A special table of books with library bindings will be available at higher prices, to be ordered.

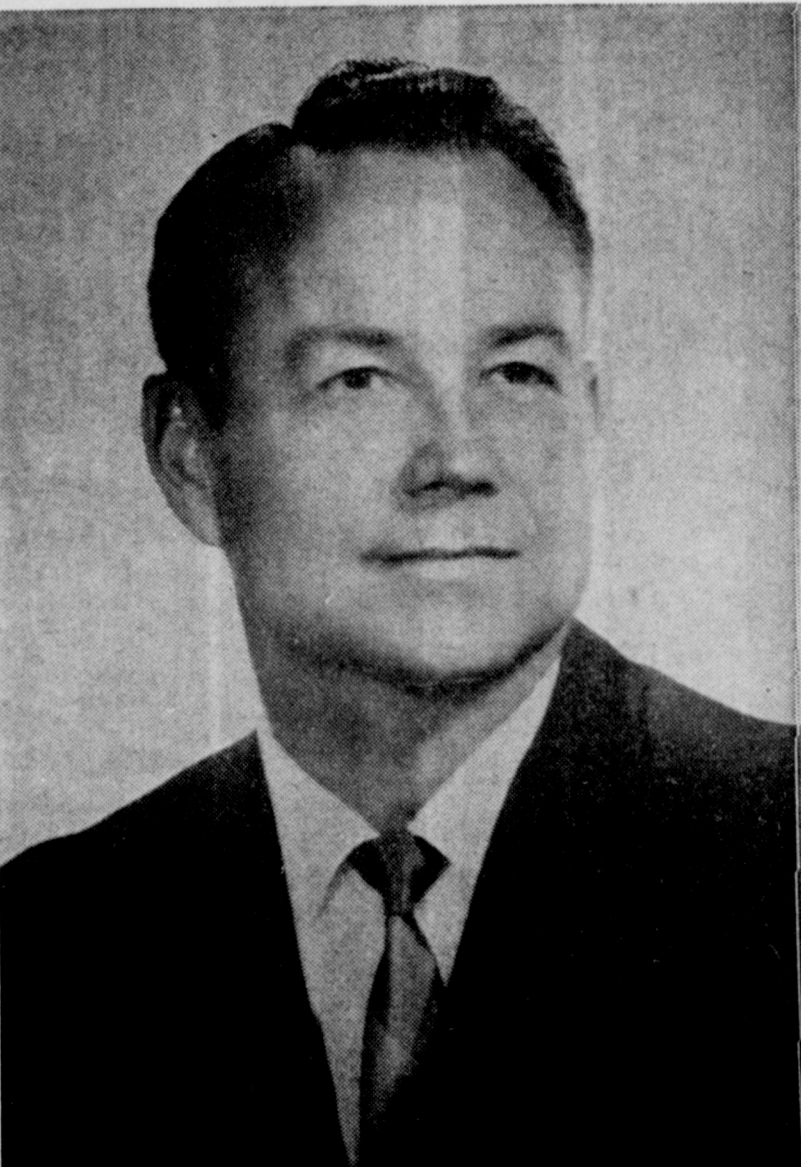
Purpose of the Book Fair is to place good reading material in the homes and to increase our libraries.

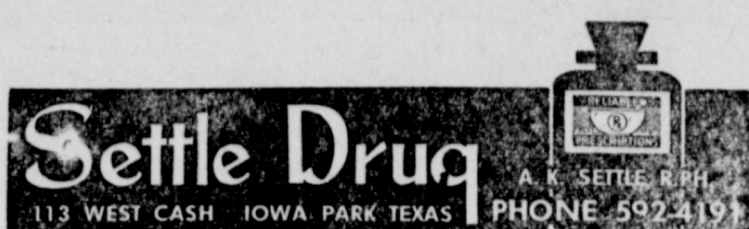

Wherefore, Premises considered, Plaintiff prays that the Defendant be cited to appear and answer herein and that upon trial hereof, he have judgment for divorce, that the property be awarded to Plaintiff as prayed for, and for such other and further relief, in law or in equity, to which he may show himself justly entitled, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

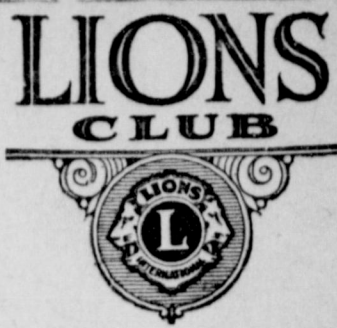

Lester E. Brooks, agriculture consultant for Stein, Hall and Co., and former superintendent of the Iowa Park research station, was program Tuesday at Lions club luncheon. By 1963, he had a new variety ready for release, which was later named the Brooks Variety.

Brooks stated that guar is now a multi-million-dollar industry. It is used in foods, ice cream, pharmaceutical products, cosmetics, oil and paper industries and in textiles. He declared also that guar provides a high-protein feed.

Brooks pointed out that guar is a better money crop for local farmers than cotton or wheat or small grains, besides having the

advantage of being a soil builder. Brooks then outlined his "blueprint for happiness." He voiced opinion that happiness is merited, created and contined from within. Happiness is contingent upon right relationship with God and fellowman.
