Men Sentenced For Whooping Crane Shooting

Billy Dale Inman and Curtis Collier Sayers of Marble Falls were sentenced by U.S. Magistrate Stephen Capelle of Austin for killing an endangered whooping crane. Inman was sentenced on October 24 to serve 60 days in a federal facility and a \$10,000 fine, plus 200 hours community service, and was placed on five years probation. Inman also forfeited his gun.

Sayers, who pled guilty to aiding in the killing, was sentenced on November 4 to 20 days in a federal facility, fined \$2,000, plus 200 hours community service, and was placed on three years probation. Inman and Sayers were also required to share in a payment of \$8,100 in civil damages to the state of Texas for killing the bird.

Inman pled guilty to shooting the adult female whooping crane with a 12-gauge shotgun during a fishing trip on April 15. He and Sayers were fishing along the Colorado River near Bend, 75 miles northwest of Austin, when the whooper was shot. The journey to their meeting grounds in northern

The bird was one of a flock of five that were beginning the long wintering grounds at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Gulf Coast of Texas. The bird shot was an adult female.

Hospital Board Approves New Equipment Purchase

The board of directors of Muleshoe Area Medical Center met in regular session Thursday night. Following the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, Richard Murphy, administrator, gave the hospital and health care center's financial and statistical reports.

Murphy recommended that the board purchase a Blood Gas Analyzer, stating that they have no alternative. "It can cut the yearly blood gas testing considerably," Murphy said. "The reduction in operating and maintenance cost will more than pay for it in a year." The board voted to purchase the analyzer at a cost of \$13,474.

The board also approved the purchase of a Colonoscope at a cost of \$14,000. The colonoscope is used in surgery and diagnostic surgery," Murphy continued.

A resolution in support of a prison for Bailey County was adopted by the board.

Murphy stated that he had talked to Dr. Purdy, Dr. Allgood and Dr. McClanahan concerning a Rural Health Care Clinic.

On Tuesday, November 26, citizens in Bailey County will have access to fire, EMS, and law enforcement service through their enhanced 9-1-1 system.

A celebration is planned at 2 p.m. Tuesday with cutover ceremonies at the Earl Ladd Fire Station, E. American Blvd. and E. 5th Street.

Bailey County 9-1-1 Plan was submitted to the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications for approval in September, 1989. Following review of the plan, the commission authorized GTE and Five Area Telephone to begin collecting 9-1-1 fees in Bailey County in January of 1990.

Red Raider To Ride In Christmas Parade

Texas Tech fans will swell with pride Saturday, December 7 at the Muleshoe Christmas Parade as the Masked Rider passes them by mounted on Midnight Raider.

The Masked Rider is a mysterious and striking symbol of Texas Tech University school spirit and pride. Wearing black riding clothes, mask, hat and red cape and mounted on Midnight Raider, the Masked Rider circles the football field in celebration of Red Raider touchdowns. The Masked Rider also represents Texas Tech at rodeos, parades and many other school and civic functions.

Ralynn Key, of Gail, Texas, represents Texas Tech University as the famed Mask Rider for 1991-92. As the Masked Rider, Ralynn, along with Midnight Raider, promotes spirit within the university and good will for Texas Tech.

Key, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roland Ray Key, is a junior majoring in business education and office systems technology and administration. She has been active in the American Junior Rodeo Association (AJRA) and has won or placed high at many amateur and professional rodeos. She holds the world record in the pole bending contest as documented by the American Quarter Horse Association, and she served in 1988-89 as Miss AJRA.

Ralynn said she enrolled at Texas Tech hoping one day to become the Masked Rider. "It's a dream come true," she said. "When I was younger, we would come to the football games and all my attention was focused on the Masked Rider. I'd go home and ride my black horse, pretending I was the Masked Rider."

During her year as Masked Rider, Ralynn wants to use her position to recruit new students and to showcase the opportunities available at Texas Tech. "I want to represent Tech and promote what a great university Texas Tech really is."

"Approximately 100 requests are made each year for the Masked Rider's appearances at parades and rodeos," stated Carolyn Johnson, chamber manager. "We are thrilled she chose to be a part of Muleshoe's celebration," she added.

"Our new 9-1-1 system will cost about \$44,000 and will consist of two terminals and one computer," Holmes said. "It is possible to add any specific information available onto the data tapes in the system. For instance, an individual can enter special medical problems that he/she has."

The 9-1-1 system consists of four separate phone lines, two of which are hooked up to the terminals. It is possible to dial 9-1-1 from a pay phone without a quarter.

"We have a power supply that will last 45 minutes in case of an emergency," Holmes said. In answer to a question from the group, Holmes noted that it is also possible to reach 9-1-1 from a mobile phone.

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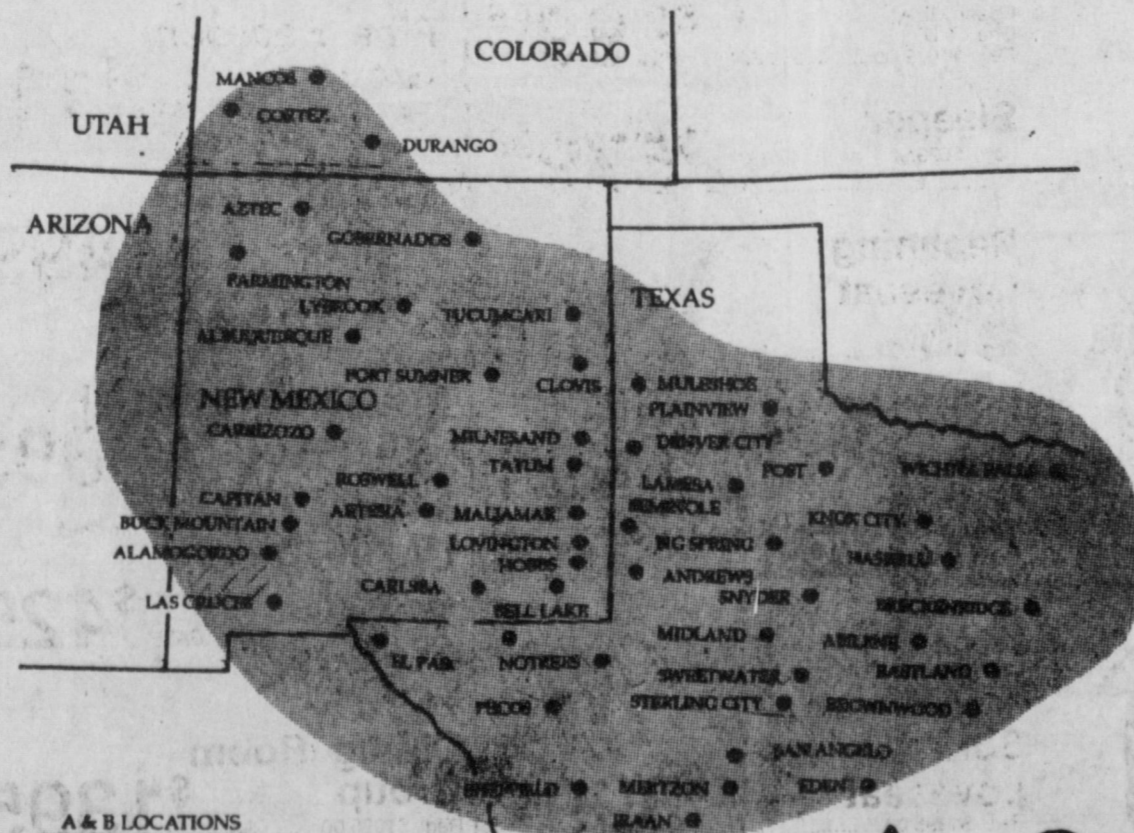

In response to a question to this effect, Holmes suggested that if you live in the country, it might be a good idea to call the police department to check that the directions they have to your house are correct.

Police Department. Once the dispatcher is able to determine the nature of the emergency, the call will be transferred or dispatched directly to the appropriate agency.

The Bailey County system will be one of several fully enhanced 9-1-1 systems in Texas to be implemented under the state plan.

Blood Drive Scheduled Dec. 12

Members of the Muleshoe Advisory Board of United Blood Services of Lubbock met with Jana L. Belew, Community Relations Representative, at noon Thursday. Plans were made for the upcoming blood drive scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 12 at the First United Methodist Church.

According to the United Blood Services blood is voluntarily donated, so there is no charge for blood itself; however, United Blood Services does charge a service fee to cover their expenses to collect, process, test and deliver blood for patients' use. These service fees are covered by most health insurance programs, including Medicare.

Many blood centers used to charge a non-replacement fee to encourage patients' friends and family members to donate blood. The hospital bill was then credited according to the number of units donated. Some blood centers continue this practice today. However, the American Blood Commission strongly discourages it, and several states have outlawed the fee.

United Blood Services does not charge a non-replacement fee because they consider it to be a penalty charge for patients who cannot or do not arrange to replace the blood they used.

While they do not charge the non-replacement fee, they certainly urge patients' friends and family members to replenish the community blood supply for the patients who will need blood tomorrow.

To date this year Muleshoe residents have donated a total of 174 units of blood. On April 11 in a drive held at the First Assembly of God Church, 63 units were donated. Thirty-five units were donated on May 1 at a drive at the Muleshoe High School and on July a drive at

the Muleshoe Church of Christ netted a total of 90 units. Total donations in September for Lubbock and the communities serviced by United Blood Services 2074 units were donated, totaling 98.2 percent of what was used. The collection goal for September was 2100 units.

one of only 33 breeding females in an estimated wild population of about 140 whooping cranes.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) expects about 138 migrating whooping cranes from their Canadian nesting grounds at Wood Buffalo National Park in Northwest Territories to arrive at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) on the Gulf Coast of Texas.

FWS and Canadian Wildlife Service biologists report production of only nine chicks this year due to drought in the nesting area.

Last fall, 146 birds made it safely to Aransas NWR but usually high losses during their winter stay, and the poor nesting success, make this the first year of population decline since 1980 according to Don Clapp, Refuge Manager.

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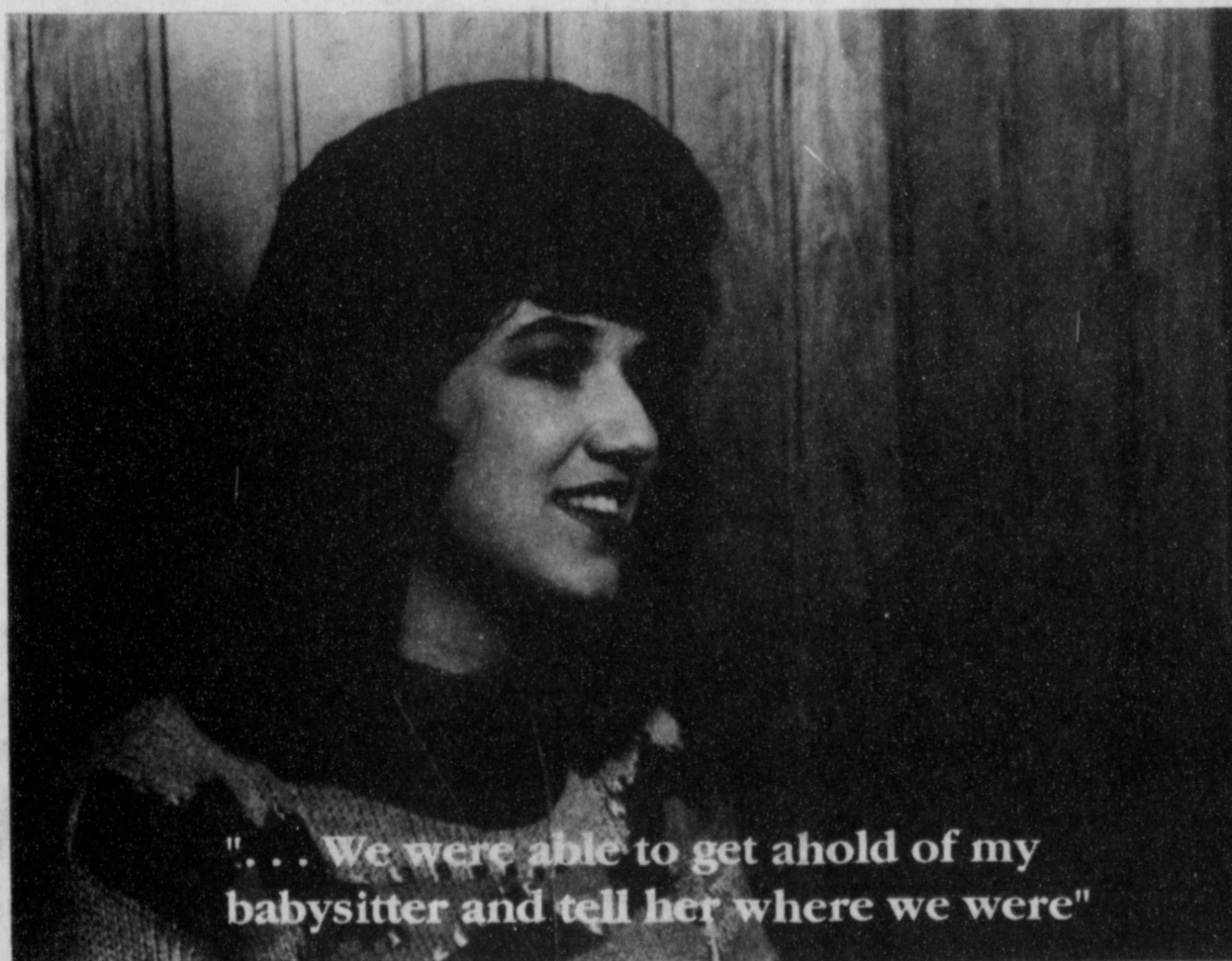

Other considerations are to check the width and finishing of all the seams. The better garment has ample seams. Also crush the fabric in your hand to determine how easily it wrinkles.

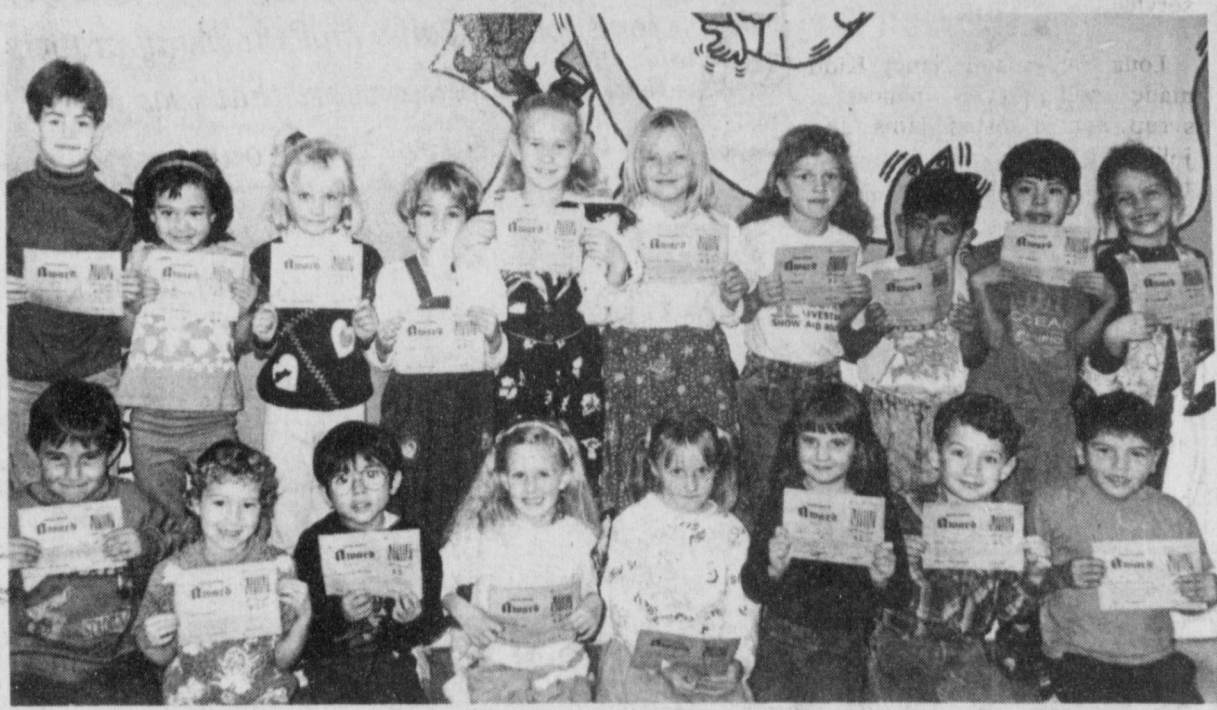
