## Missionaries on Furlough; Plan Return to Philippine Village

Faith is the word that most accurately describes the character and lives of Sang and Frances Boone, missionaries to the Philippines serving with the New Tribes Mission with headquarters in Woodworth, Wis.

They are living testimonies of how the Lord can use those who are completely dedicated to His will and are happy to go wherever He leads.

Complete dedication is the reason why they have spent four years in the Philippines and three among the 40,000 Kalangoya people, a primitive tribe in Mt. Nueva Vicaya. They are home on furlough and presently visiting Mrs. Boone's mother, Mrs. Myrtice McDonald in Iowa Park.

Sang's mother Mrs. Lela Boone of Riverside Calif., accompanied them here and is visiting relatives in Wichita Falls.

The story of how the Boones became a part of New Tribes Mission is replete with interest and appeal. Living in California in the early 1960's, with both of their daughters grown and married, Sang was general maintenance man for Los Angeles Savings and Loan; and Mrs. Boone was a psychiatric technician.

Prospect of a happy, secure future for the couple was bright, but strangely enough, both felt a void in their lives and an intense desire to go into special Christian service. However, one did not know how the other felt for sometime; and they were exceedingly happy when they finally learned the Christ had given them both the same vision of full-time service.

Conscious of their ages, they knew that they would not be able to serve in many areas of missionary endeavor, so the New Tribes Mission was answer to prayer because it afforded them opportunity they were seeking to project their love for Christ into lives of others—even those who had never before heard the gospel.

They started training in 1962 with six months basic at Jersey Shore, Pa., followed by 6 months boot camp and tropical medicine study at Oveida, Fla. They then went to Waukesha, Wisc., for a year of language study.

The Boones went to Philippines in 1964 and spent their first year in Baguio City, where they studied the Ilocano dialect in preparation to move out among the primitive Kalangoya tribe. Terrain of the village is so rugged that walking is the only means of transportation.

Nine months the couple lived in a native hut with thatched roof, and cooked outdoors, until they could get built their house, for which the natives cut all lumber with holo knives. The home and furnishings are not modern as Americans know modern houses. They have a wood stove sent them by a relative in the US; galvanized tub for baths; plastic over the windows.

Since the Boones are not paid salaries by any board, church or organization, they depend on

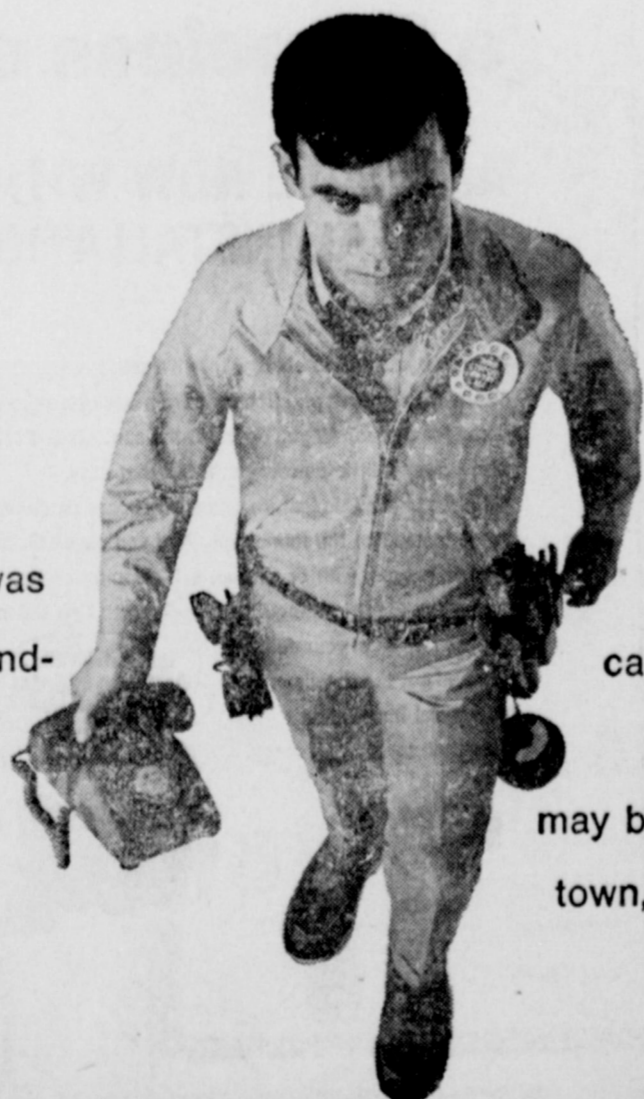

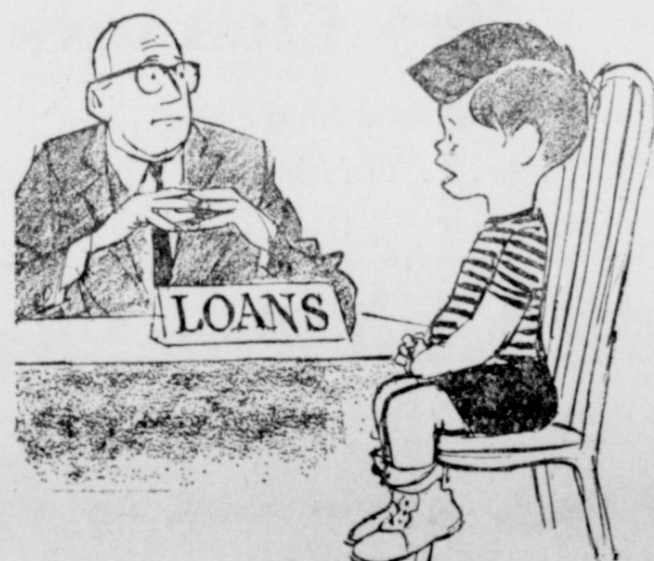

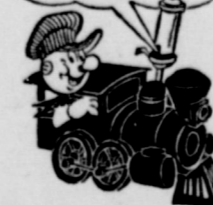
