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School News

Budget of \$2,076,679 for Iowa Park Independent School District was presented at an open meeting of the school board on Friday, Aug. 23, by Supt. Farris Novell. It was unanimously approved by the board.

Budget for 1968-69 calls for estimated expenditures of: \$1,207,655 for new high school; 610,350 for instruction; 112,692 for debt service (bonds); 51,000 for administration; 49,800 for operation of plant; 15,300 for maintenance of plant; 12,300 for pupil transportation; 7,300 for fixed charges.

The budget anticipates total revenues of \$2,076,679: \$321,638 from local sources; 560,538 from state sources; 206,538 from federal sources; 987,953 from sale of bonds, etc.

Tax rate will be \$1.71 per \$100 valuation.

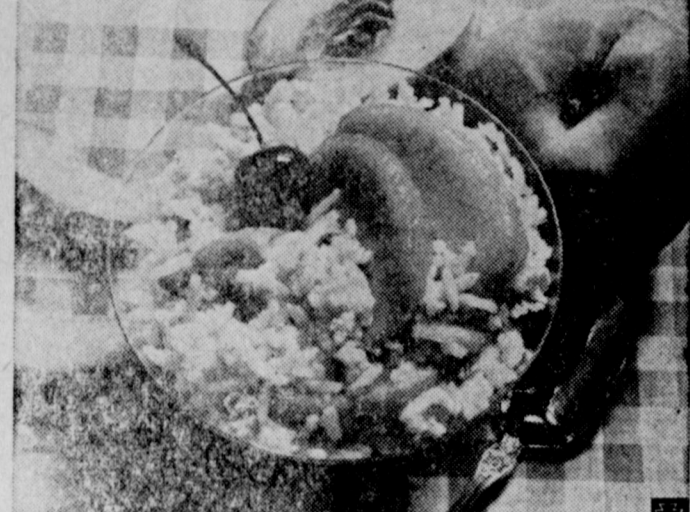

Fruit 'n Rice - Everything Nice



How about a new rice dessert for dinner tonight? (Plain rice pudding, good as it is, isn't the only rice dessert, you know.) Glorified Lemon Rice, quickly made with Minute Rice, features juicy sliced peaches or whatever fresh fruit is on stage at the moment. Lemon juice adds the tang, and chopped nuts a bit of extra crunch.

*Or use any desired fresh fruit or combination of fruits. Bring water, lemon juice, 1/4 cup sugar, and the salt to a boil in saucepan. Stir in rice. Cover; remove from heat and let stand 5 minutes. Uncover, fluff with fork, and cool. Meanwhile, sprinkle peaches with enough sugar to sweeten; let stand. Drain fruit, measuring 1/4 cup syrup. Add fruit, measured syrup, and nuts to cooled rice. Fold in whipped topping. Spoon into dessert dishes and garnish each serving with a maraschino cherry and additional sliced peaches, if desired. Makes about 4-1/2 cups or 8 servings.



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50 Mile Float Trip

Aug. 14. Left from Fish Hatchery, river bridge at Lake Diversion at noon. About 2 miles downstream Jimmy Harrison broke his paddle trying to kill a gar.

Farther down the river a canoe crew found some full beer cans. Steve Watson had a river water and beer shampoo after we settled down for the night in bed of Wildcat Creek. Traveled 8 miles and had to push canoes quite a lot over sandbars.

Aug. 15. Broke camp at 8:00, planning to travel 7 miles by noon. Nothing important happened during trip to Kadane Corner bridge, our lunch stop. While cleaning our canoes, Gary Hunter cut his foot on piece of glass and had to leave. Randy Fulbright left, making the crew 20 boys and two men strong. Launched canoes at 2:00, docked at 7:30 p.m. near Flat Creek. Traveled 14 miles this day making many portages at pipelines. We were tired. Drinking water is gone—can tipped and spilled. Bedded down at 9:00. Had restless night because mosquitoes were bad.

Aug. 16. Left camp at 8:30, hoping to make river siphon by noon, 7 miles away on McCarthy farm. Made irrigation ditch at

10:30. We have gone past Beaver Creek. We now have plenty of water. Travel is easy. Went swimming and bathed with P & G soap. Made all feel good. Pulled in for lunch and supplies at Valley View bridge Farm Road 368. Gary Hunter rejoined, having 5 stitches in his foot. We set off at 2:00. About 100 yards from bridge excitement broke loose. We abandoned canoes to pursue a huge gar, which was taken after receiving a severe pounding by canoe paddles. The prize was 4 ft. 7 in. long and weighed 25 lb. We docked at 6:30 on sandbar near Experiment Station. We traveled 14 miles this day and bedded down at 9:30 p.m.

Aug. 17. Launched at 7:30. A good night of rest and breakfast of pancakes was enjoyed. Making 7 miles this morning, we docked for lunch at River Bridge on FM 369. During afternoon, we had to go through several rapids. One canoe turned over, wetting Jim Robinson and David Brott. We traveled 14 miles and docked at 6:30 near Beverly Bridge west of Wichita Falls.

Aug. 18. Enjoyed good night, all slept well. Had "Kangaroo Court," sentenced two to wear
