When the couple returned to Iowa Park after the war, she was employed with Wichita National bank in Wichita Falls for 10 years.

Mrs. Lochridge has served as president of WMU, Modern Music Study club, Iowa Park PTA, 23 Study club. She has also taught Sunday school. Through the years, when need arose in the church for a person to assume responsibility of a special meeting or program, people's minds just naturally turned to Lottie Lochridge. She was program chairman for the 75th Anniversary celebration in 1965 and was chairman of arrangements for Dedication Service of the new sanctuary in 1967.

She is sweetheart of Evening Lions club.

Mrs. Lochridge has a daughter Mrs. Warren McDonald of Dallas, and a son: H. O. Lochridge of Fort Worth; and five grandchildren.

### Local Teacher to Direct Study

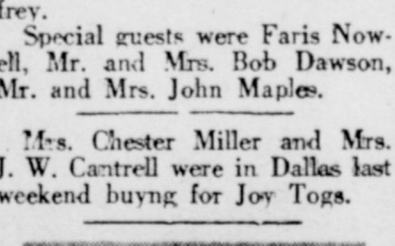

**ORDINANCE NO. 145**

An ordinance providing for the installation and use of electrical equipment in the City of Iowa Park, to be cited as the Electrical Code of the City of Iowa Park; providing for an electrical inspector; providing definitions; providing for contractors, licenses and license fees, electricians and contractors bonds; inspection and permit fees; duties of the inspectors; providing for applications for permits; providing for the use of proper material and making it unlawful to use defective material; providing for the size for circuits and conduits; providing for lights indicating fire escape outlets; providing for meter loops, temporary and outdoor wiring; regulating fixtures; providing a penalty; providing a savings clause and adopting the latest National Electrical Code and repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the City

Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas (Here follows the body of the ordinance, which for the sake of brevity and according to state statute is left out of this publication. Interested parties are invited to see the entire ordinance at the City Hall.)

Section 18. This ordinance shall be cited as the Electrical Code of the City of Iowa Park.

Passed to the first reading this 27th day of October, A.D. 1969.

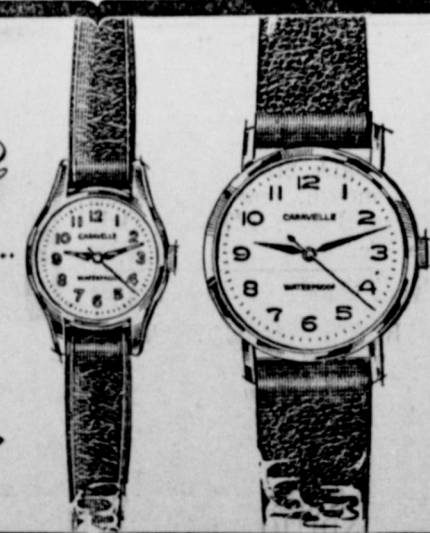

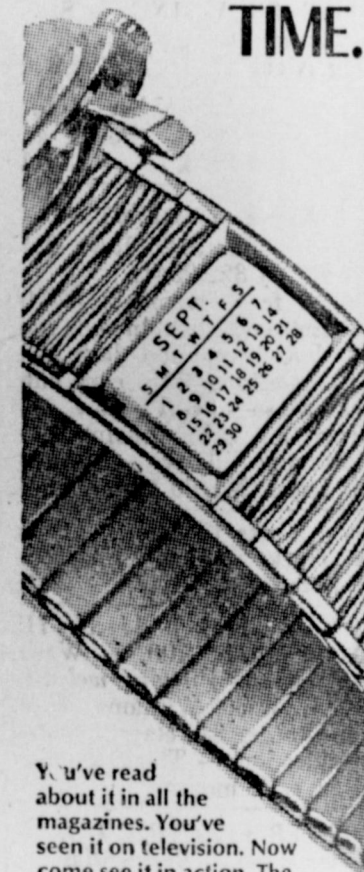

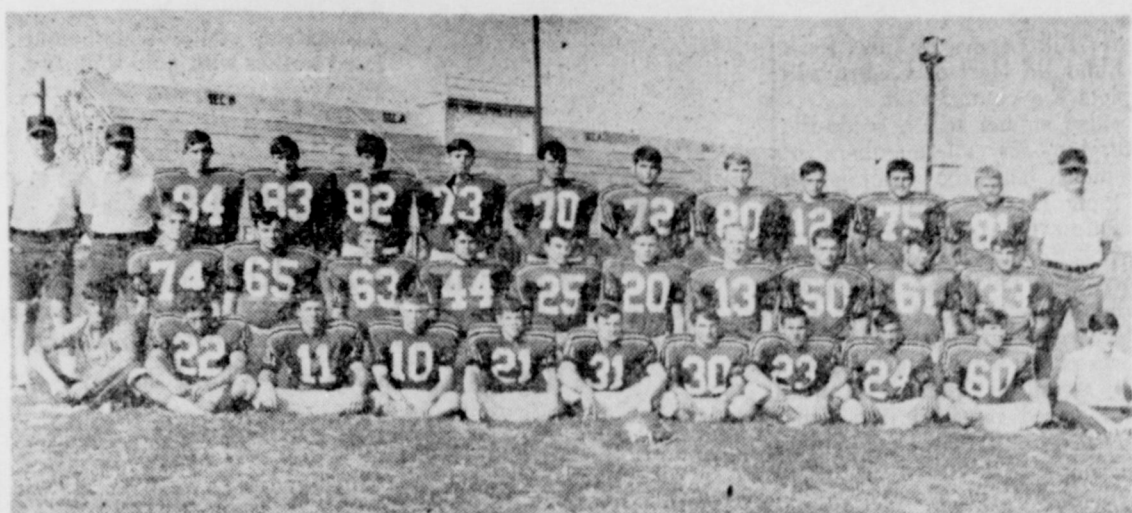
