"People are rioting for many reasons, but 1 haven't heard of anyone starting a riot over the mayhem on our streets and highways. The fact that more than 40,000 persons were killed on US streets and highways last year should be of great concern to all of us."

"Young people are adventuresome, filled with a spirit of competition and ready to accept a challenge. It behooves adults to set the right example by following the rules of safe driving," he concluded.



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
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
