Seek State Bank

Promoters of a new state bank in Iowa Park have announced they have applied for a charter from the state banking commission.

It would have \$500,000 capital with \$200,000 for operation, and \$200,000 for surplus, and \$100,000 in reserves.

Directors will be Stanley Williamson, Fred Parkov, Glen Miller, Donald Schraam of Iowa Park and C. E. Myers of Kamay.

Williamson said this week "We feel there is a need in the Iowa Park trade area for a new bank. We think there is sufficient population and need." He said the bank will open soon if approved.

Proposed location is in Park West Shopping Center. No dates have been set for hearings on the application.
