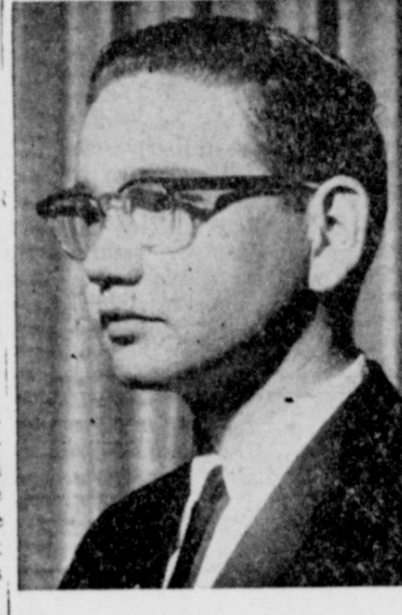

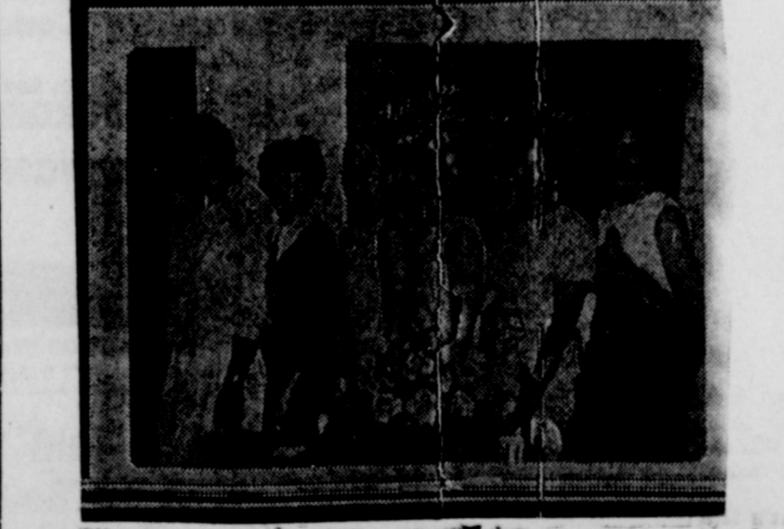

## Former Local Boy Drowns Near Waco While on Fishing Outing

Richard Dykstra, 16, son of Rev. and Mrs. Harold Dykstra of Robinson, drowned in Lake Waco last Thursday afternoon.

An 11th grade student, he went fishing to celebrate first day of summer vacation. It is presumed his line got caught in something and he removed shirt and watch, and he waned in to release it.

His body was found in seven feet of water, and it is believed he took cramps and could not swim.

Richard was born May 13, 1953, in Sioux City, Iowa. He lived in Iowa Park at two different times. He came here with the family in 1957 when his father became minister of Presbyterian church. They moved to Sweetwater in 1959 and returned here in 1963 when his father accepted pastorate of the church a second time.

They moved to Waco in 1967 when Dykstra became minister of Youngblood Memorial Presbyterian church at Robinson.

Funeral service was conducted Saturday in the church, with burial in Robinson cemetery.

Survivors are the parents; three brothers: Jerald of Austin, Larry and Bobby of the home; paternal grandmother Mrs. Henry Dykstra of Grand Rapids, Mich.

## City Council

Iowa Park City Council met with the city planning commission last Thursday night to hear Dallas Graham and Bob Middleton of Planning Associates Inc., and Ed Daniel, director of North Texas planning commission.

Donald Hill brought the Council up to date on plans of the city planning commission.

Graham discussed neighborhood development and suggested it begin here with revitalization of downtown area. He said Iowa Park is eligible for \$990,000 in federal money based on improvements already made which qualify as non-cash credit.

Middleton discussed the six-year capital improvement program for the city.

In its regular meeting session the Council heard request from library board for the city to "adopt" the library. Members decided to study the problem. Second reading regulating numbering of locations in Iowa Park was passed, as was an ordinance regulating mobile homes.

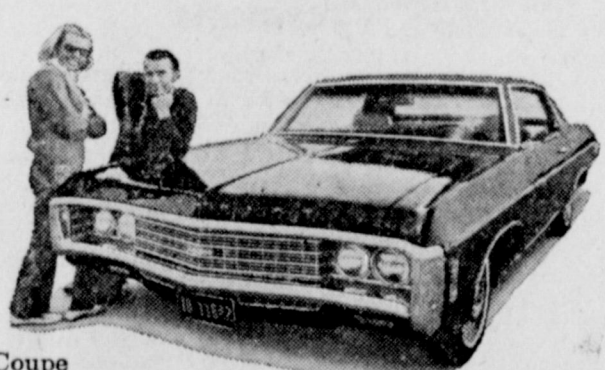

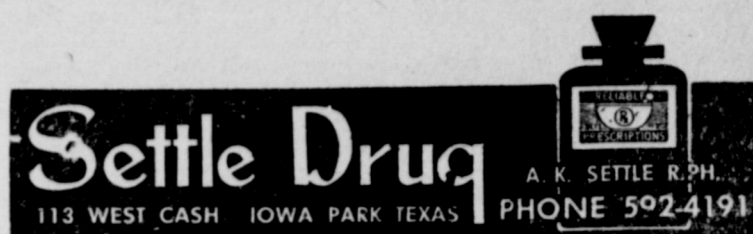

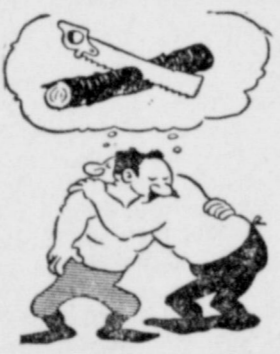

Senior Citizens club enjoyed a salad luncheon Monday noon in United Methodist church fellowship hall.

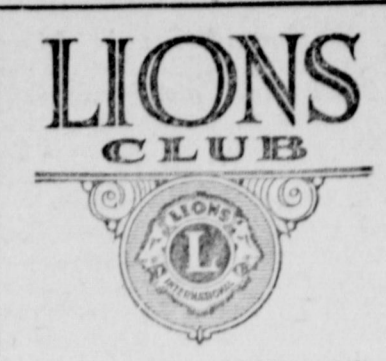
Regular meeting time has been from 2:00 until 4:00 Mondays. Members decided to make this meeting at noon different by having each share in bringing salads, cakes and coffee.
