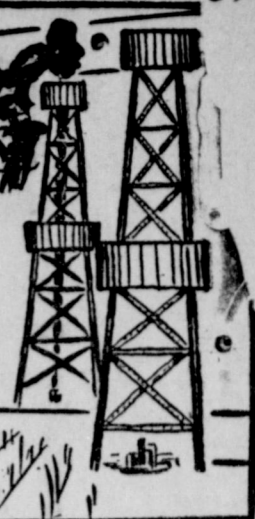

New Post Office Will Go into Service Next Monday Morning

Iowa Park post office will move to new location on corner of Cash and Bond over the weekend, according to Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath.

Moving will start Saturday afternoon and the new building will be open Monday morning for business at the usual time.

First post office was established in Iowa Park on Nov. 12, 1833, according to information received by Gilbreath from the Office of Industrial Records, National Archives, Washington, D.C.

He also received a photostatic copy of the application for establishment of a post office mailed from Post Office Department, Washington, Oct. 13, 1833. A. J. Kolp filled in the application, which was co-signed by G. A. Giddings, postmaster at Wichita Falls and mailed back Oct. 22, 1833.

The application stated the proposed post office would be located in the North 1/2 of Section 25 and the south 1/2 of Section 18, Tarrant county school land. Name of the nearest post office on the same route was Ruthford, six miles in a northwesterly direction. Name of the nearest post office on the same route was Wichita Falls, 10 miles in a southeasterly direction, and name of nearest post office not on same route was Clara, 8 miles in a northerly direction.

Population to be supplied by proposed post office was "about 200." Today it is 8,500, according to Gilbreath. Name of railroad that would serve the proposed post office was given as "Denver, Texas and Fort Worth."

Since the Postmasters and Rural Appointments Division, Bureau of Operations, Post Office Department in Washington does not maintain records before 1930, data furnished by a few of the old timers and relatives of former postmasters have been the chief sources of information for this brief history of Iowa Park post office.

According to Mrs. Kate Emmanuel, who came to Iowa Park Dec. 25, 1839, the first post office was on the south side of the Ft. Worth and Denver Railroad track. It was in the Arcade building in what is now the 100 block of South Wall. Also in the building were the bank, a laundry operated by a Chinese, and the town's newspaper, the Texan.

Apparently, when the post office was moved to the north side of the tracks, it was located in a small building in the 100 block of West Cash. Mrs. R. S. Van Horn, who moved to Iowa Park in 1890, remembers the location and has a picture of that block of the business district. With use of a magnifying glass one can make out the lat three letters "i c e" over the building.

Oldtimers are agreed that the third location was in 200 block of North Wall facing east; and some remember the profusion of potted plants the postmaster used to beautify the foyer of the building.

From there, it moved to the 100 block of West Park, facing north. Gilbreath received a photostatic copy of a form filled in by Postmaster C. C. Burrows, Dec. 3, 1935, the purpose being "so that the past office might be accurately located on the post route maps."

The form was returned to Division of Topography, Post Office Department.

Also received was a copy of the form filled in by Postmaster E. E. Wallis, Sept. 16, 1943, in which he described the new site at 113 West Cash.

Sixth move was on May 1, 1957, to 300 North Wall.

The new structure will be to the new \$74,398 buff brick building in the City Park at corner of Cash and Bond. The building extends south to Highway street.

The building has been erected by Raymond Jameson of Plainview. Mearl Davis of Plainview was superintendent of the job. Sub contracts were let to W. O. Sampson for dirt work; Builders Supply; Wichita Glass Co.; City Concrete.

The new structure is 64 feet wide by 70 feet long and features a box lobby, service lobby, postmaster's and assistant postmaster's rooms, ample storage rooms, mailing vestibule, and official parking lots in the rear.

Mrs. James A. Sewell, who was quite young when her father the late C. C. Davis became postmaster, served as clerk in the post office sometime later. She recalls her father was postmaster during the "oil boom days" and since the facilities were not adequate for the suddenly expanded business and deluge of mail, life for the postmaster and personnel was rather hectic.

She said her father slept in the building so he could meet trains at night and get the mail. There were not enough boxes to accommodate the people who came to Iowa Park to work in the new oilfield, and General Delivery mail was a big problem. It was not infrequent to see a long line form outside the building and down the street of people waiting to ask for their mail.

Boxes were too small to hold mail of oil companies, so much of it had to be stacked on the floor. Mrs. C. C. Burrows, whose late husband was mail carrier on Route 3 for 8 1/2 years before he became postmaster, said he used several modes of transportation during those years. He covered the 20-mile route by mail wagon, horse and cart, mule and cart, horse and buggy, motorcycle and sidecar, Sears motor buggy and Maxwell automobile.

Mrs. Burrows was substitute carrier on his route when Cliff substituted for another carrier during his vacations.

Wier Burrows retired as postmaster he did not know that Uncle Sam owed him even one cent until one day he received a check for that amount. He did not cash it, and Mrs. Burrows still has the check.

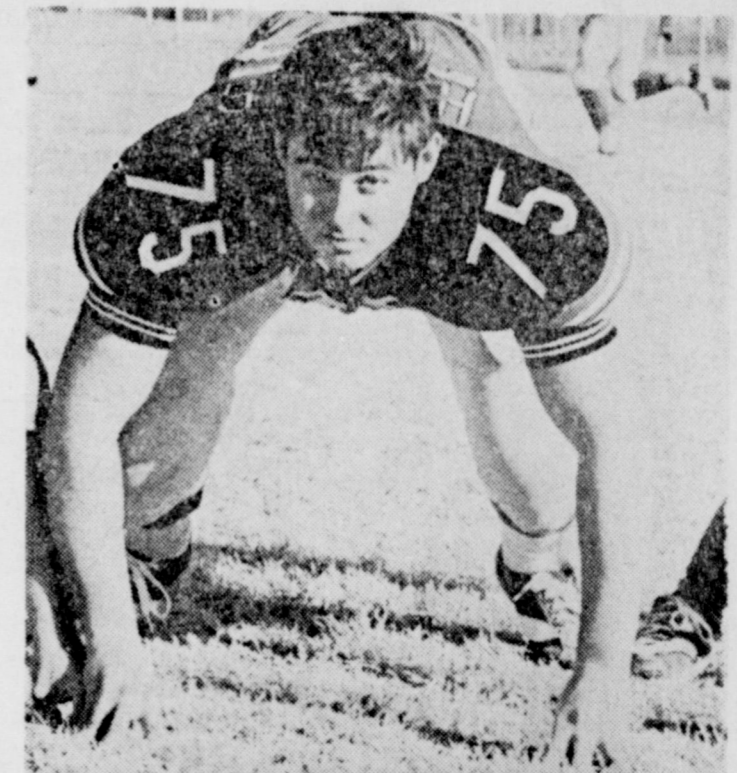

All State football players in Class AA high schools were chosen and announced this week, and IPHS has three first team men: James Eke, Steve Berry and Craig French. They were selected by Texas Sports Writers association.

Also on the honorable mention list are the offensive pair: Jim Clapp and Gary Frazier.

French, 200-lb. junior, defensive guard, is believed to be the finest interior lineman in IPHS history. On defense he averaged 12 unassisted tackles per game. His offensive blocking leaves nothing to be desired.

Steve Berry, 183-lb. junior, goes both ways, as fullback and linebacker. He averaged 5.4 per carry on 92 trips, mostly through the line. He averaged 12 tackles a game but in several contests he piled up as many as 18 tackles.

James Eke was injured in the Denver City game and did not see the Hawks' final two outings. In 12 games he carried 209 times for an average of 5.1 yards. He scored 19 touchdowns. He also kicked four field goals and made 31 points-after-touchdown.

Park Hotel Closed by Mrs. Beall

Mrs. A. O. Beall has retired as manager of Park Hotel, a 3-floor brick structure on East Cash with 31 rooms, built about 50 years ago. She has served as manager for 18 years. With exception of a few months of that time she also served as police dispatcher and was responsible for sounding the fire alarm to alert Volunteer Firemen.

She worked as volunteer police dispatcher for three years. From 1953 to 1961 she received \$10 per month; from 1961 to 1967, \$30 per month; and when police radio was added in 1967 her pay was raised to \$200 a month.

In the summer of 1963 the dispatcher was moved to the City Hall where a dispatcher is on duty 24 hours a day.

Mrs. Beall knows what it means to be awakened many times during the night; to be up half the night; yes, even all night.

Methods of notifying Iowa Park police at night of a need or an emergency have changed during the past 18 years. At first Mrs. Beall got their attention by turning on a red light atop the hotel. She left notes on the desk informing the police where and what the need was. Later the light was changed to the top of the fire siren tower.

Imagine her consternation at times when she had only one telephone to care for calls for both the police and fire departments.

She would press a button to sound the fire alarm nights and on weekends. At night she would don a robe and cross the street to tell the first firemen to arrive where the fire or emergency was.

One wintry night the siren had frozen and would not sound, so she had to contact many firemen by telephone.

One of the most exciting nights Mrs. Beall experienced was the time an ammonia tank was leaking near the railroad track. Some of the residents in south part of town left their homes voluntarily; they were not ordered to do so.

Within a few hours news of the ammonia leak had spread over the nation, and Mrs. Beall was up all night answering calls from near and far, the most distant point being New York City.

Another busy night was when a tornado struck northeast of town killing one person and demolishing several houses. The police department telephone rang continuously and the hotel lobby was a hustle and bustle until after midnight.

Volunteer firemen have appreciated Mrs. Beall and her assistance during the year, and they show their appreciation by presenting her a gift at the annual firemen's banquet.

Managing the hotel has not been a humdrum job altogether void of excitement. To be sure, there were daily routine chores to per-

form; but new friendships were made, and some of the regular roomers became almost like members of the family.

Not all the roomers were completely trustworthy. Mrs. Beall recalls two couples who stayed in the hotel for about six weeks. The men were well groomed and very courteous. They would leave the hotel each afternoon about 4:00 and come back about 2:00 a.m.

At first she was naive enough to believe they were in a business which entailed contacting clients at night. As days went by she became somewhat suspicious. The group checked out unexpectedly one morning.

Next day she learned the men were arrested in Oklahoma for burglarizing a drug store in Wichita Falls. Their arrest brought to light other robberies and burglaries they had committed in the area.

Another time a man who was staying at the hotel and working at odd jobs, turned out to be the head of a car theft ring in Missouri.

The cash drawer was robbed once and several attempts to rob it were thwarted while Mrs. Beall was manager.

Mr. and Mrs. Beall own and operate a coin-matic laundry in Wichita Falls. They are members of Iowa Park Church of Christ, where she teaches 3rd grade Sunday school students. She is vice-president of TOPS and is selling Mary Kay cosmetics.

The Bealls have two sons: Ralph and G. K. of Iowa Park; and one daughter Mrs. John D. Josey of Van Horn; and six grandchildren.

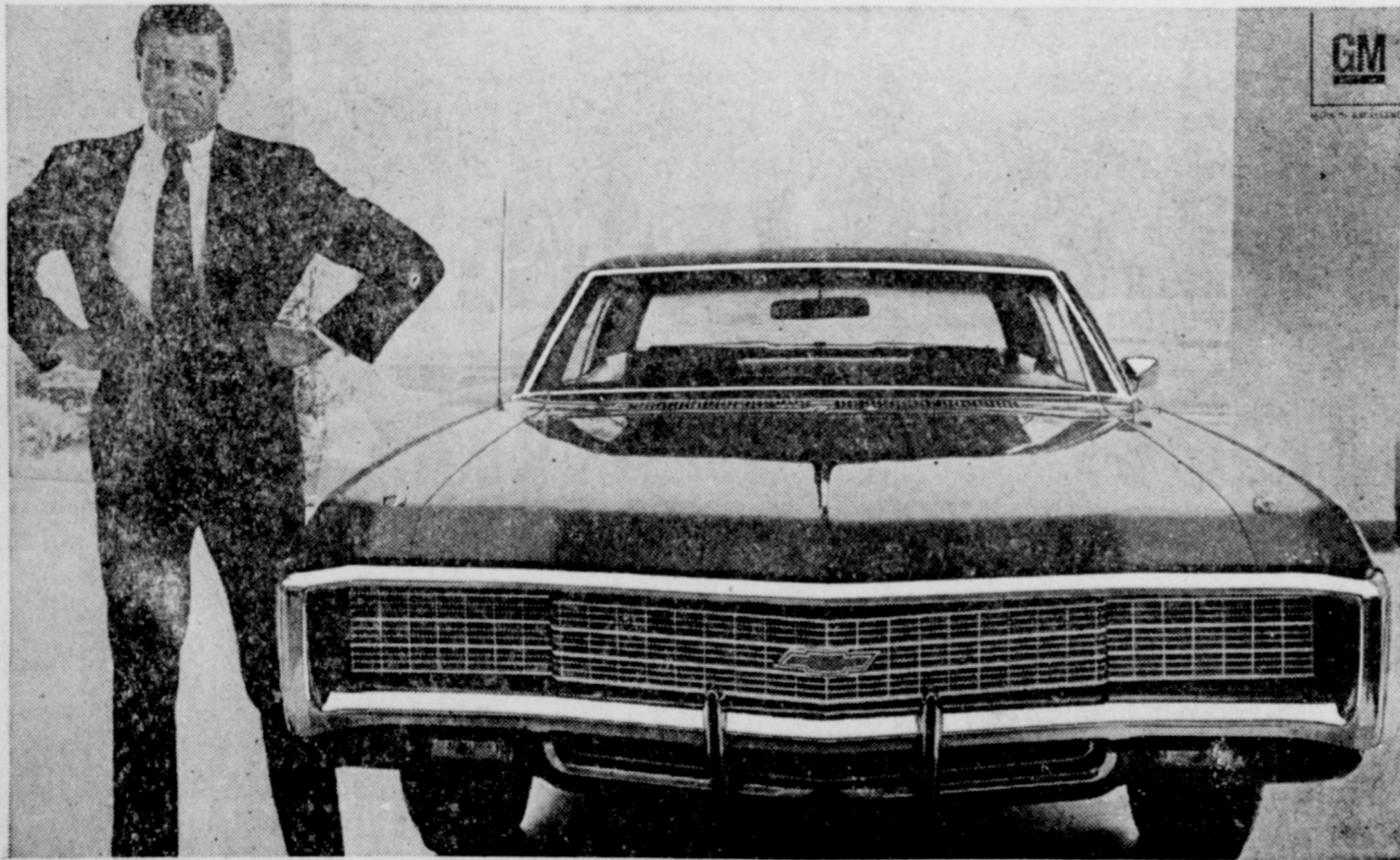

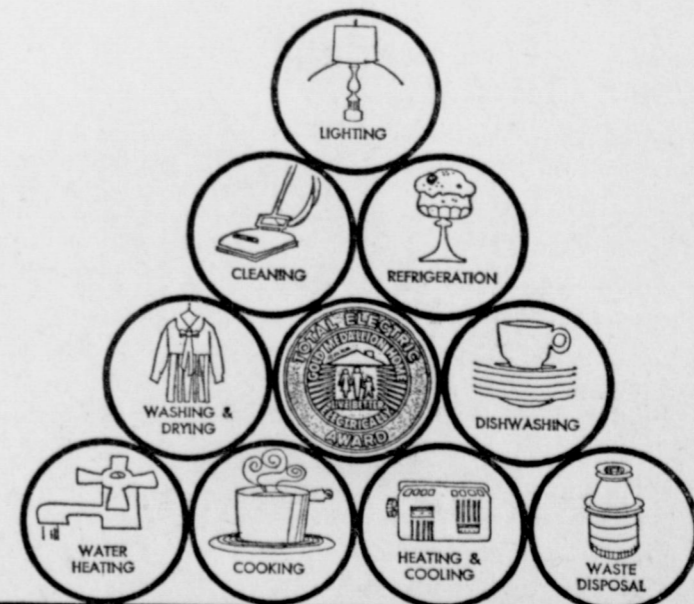

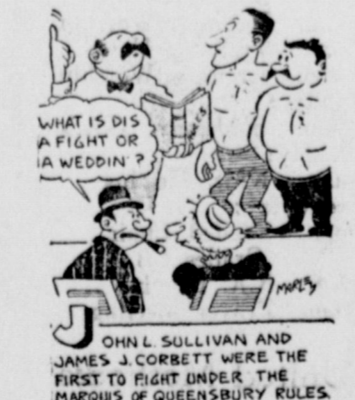
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
