## Cable Tv Okayed

Fred Parkey appeared before the City Council, Monday night and requested that the city buy a historical marker to be erected at a desirable spot in town. He explained that Wichita County Historical Society has done research as to origin and early day historical events of Iowa Park and that the county will erect the marker.  
Aldermen voted to buy the marker at cost of \$400.  
City council voted to give the Arena Corporation of Texas in Dallas a franchise to operate in the City, the franchise being subject to revisions in its original proposals. J. E. Chilton of Arena Corp. met with the council.  
Council voted to go on record against House Bill No. 17, the Torts and Claims Act, which if passed will put cities and towns in the same category with individuals and corporations in regard to suits and claims. Mayor E. F. Soell was authorized to write the senator and representatives urging them to vote against the bill.

### 23 Study Club Hears Mrs. R. A. Tanner Talk on Abe Lincoln

A talk by Mrs. R. A. Tanner, "The Rich, Silent Forces in Lincoln's Life," highlighted Americanism Day program for a meeting of 23 Study club last Thursday.

Mrs. W. G. Steele and Mrs. Chauncey Weiler were hostesses in the home of Mrs. Steele.

"Abraham Lincoln didn't just occur. There were influences that produced him," Mrs. Tanner said to preface her appraisal of the important and unusual forces that molded him: his lineage, his associates, both male and female, and his identification with specific areas and events.

Referring to his ancestors, she said "There were incursions in the Revolutionary War, in the Boston tea party, and in any area where the action was." She deduced that Lincoln had ample breeding to show ability, and was not an ordinary bumpkin as he thought himself to be.

Mrs. Tanner put stress on cumulative forces that were generated by women to discipline the development of the 16th president. First was his mother Nancy Hanks, who exerted both emotional and spiritual influence. Abe said of her, "God bless my dear mother. All that I am or ever expect to be I owe to her."

Then there was his stepmother Sarah Bush Lincoln, who instilled a vitalizing force within him by encouraging his reading and demanding that he be allowed to attend school whenever possible.

Other women who contributed to molding the character of Lincoln were Ann Rutledge, who was inspiration of much of his greatness, and his memory of her was source of much of his melancholia.

Mary Owens, who, when he proposed to her gave her a number of reasons why she should not marry him, and she refused his proposal.

Sarah Richard was the girl he appealed to by making the most of their names, telling her that the Sarah of the Bible had become the wife of Abraham. In spite of her youth, she resisted his whimsical logic.

Finally, there was the well-educated, gay, quick-witted, talkative, ambitious Mary Todd, who became his wife and later, on the spur of the moment, drove him out of the house and into the paths of politics that led to the presidency.

Mrs. Tanner mentioned two men who were inadvertent forces in catapulting Lincoln to national prominence. They were John Todd Stuart, who was able to change him from "the perplexed Lincoln" into "the resolute Lincoln"; and Stephen A. Douglas.

During the address, she read a

letter written by Grace Bedell, an 11-year-old girl from Westfield, Chautauqua county, N.Y., Oct. 15, 1860, which was responsible for Lincoln's image as the world remembers him.

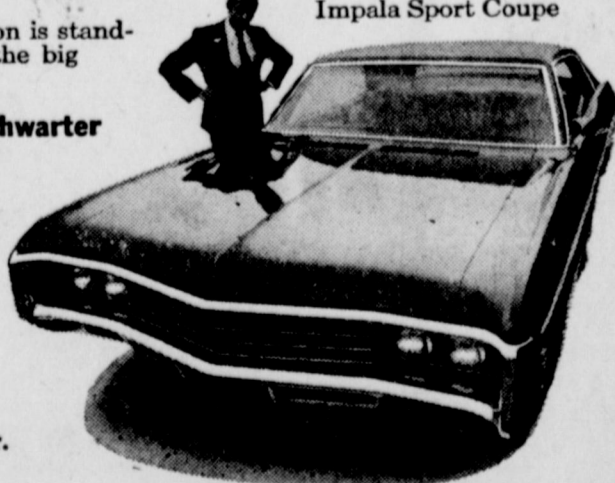
