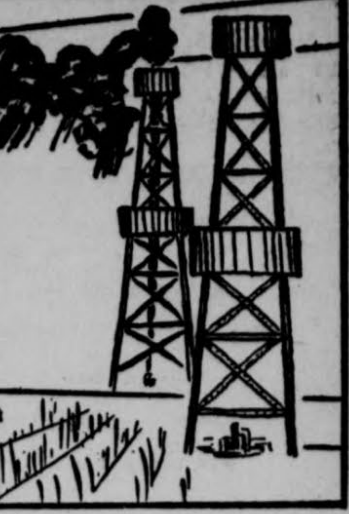

Firemen Instal New Officers at Annual Banquet

Local Fire department members were hosts to their wives, ministers of the town, the city council, and special guests: Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Beall and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Jones; Monday night in the school cafeteria for their annual banquet. W. A. (Dutch) George, an honorary member of the department, served as emcee. After the invocation by Rev. Elden H. Cole of the Methodist church, a ham dinner was served by the Band Parents club. Guests were introduced by Taylor George, who has served as a Fireboy 23 years. John Mixon, outgoing chief, presented his corps of officers who served during 1955: T. C. Scott, assistant chief. Doyle Koonce, president. J. W. Thomas, vice-president. R. R. Brubaker, secretary and treasurer.

In giving his report, Mixon said Iowa Park had 50 fewer fires last year—a total of 55. There were 33 in the city and 22 in the country. Of 16 grass fires, 11 were in the city limits. The department made runs on 3 false alarms. This is the best record in many years. The department has secured a new truck, one of the best in the county. And has rebuilt all the equipment and replaced old hose with new. New facility for this community is the Stephenson Portable Resuscitator. Carl Walsh, chairman of the fund drive, presented a check to Gordon Waters, representative of the Stephenson corporation. Through the efforts and co-operation of Walsh and his committee and the generous response of people of this area, the resuscitator was paid for in a month. Waters said this was the shortest time any city had raised the funds for this life saving apparatus. He said the two most important steps in firefighting is first to save lives, and then to save property. Each fireman will be trained to use the resuscitator effectively. Mixon also pointed out that firemen and their families have enjoyed many social gatherings during the past year, such as the banquet, a fish fry, ice cream supper and other gatherings. Firemen realize it takes co-operation of the family for them to answer fire alarms promptly. T. C. Scott, new chief for 1956, introduced his officers: Oscar Singleton, assistant chief. J. W. Thomas, president. Jim Beasley, vice-president. Brubaker, secretary-treasurer. Dutch then presented Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Sisk, owners and operators of the Sisk Bullet Shop, who are big game hunters in United States and Canada. They showed films of their trips through Colorado, Wyoming, Yellowstone park, Seattle, Wash., and the Columbia river country. The last film was taken near home, a day spent hunting coyotes on a ranch. They used the rabbit call and were able to bag six coyotes and a bobcat. The group was dismissed with a prayer by Rev. Lowry Walker of the Presbyterian church.

ORDINANCE NO. 270
State of Texas, County of Wichita, City of Iowa Park.
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, on this 10th day of January, A.D. 1956, with R. E. Van Horn, Mayor; C. L. Metz, Alderman; W. J. Beasley Jr., Alderman; Harrel R. Sullivan, Alderman; being present, that Ordinance No. 254, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. That the following monthly water rates shall be, and become, effective on January 10, 1956, for all purchases of water within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:
First 2,000 gallons, \$3.00 per month (minimum)
Next 2,000 gallons, .75 per 1,000 gallons
Next 6,000 gallons, .50 per 1,000 gallons
Next 15,000 gallons, .30 per 1,000 gallons
All over 25,000 gallons, .25 per 1,000 gallons.
Where more than one dwelling unit, business, or other structure is, at the present time, receiving water through one meter the monthly minimum of \$3.00 shall be charged for each dwelling unit, Duplex or business building, or other structure being supplied with water through such single meter; amendment, provided, however, that hereafter not more than one dwelling unit, business or other structure shall receive water through one single meter.
2. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.
4. Passed and approved by the City Council by unanimous vote of all members present on this the 10th day of January, A.D. 1956.

Iowa Park did something last Tuesday evening that most of the district Lions officials thought couldn't be done: "Having two active Lions clubs." With hard, persistent work on the part of Noonday and Evening Lions club members, the Evening Lions club accumulated enough members and was granted a charter. It was presented at a Ladies Night gathering by W. R. McDonald of Ft. Worth, district governor. Members of the Noon Lions club, sponsors of the new club, acted as hosts for the charter banquet in the school cafeteria. The assembly included members and wives and visiting Lions from Wichita Falls, Electra, Burkburnett and Fort Worth.

Lion Elden Cole of the Methodist church led the invocation. Bill Sawyer, president of the host club, presented the toastmaster, L. E. Brooks, a past president. Lion Brooks introduced the following special guests: District Governor McDonald, John Cadwallader, cabinet secretary-treasurer, and wife of Fort Worth. Woody B. The Lions club song was led by Noon club sweethearts Mrs. Charlie Coppock and Mrs. Otis Gay. Lion R. R. Brubaker dismissed the group with the benediction. These two clubs plan to play a benefit basketball game in the near future. Proceeds will go into the March of Dimes fund.

School Census Gets Underway

The annual school census is now underway, according to Supt. Keith D. Swin. This week each pupil was given a census slip to be filled out. Mr. Swin asks that all parents or guardians see that these slips are properly filled out and returned. It is highly important that every person aged 6 to 18 as of Sept. 1, 1956, be registered in the school census being taken this month. All parents are urged to co-operate in this because 1956-57 school funds are allotted on the basis of scholastic population enrolled during this campaign. Any child not registered can not be transferred to another school, if it should become necessary for his parents or guardian to move. The school census ends Jan. 31. 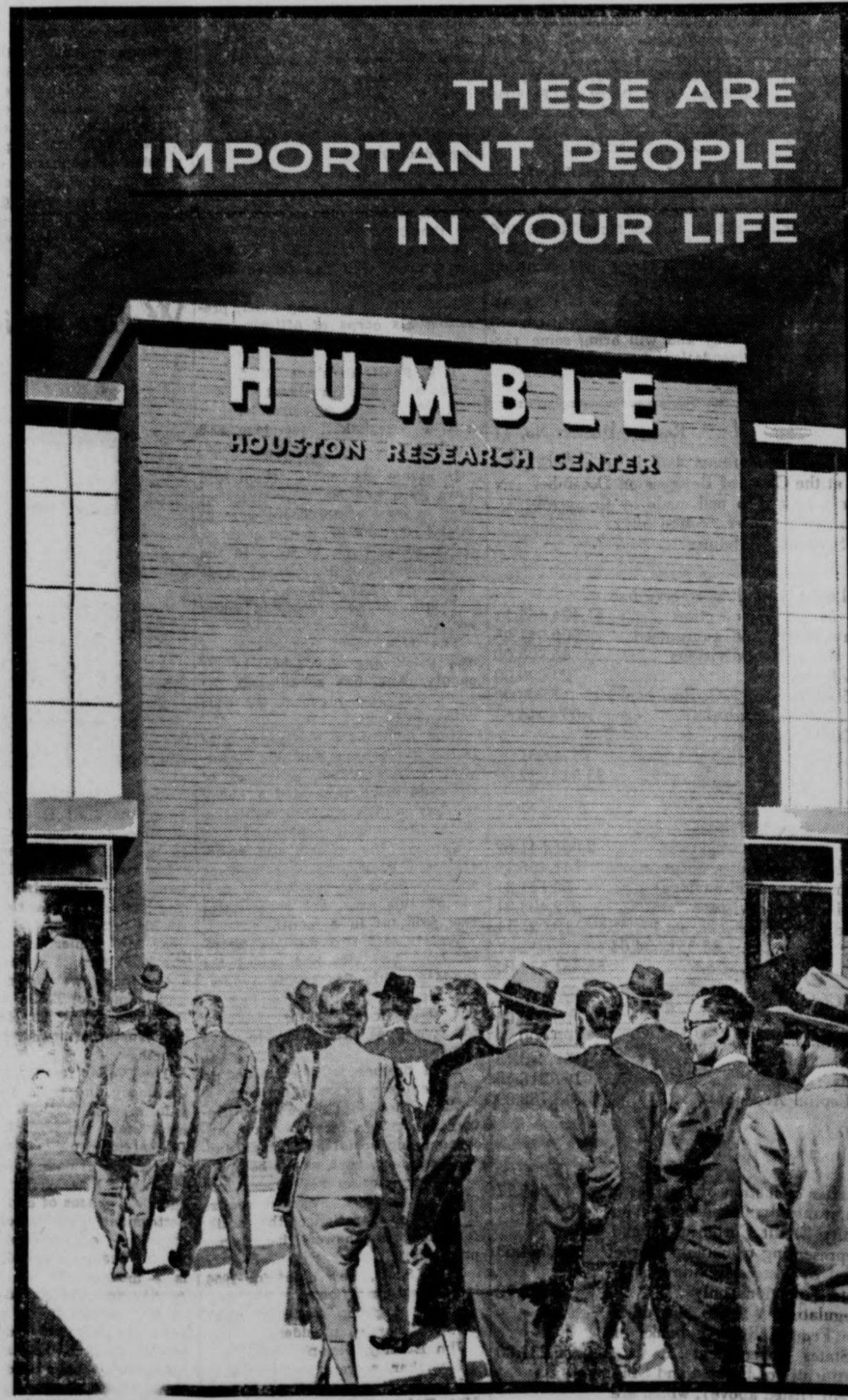

Soil Conservation

In the Frank M. Wood Wildlife Conservation Awards program, resulting in awards for wildlife-minded men from all over Texas, Joe P. Cunningham, who operates an 875 acre ranch three miles west of Iowa Park, was named winner of Area 5, Farmer-Rancher division.

Awards will be made Jan. 19 at Lubbock at the annual convention of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors.

Game and fish management has been given a high priority in operation of the Cunningham ranch, with provision of cover, food and water for wildlife included. Seven ranch ponds are stocked with fish and an effort made to control the rough fish population.

Fenton Dale of Iowa Park, chairman of Wilbarger-Wichita SCD, wrote in nominating Cunningham for the award, that "his accomplishments represent near ideals in re-establishing a balance in nature of plants, cover and land."

Billy Edwards, soil conservationist of Henrietta, was named president of the District Agriculture Workers Council to succeed Bob Crocker, ASC office manager in Iowa Park. Edwards was elected at a breakfast meeting of DAWC in Wichita Falls, Wednesday.

Elvy Sargent, soil conservationist with the Iowa Park SCS work unit, was re-elected second vice-president.

J. V. Brookshear, president of the Burkburnett bank, told the group that 9 out of 10 farmers in this area are on the verge of insolvency. Last year, he said, the farmers spent \$100 and received only 39 cents in return. "This is the biggest agricultural depression in history," he said.

Paul H. Zink of Iowa Park, representing the Federal Land Bank, also spoke on farm finance problems.

Cemetery Roads To Be Paved

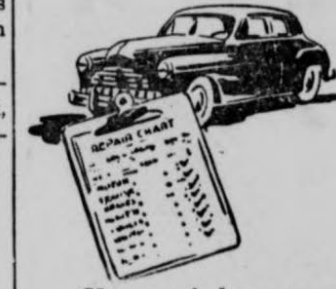
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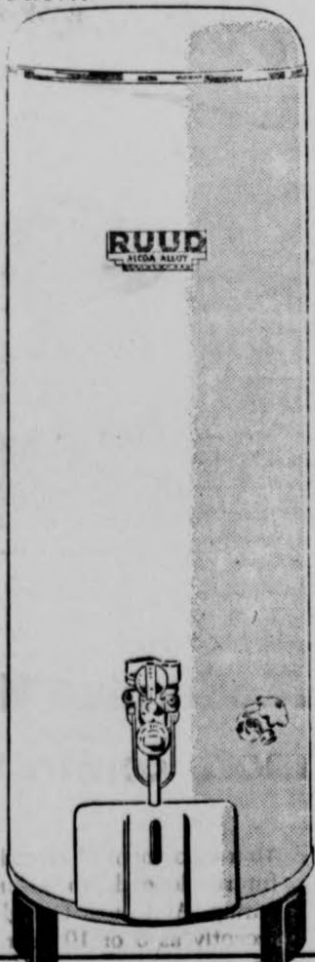
