

Walter Y. Hosier, national safety director of Travelers Protective Association of America, urged students at Kidwell school Tuesday to be safety-minded.

"God has charged each of you with the protection of your body. Over 26,000 young people under 19 years were killed last year in accidents. Mishaps are painful and can cripple you permanently.

"Injuries don't just happen; they occur because of something you do that you should not be doing. More children were killed in the home last year than on the streets, and most of these were because of poisons."

Hosier is an 84-year-old report er from Myrtle Beach, S.C. He is a native of Virginia and has been a safety director the past 22 years. He has spoken to more than 4.000,000 students on accident prevention in 24 states.

On sale at Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas that an election shall be called on the 23rd day of November, A.D. 1968, at Ethyle Kidwell Elementary School, 1200 North Third Street, and W. R. Bradford Elementary school, 800 South Texowa in the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, for the submission of the question: Do the qualified voters of said city, voting at an election held regard to the adoption of a local sales and uses tax for the benefit of such city in accordance with the provisions of Article 1066C under Title 122A of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, and as heretofore and hereafter amend-ed, wish to adopt a local sales and

use tax and
Notice of such election shall be given by causing a substantial copy of this ordinance calling for the election to be published on the the election to be published on the same day of two successive weeks in the Iowa Park Herald, and the date of the first publication be given at least 21 days prior to the date set for such election.

The ballot at such election have printed on it the following:

"FOR the adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

The election shall be conducted in the manner provided by law for other municipal elections, and if a majority of the votes cast in such an election be in favor of the adoption of a local sales and use tax, the same shall be effected in the City of Iowa Park as follows: In order to allow time for the Comptroller's administrative duties under this Act, there shall elapse one whole calendar quarter after the Comptroller receives notice of adoption of such tax provided for in this Act, after which such local sales and use tax shall be effective in such city beginning on the first day of the calendar quarter next succeeding such clapsed quarter.
