The council also voted to make changes in the City purchasing procedures to be in line with modern purchasing practices, which will make departmental requisitions and placing purchase orders for materials and equipment and supplies.

It is hoped this will effect better control of purchases and substantial saving in cost of purchase of materials and equipment.

Postmaster T. E. Glibreath reminded postal customers today that higher parcel post and catalog rates will be into effect this Saturday. The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents postage per parcel.

Minimum local parcel delivery rate will go from 40 to 50 cents. Outside the local area, minimum will go from 50 to 60 cents. Parcel post rates are based on weight of package and distance it is mailed.


