The Church of Christ reports a successful Vacation Bible School this week. Attendance has increased each day, averaging over 100 daily.

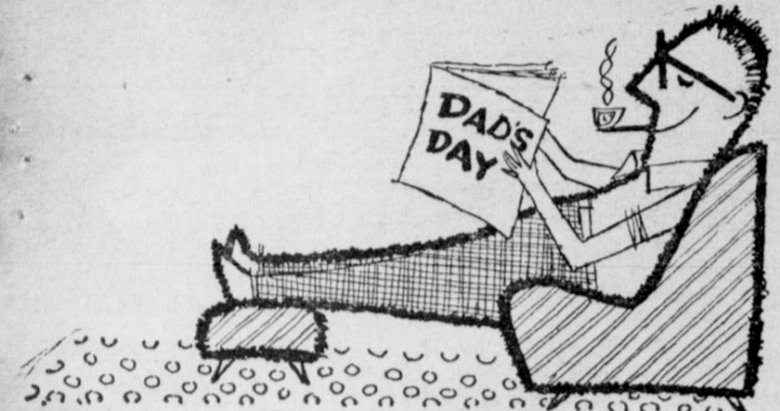
