### ORDINANCE NUMBER 144

An ordinance regulating the construction, enlargement, alteration, repair, removal, and demolition of buildings and structures and certain appurtenances thereto, and changes of occupancy thereof, adopting the Southern Standard Building Code (1965 Edition with 1968 Revision) with certain changes therein and additions thereto; enforcing; repealing all ordinances providing for administration and nances in conflict herewith; and making violation a misdemeanor punishable by fine not exceeding \$200.00.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section I. The book entitled "Southern Standard Building Code 1965 Edition, with 1968 Revision" (a copy of which, authenticated by the signature of the Mayor and the City Secretary, and made a public record by resolution of the City Council, is on file in the City Secretary's Office) is hereby adopted as the Building Official and the City of Iowa Park, as fully as if copied at length of this ordinance, but with the following changes therein:

(1) Section 102.1—Building Official. Sub-section (b) is hereby deleted and the following substituted therefor: The City Secretary of the City of Iowa Park shall serve as the Building Official and be responsible for supervision of the Building Department.

(2) Section 102.3—Deputy is hereby deleted and the following substituted therefor: Deputy—The Building Official may designate as his deputy, the Department of Works Superintendent who shall, during the absence or disability of the Building Official, exercise all the power of the Building Official.

(3) Section 106.2—Contractor's License and Bond is hereby deleted.

(4) Section 111.1—Appointment is hereby deleted and the following substituted therefor: Appointment—The membership of the Iowa Park Planning Commission shall act as the Board of Adjustments and Appeals.

(5) Section 111.2—Term of Office is hereby deleted.

(6) Section 114—Violations and Penalties is hereby deleted and the following substituted therefor: Any person, firm, corporation or agent who shall violate a provision of this code or fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, or who shall erect, construct, alter, demolish or move any structure, or has erected, constructed, altered, repaired, moved or demolished a building or structure, in violation of a detailed statement or drawing submitted and approved thereunder, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Each person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this code is committed, or continued and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punished by assessment of a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00 for each and every such violation.

(7) Amend Section 220.17 by adding paragraph 220.17: Section 220.17—Air Conditioners Projecting Over Sidewalks. All air conditioners projecting over sidewalks shall be substantially supported by and mounted on steel framework securely attached to the building. Such air conditioners and supporting frame work shall be at such height that the lowest portion thereof will be a minimum distance of eight feet above the sidewalk grade.

(8) Amend Section 220.2—Written Application Must Be Filed—by adding paragraphs (f) and (g) thereto:

(f) If utility lines require adjustment, the mover shall furnish written evidence that satisfactory arrangements have been made with the utilities for any required adjustments.

(g) The mover shall present written evidence that all City taxes due have been paid on the property to be moved.

Section II. If any part of this Ordinance, or of the Southern Standard Building Code embodied herein by reference, be held void, such part shall be deemed severable and the invalidity thereof shall not affect the remaining parts of this Ordinance or said Code.

Section III. All other ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed only to the extent of such inconsistency.

Section IV. This Ordinance may be known and cited as the Building Code of 1969.

Introduced and Passed to the First Reading on the 25th day of August, A.D. 1969.
