



There was a mix-up as we came down the front straightaway, and I could see the three cars that should have been in the front row were nowhere in sight. After taking an extra lap, the front row moved into place and the starter, Bill Vanderwater, gave the green flag. The race was on. (The start appeared fine to me and in no way had anything to do with the wreck that occurred in the northeast turn.)

TROUBLE AHEAD. We were all in a tight bunch. I was running between Jimmy Bryan and Tony Bettenhausen with my nose just behind the tail of Bob Veith in the Bowes team car. As I passed the cross (normal shut-off point) I backed off to get into the corner in good shape. Suddenly I saw cars starting to spin, so I turned at once onto the grass infield to avoid the tangle. I didn't have the slightest idea what was going on. Driving a race car through grass at 130 mph, you have your hands full, and there's no time to look around. After sliding sideways I regained full control and got back on the track. I crossed

the starting line in 4th. We continued to circle the track at idling speed until the wreckage was cleared. Bob Veith had been involved but I saw him drive into the pits under his own power, so he was alright. We continued to circle the track and I tried to keep my mind on the race
