated the second quarter with 15 offensive plays and 2 punts while IP managed only 12 plays, of which 2 were lost fumbles.

Coaches Watkins and Hayworth did a good job of gathering the Hawks during intermission. The Green and White came out with renewed enthusiasm. Cub players took the kickoff and got deep into Hawk territory before

Larry Thompson intercepted a pass at his goal line and carried it to the 15. After punting, the Hawks recovered a Cub fumble and started goalward. They ran four plays including a 13-yard pass to Thompson, before the 3rd period ended.

With the ball just over 10 yards out, the Hawks put on pressure. Terry May carved out 4 yards; Thomson got two. Sawyer added four, for a first down inside the one. May charged over for the tie maker. Dawson's try from the kicking position was blocked.

The two teams slugged it out on even terms the remaining minutes of play.

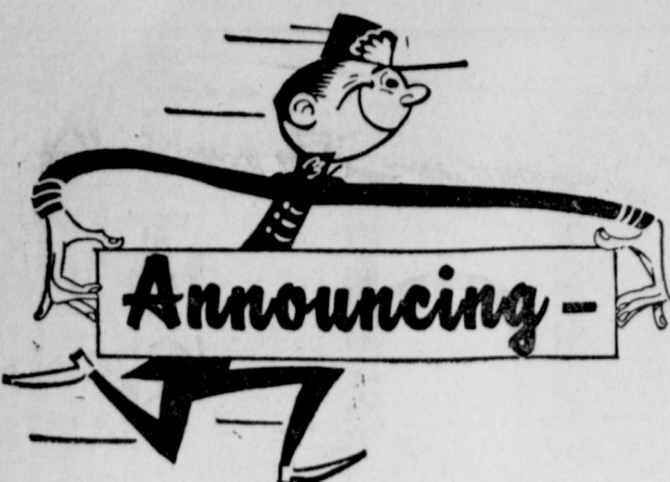

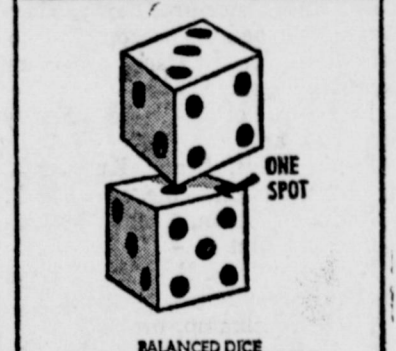

Funeral service was conducted Oct. 17 in Spur for Dr. Raymond Alexander, father of Dr. Ted Alexander of Valley Farms community.

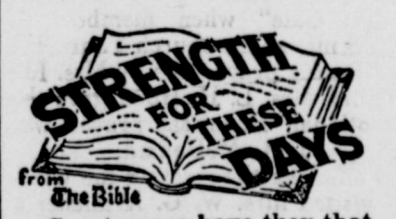
TRICK OF THE WEEK



BALANCED DICE

Take a pair of dice and spin one on its corner like a top. State that it's easy enough for a dice to remain upright while spinning, but to balance it while standing still is even simpler. You can do it with either of the dice using nothing but the dice.

SOLUTION: Set one of the dice on the table with its one-spot up. Set the corner of the other in the depressed spot and it will balance there without any difficulty.



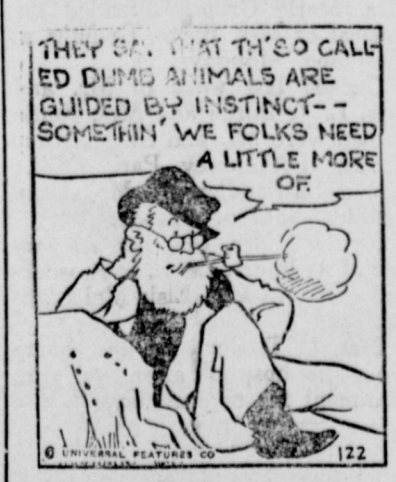

Fills Pulpit

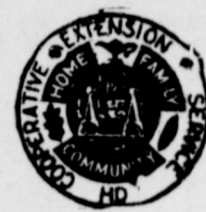
