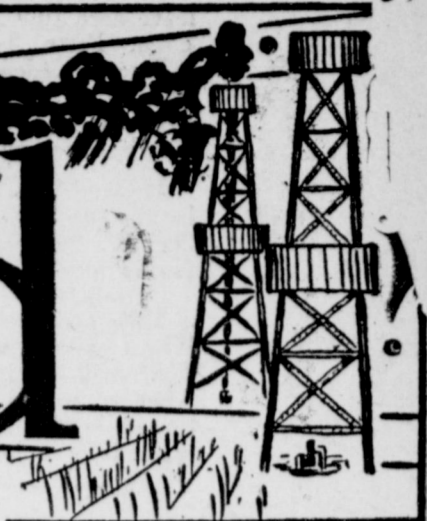

## Work Started on New Post Office

Construction of a new post office for Iowa Park is now under way at the east end of the City Park. The building will contain 4000 square feet of working area and will cost \$76,000.

Owned by Laco Reynolds Inc. of Austin, the building will be leased to the federal government. Contract is for 10 years with four renewal options.

"This will help improve postal service to Iowa Park and this area," said T. E. Gilbreath, postmaster. "The post office now has listings of all box numbers to be used in the new building."

Raymond Jameson Construction Co. of Plainview is putting up the building for Reynolds.

"The Light Infantry Ball" by Hamilton Basso is a brilliant novel of the years of crisis that led to the fall of the Plantation South.

If you want something lighter to read, "How Amelia Secured the Tie That Binds with a Very Loose Knot" by Lorna Novak is an unusual novel with mythical locale in Texas by a Texan author.

For younger readers we have in the fiction section "The Light in the Forest" by Conrad Richter. This book gives an authentic sensation of life in early America.

- Have all ingredients chilled. Tear head lettuce and romaine into bite-size pieces; toss with onion, celery, meat, chicken, cheese, anchovies, reserving a few strips of meat and cheese. Just before serving, blend mayonnaise and French dressing; toss salad. Top with meat and cheese strips, ripe olives, egg slices and tomato wedges. 4 servings.
- Heat oven to 450°. Grease baking sheet. Mix New Bisquick, milk and choice of sauce mix with fork to a soft dough. Beat vigorously 1/2 minute. Spread dough on prepared baking sheet into an oblong, 8x6 inches. Spread with butter. Bake 15 minutes. While hot, cut into 24 strips, each 3x3/4 inch; serve immediately. 12 servings.



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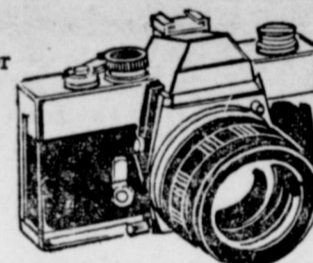
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### 80 Years Young

### March of Medicine

#### Medicine's Ancient Life-Saving Tool Modernized

Of all the life-saving mechanisms available to modern medicine, probably the most important, and least understood, is the amazingly-versatile catheter.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Fred York and Miss Judy Callaway, sisters of the groom.

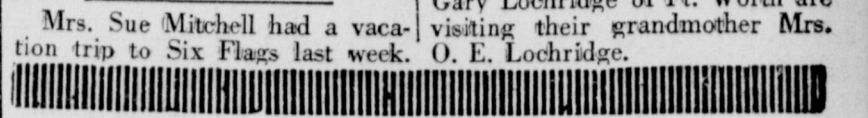

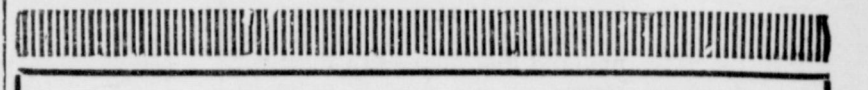
