## SCD Reorganizes

The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board has granted permission for the reorganization of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District it was announced by Carol L. Mitschke, present chairman of the board of supervisors.

Hearing on the reorganization will be held at Electra, Texas, April 15, 1968 at 7:00 P.M. in the Chamber of Commerce Office, Mr. Mitschke reported.

The Wilbarger-Wichita SWCD has been operating as a two-county district since 1946. Mr. Mitschke said. The reorganization would place Wilbarger County in a District of its own and Wichita County would operate as a separate independent district. The advantage of the reorganization would give Wilbarger County three additional supervisors and Wichita County would have 2 additional supervisors. The two-county district is presently operating in 5 zones. Under the reorganizational plan both counties would have 5 zones with better representation in each county.

Another consideration noted in favor of reorganization was the rapid urbanization of Wichita County. Wilbarger County continues as a high producer of agricultural products such as cotton, wheat, alfalfa, and cattle. The two-counties vary considerably in overall agricultural production and operation. The proposed reorganization is expected to be effective in early June at latest. Mr. Mitschke said.

The supervisors in Wilbarger County at the present time are Ed Lehman, Jr., in zone 2 and Carol Mitschke in zone 1. Supervisors in Wichita County are Donald Hill, Iowa Park, Texas, in zone 3, George Streit of Electra, Texas in zone 4, and Dee Hankins of Valley View, Texas in zone 5.

All interested people are urged to attend the hearing set for April 15 at Electra, Mr. Mitschke concluded.

## Brott listed on Deans Honor Roll at Baylor

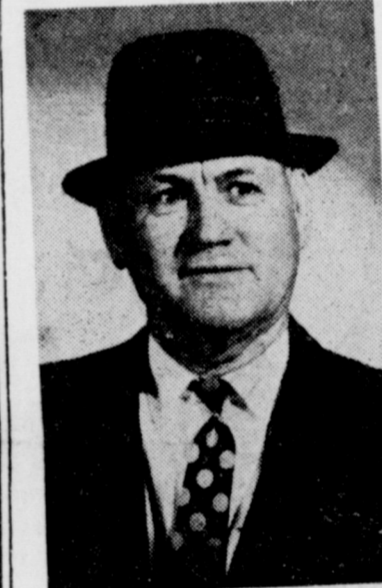
