Need for Blood

Many times each week in hospitals near Iowa Park, pints of blood are given to patients whose lives are saved thereby. Where does this blood come from? It comes from the Red Cross blood bank in Wichita Falls.

The blood bank is being constantly supplied by dedicated people like you. Then when you or a member of the community is in need of blood, the ledger shows it comes from folk in Iowa Park who have made donations when the bloodmobile made trips to the community.

The last four or five times the bloodmobile came here, we have failed to meet our quota of 44 pints. We can't continue this sort of deficit giving much longer. If we continue falling short, the Red Cross will cease sending its bloodmobile, and all our donations of

blood will be made in Wichita Falls.

Please give when the bloodmobile comes to Iowa Park, Thursday, March 20. Also, please talk with someone who hasn't given before and bring him with you to the Christian church between 1:00 and 5:30 p.m. March 20.

For those who haven't given, here are the seven steps to being a blood donor:

1. You begin by registering. This is part of your permanent record kept for your benefit. Mrs. Joan Robinson and helpers handle this.
 2. Temperature, pulse, weight are noted.
 3. Blood pressure and a brief medical history are recorded.
 4. Blood is tested to determine if hemoglobin is sufficient.
 5. Your medical record is checked by nurse. Every precaution is taken to protect you and assure safe blood is taken.
 6. Blood is taken painlessly. It takes only seven minutes while you chat with nurse or read a book.
 7. Relax in canteen for awhile. Volunteers provide light refreshments, which help replace fluid and provide quick energy.
- The nicest people in the world are blood donors.



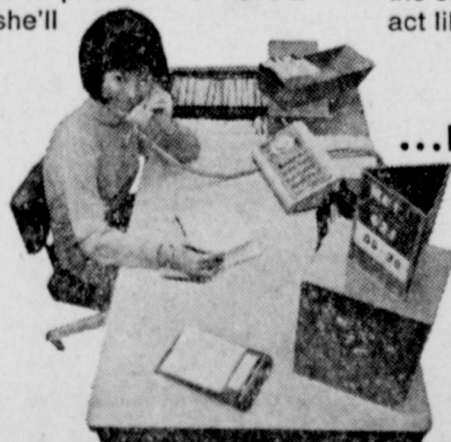

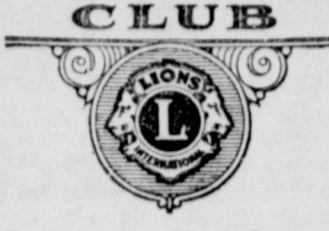

Caudill said that since polio has been conquered, research is now concentrated on birth defects. He said there are four birth defects centers in Texas for research and treatments.

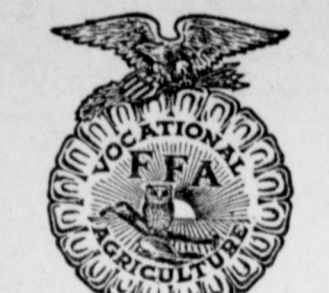
Some of the areas of birth defects are: water on the brain, open spine, mongoloidism, cleft palate, club feet, and urinary problems.

Miss Bradford had not spoken many words before her listeners realized her heart is really in the work. She explained work of local boards, stating that 37.5 percent of funds collected are kept by local units for treatments and 62.5 percent goes to National foundation for research and educational programs.

She gave figures contrasting polio and birth defects which revealed that in 1952, which was the worst year for polio, there were 3,934 cases in Texas; and in 1963 there were 14,000 significant birth defects, 13,000 premature babies and 4,320 born dead.
