Bert Van Horn, Former Mayor, Dies in Sleep

R. E. (Bert) Van Horn, who served as mayor of Iowa Park from 1952 to 1960, was found dead at his home about 9:00 Friday night, Aug. 8, by his daughter, Mrs. Lowell Short of Fort Worth, when she arrived for a week end visit.

Born Oct. 5, 1902, in Iowa Park, Bert was graduated from IPHS and attended Tyler business college. He and Miss Anna Belle Estes were married June 3, 1925. She died Oct. 17, 1967.

Van Horn was engaged in farming, and he was a former civilian employee at Sheppard AFB. He was interested in athletics, particularly baseball, and was instrumental in starting Little League baseball here.

Bert was an outstanding high school athlete and later played semi-pro basketball and baseball. He was pitcher for many years for an inter-city baseball team.

During his administration as mayor, Iowa Park started a program of expansion and growth. Northwest section of town was developed and Garden Valley addition was built. One of the streets in residential section bears his name.

Van Horn was member of Presbyterian church, AF&AM 713, Evening Lions club, Volunteer Fire department. He was a flying enthusiast and licensed pilot.

Funeral service was Monday afternoon in Tanner Funeral Home Chapel. Rev. Joe L. Turner of Wichita Falls officiated.

Burial was in Highland cemetery. Pallbearers were J. W. Thomas, Albert Johnson, Earle Denny, Arch Hughes, D. W. Mercer, Buster Reeves. Honorary pallbearers were surviving male members of 1924 graduating class of IPHS, Evening Lions, and city aldermen who served when he was mayor.

Survivors are the daughter; his mother Mrs. Robert S. Van Horn; a sister Mrs. Nile Creacy; three grandchildren, one great-grandchild.

City Council

City Council voted Monday to accept the offer of Wichita Falls to make available inspectors for whom the City will pay \$5 per inspection plus 10c per mile traveling expense.

The City also agreed to make building inspection information available to Nortex regional planning commission for its land use data base.

Southern Building Code was discussed extensively and it was voted to have O. N. Newman, City attorney, to prepare a code for Iowa Park with amendments recommended by the Council.

These included designation of City Secretary as building official, City Superintendent of Works as deputy, City Planning Commission as Board of adjustments and appeals.

It was also voted to pay for supplies for repainting the house of the Water Superintendent and to buy a rebuilt motor for the City sanitation truck.



Mrs. Traylor Retires at Bank

Forty-four years and four months of continuous service with one institution is a record of which not many can boast. Mrs. Elma Traylor can claim that distinction by virtue of her association with State National Bank for that period of time.

Upon retirement last week, Mildred was honored at a party in the directors room and was presented a silver service.

Earlier, women of the bank had honored Mrs. Traylor at dinner in Town and Country Inn of Wichita Falls and presented her a charm.

In 1943 she was promoted to cashier, a position she held until 1960 when she was named assistant vice-president and served in that capacity until retirement.

Mrs. Traylor served with four presidents: the late A. C. Golden, John Hrischi, F. E. Hill and current president C. A. Nipper.

She has worked in three locations, West Cash and North Wall and West Park, present site of State National Bank.

Elmo and Mildred were married on June 15, 1930.

Mrs. Traylor is member of Iowa Park United Methodist church. She was a charter member of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority of which she is an inactive member. She is past worthy matron of Iowa Park chapter Order of the Eastern Star and past president of Iowa Park Organ club. She was named to "Who's Who in America" in 1963-69.

Yield

New rules of right-of-way go into effect Sept. 1 in Texas. All drivers are urged to study the rules carefully and to note the occasions when they MUST stop or yield and grant right-of-way.

Drivers at intersections controlled by stop, yield or traffic control devices must obey the signs.

Drivers on a single lane street or roadway consisting of two traffic lanes, upon approaching an intersection not controlled by signs of a divided street or a street or roadway divided into three or more marked lanes, must stop, yield and grant the privilege of right-of-way to vehicles on the larger street.

Drivers on unpaved streets intersecting a roadway that is paved must stop, yield and grant right-of-way to vehicles on the paved street.

Drivers on streets of equal size and paving must stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any other vehicle which has entered the intersection from such driver's right, or is approaching in such proximity as to constitute a hazard.

The act further provides a rule of evidence that in cases of collision, the person shall have been presumed not to have yielded right-of-way if the four conditions have not been satisfied.

Mod Phones

It's a mod, mod world when the Phone Company outfits its newest creations in mini-circuits. The result: sleek, compact equipment like the new Trimline phone or the petite electronic phone proposed for the 1970's.

Jim Hall, Wichita Falls manager for Southwestern Bell, says development of tiny solid-state circuits have helped clear the way for new compact telephones.

Transistors and other circuit elements are being reduced to almost invisible dimensions. An integrated circuit that contains 20 or more transistors and scores of other components, occupies less space than a single conventional transistor.

Hall said many improvements in communications equipment and systems are on the way here in a matter of months.
