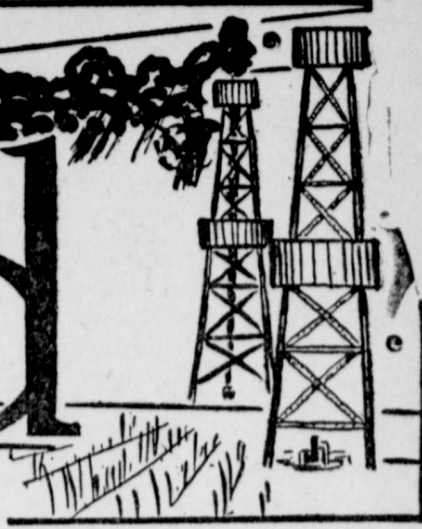

## 40 Years Ago

From May 1928 to Sept. 1968 a Commencement program for Iowa Park public schools lay hidden behind a bulletin board in the hall of IPHS. Last week when Virgil Scott took the board down to replace it with a new one, the 4-page program tattered around the edges and almost worn in two across the center fold fell to the floor.

The year '1928' caught Scott's eye since that was the year his wife, the former Florence McDonald, finished high school, so he took it home to her to put with her high school memoirs.

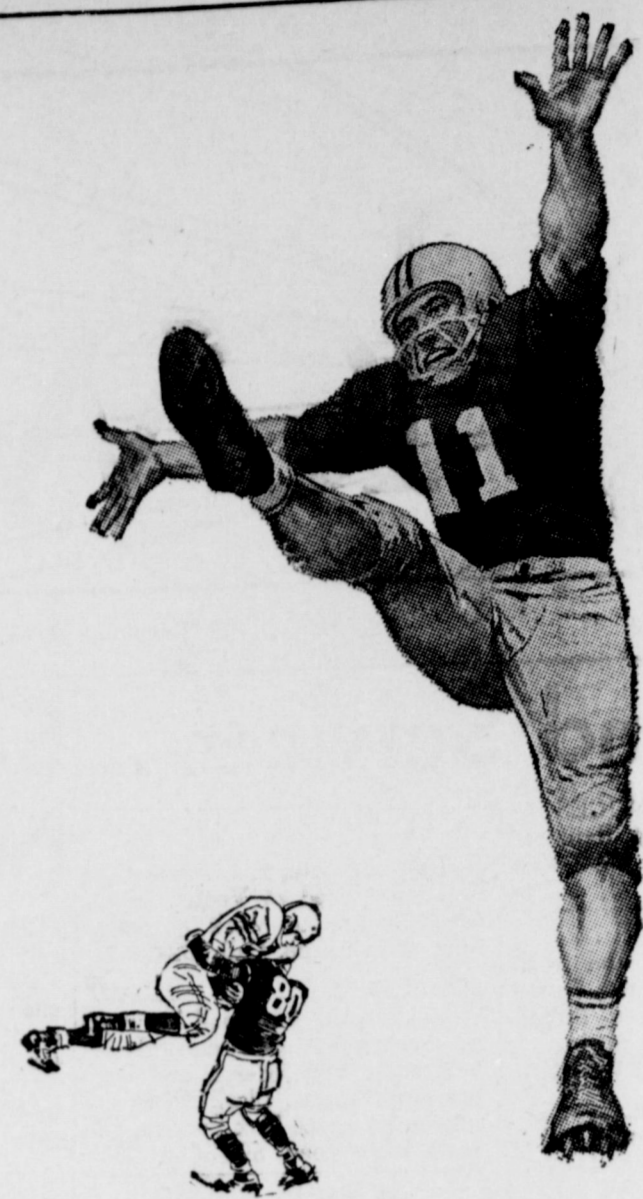

**"Blaze Orange" Could Save Your Life**



Have you ever heard of "early blur"? Put as simply as possible, it's the human tendency to "decide" what an object is, even though it's still too blurred to be seen clearly, and then to cling to that first decision well after the object should be easily recognizable. This phenomenon, magnified by wishful thinking, helps to explain why a sane, sober hunter with good vision can mistake another hunter for a deer.

Luckily, extensive tests have proved that a man-made color, **fluorescent blaze orange**, is probably the hunter's best protection against such accidents. It has always been a primary safety rule for a hunter to wear a color that contrasts sharply with his surroundings, and the fact that blaze orange does not appear anywhere in nature provides this contrast against almost any background.

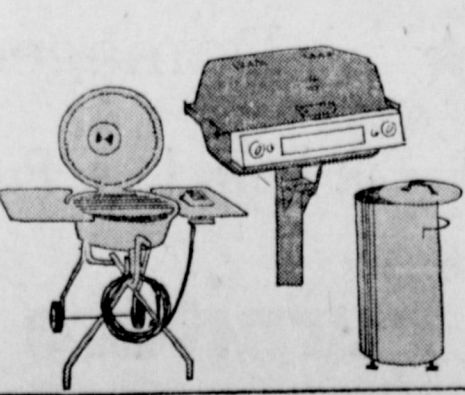
Proof? Several years ago, Massachusetts made it mandatory for deer hunters to wear 200 square inches of fluorescent orange or red. The result was four successive seasons without a single mistaken-for-game casualty—an all-time record for the state.

Blaze orange is just as effective in preventing accidents during other types of hunting, too, by the way. Nuff said?
