Mrs. Thomas Green of Wichita Falls attended the bride. She wore a beige lace dress, beige hat and veil and a yellow carnation corsage.

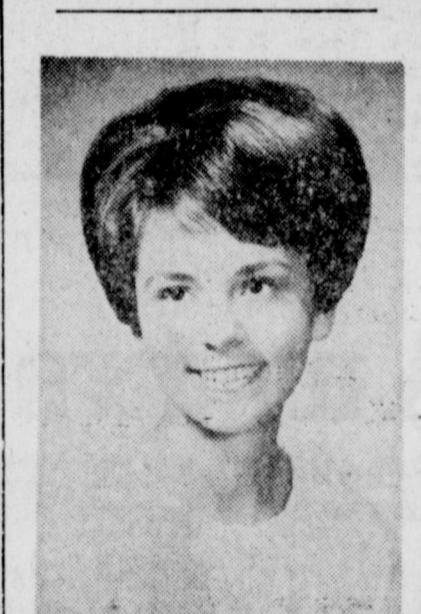
Wayne Begley of Wichita Falls was best man for his brother.

Park Clinic to Have Openhouse, Sunday

Open house will be held from 2:00 to 5:00 Sunday afternoon at the remodeled and expanded Park Clinic here.

The original structure was built in 1952 by Dr. Gordon G. Clark. It was 22 feet by 40 feet and has been expanded to contain almost 3900 square feet.

Dr. Earl F. Watson and Dr. Erwin F. Soell, who have been associated with the clinic since 1961, have recently purchased the building. However, Clark will maintain his office and continue his practice at the clinic.

Cost of remodeling was \$45,000 and \$6000 worth of equipment has been added. Expansion is first observed in reception room and business office. Offices of receptionist, secretary and business manager are off the reception room.

The building now has two hallways instead of one. Six new examination rooms, electrocardiography room, physiotherapy room with a whirl pool, a library and reading room, an inter-com system, a lighting system whereby each doctor or his nurse knows when the doctor has a patient waiting to see him, are among the additions and improvements.

The concept of seeing patients has also been changed. The patient now goes into an examining room where he can receive most of the needed treatment.

New look in the clinic is card dialer telephones. The doctors' offices are equipped with direct lines to the local pharmacies. The clinic also has surgery and x-ray rooms which are not new.

Clark first came to this area in 1913 with his parents, the late Dr. and Mrs. Frank Clark. He received his medical degree from Fort Worth school of medicine, medical department of Texas Christian university, in 1918. He returned to establish permanent residence here in 1921 and became associated with his father and brother the late Dr. J. Frank Clark, in the practice of medicine.

For many years his office was located on Cash street. In 1937 he moved into a clinic on West Alameda, just a block east of the present clinic, and practiced there until 1952, when he built Park Clinic.

Clark has served as chairman of Wichita General hospital board for many years and is past-president of Wichita County Medical Society. He is member of AMA, TMA, Southern Medical association and American Academy of General Practice.

Mrs. Jo Patterson called meeting to order. Mrs. Omega Harris read several thank you notes.

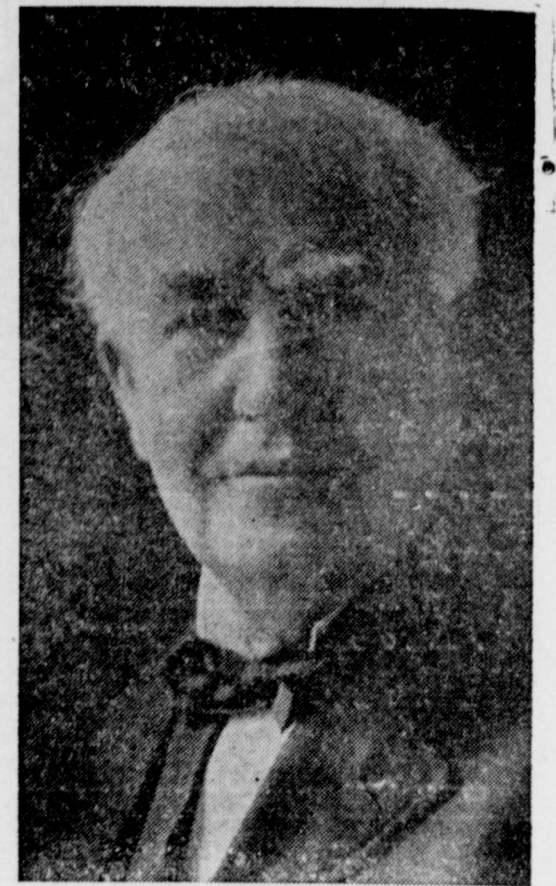

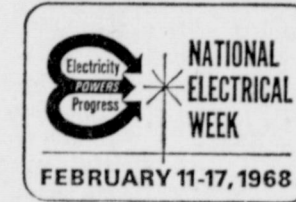
