Cable Tv Okayed

City Council is considering and will vote soon on a franchise to authorize a community antenna television system by Arena Corporation of Texas.

The franchise will be in effect for 20 years, with the understanding that the City may re-negotiate the contract after 10 years. Also, the Company will be allowed 18 months to get the business operating.

The Company will provide its services to subscribers at a maximum monthly charge of \$5.95 for the first television connection and \$1.00 for each additional television set connection within any household. Maximum installation charge of \$17.95 may be made for initial installation. Rates shall not be changed without express consent and approval of governing body of the City.

The Company agrees: A. To distribute television signals providing distribution and coverage of local channels 3, 6, and 7, and

B. Distribute television or UHF signals providing coverage of Dallas, Texas, local channels 11, 13, 21, and 39, and

C. Distribute television signals requested by Civil Defense and Disaster authorities on all channels, and

D. Distribute television and UHF signals providing coverage of nationwide service program time, and news, and, from time to time, news of a local character and nature to be of consideration and interest to its subscribers.

The Company shall provide proper distribution of its services to any and all requested subscribers within the township of Iowa Park.

The Company shall locate all of its physical equipment and facilities necessary for distribution of its services in the city. If not feasible to do so, the Company will pay to the City ad valorem taxes equal to those that would be paid were such equipment in the city.

The Company will have authority to contract with the owner of any utility franchise in the City for the use of its poles underground conduits and other facilities for the purpose of extending, carrying or laying the Company's wires, cables, electronic conductors and other facilities necessary in providing community antenna television service in the City.

In discussing the income directly to the City, spokesmen for the Company pointed to property taxes on the plant itself and four per cent gross receipts tax provided by the contract.

They also mentioned the payrolls: linemen during construction phase, and permanent personnel for operation of the service.

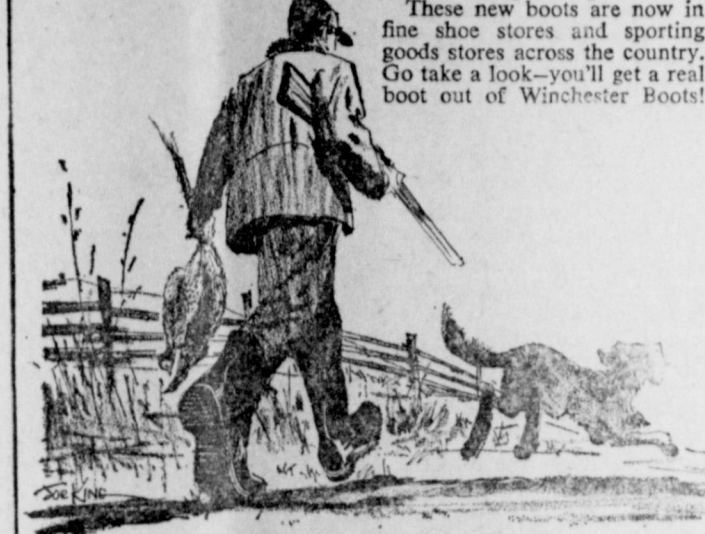
