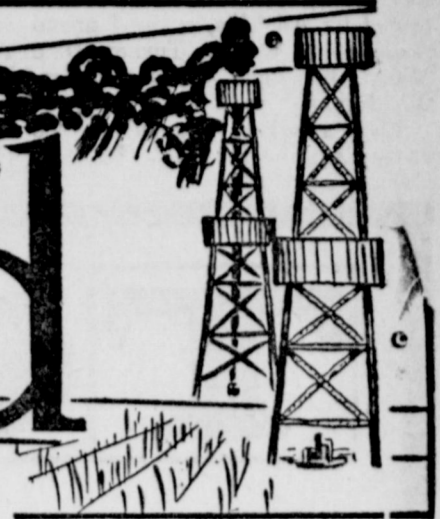

Steve Streich Judged Outstanding Teenager; Record Is Superior



Steve, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Streich, was honored at 23 Study club luncheon last Thursday when named recipient of the 7th annual Outstanding Teenager of the Year award.

He has won more scholastic honors than any other student in history of IPHS. Mrs. T. M. Clark, chairman of youth committee, presented the plaque.

A high school senior, Steve was nominated for the honor by several clubs and individuals. He has made the Double A honor roll consistently during his junior high and senior high career, and was co-valedictorian of junior high graduating class. He now has a grade average of 97.97.

Up to this point in high school, Steve has had a total of eight Who's Who awards in music, algebra, chemistry, Spanish, typing and shorthand. During his sophomore year, Streich won the UIL state typing championship, posting top score of all class schools.

The junior year he won Class AA state shorthand championship, placing second in overall state ranking.

Other honors achieved during his sophomore and junior years included being high point boy in area interscholastic contest sponsored by Texas Department of Public Safety; top speller in district; won 1st and 2nd places on soil conservation essays.

During the current year Streich has been named a National Merit Commended Scholar and declared Outstanding Teenager of America. He is vice-president of local National Honor Society, and was elected recently Mr. Iowa Park High School.

Steve is greatly interested in music. He has been 4-year member of Hawk Band council and Stage Band. He played trombone in All-Region and All-State bands during sophomore and junior years, and All-State symphony orchestra this year.

He has received two 1st division ratings at State solo and ensemble contests for trombone solo.

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## Phil McClendon Praised for Aid Given Dying Child in Germany

Overseas Weekly has a project of choosing a serviceman for its "Good Guy Award" and gives the honored person a \$25 savings bond. Recently the publication had the following story and carried a picture of Sp4 Phillip McClendon of Iowa Park:

The broken body of a 5-year-old German child lay in the spring sunshine. Around him stood a crowd of passive onlookers—too shocked, frightened or indifferent to get involved. Only one man had the courage and simple humanity to step forward—this week's OW Good Guy, Sp4 Phillip McClendon.

"No one was doing anything for him," the VII Corps trooper said later. "He was just lying there on the ground and people were standing around talking and looking."

The boy had been hit by a German car between Scharnhausen and Nellingen, where 20-year-old McClendon is stationed as an air traffic controller with the 4th Avn Co.

A German youngster explained to McClendon what had happened and asked in broken English if he'd take the victim to a hospital.

"I knew the boy was in bad shape when I first saw him," said McClendon, "but I couldn't just sit there and let him die beside the road."

### From a Handout to a Leg Up!

The CARE package, which started out carrying food overseas to save needy people from starvation, has become a lot of other things:

A new school. A fresh water supply. A community center. A health center. A road. Tools for farming. Tools for job training. And a whole string of et ceteras.

In short, while the fight on hunger goes on unabated, the CARE package has advanced from a handout to a leg up to self-sufficiency. And recipients of the aid are now "partners" in the process of bringing whole communities to a higher level of development. Here's how it works:

In signed "partnership" agreements with CARE, national and local governments commit definite funds and services which are joined with like contributions from CARE donors.

Community groups pledge to give all possible local materials and volunteer labor. A CARE man administers the project and uses funds contributed by Americans to buy whatever else is needed.

work tools, cement, hardware, roofing, tanks, pumps, and doors.

Thirty-four such contracts in 14 countries of Asia, Africa and Latin America have been signed or await signature, calling for \$524,000 in local funds, \$2,344,000 in CARE materials.

Here are some things that will result this year: in Honduras, 400 school classrooms; in Guatemala, pure water for 30 villages plagued by polluted water supplies; in Chile, elementary school graduates trained as cabinet makers in 90 new workshops.

For the people and nations helped, the partnership spurs initiative and further growth on their own. For CARE donors, their dollar provides maximum aid that breaks the tragic cycle of hunger, poverty, illiteracy and disease.

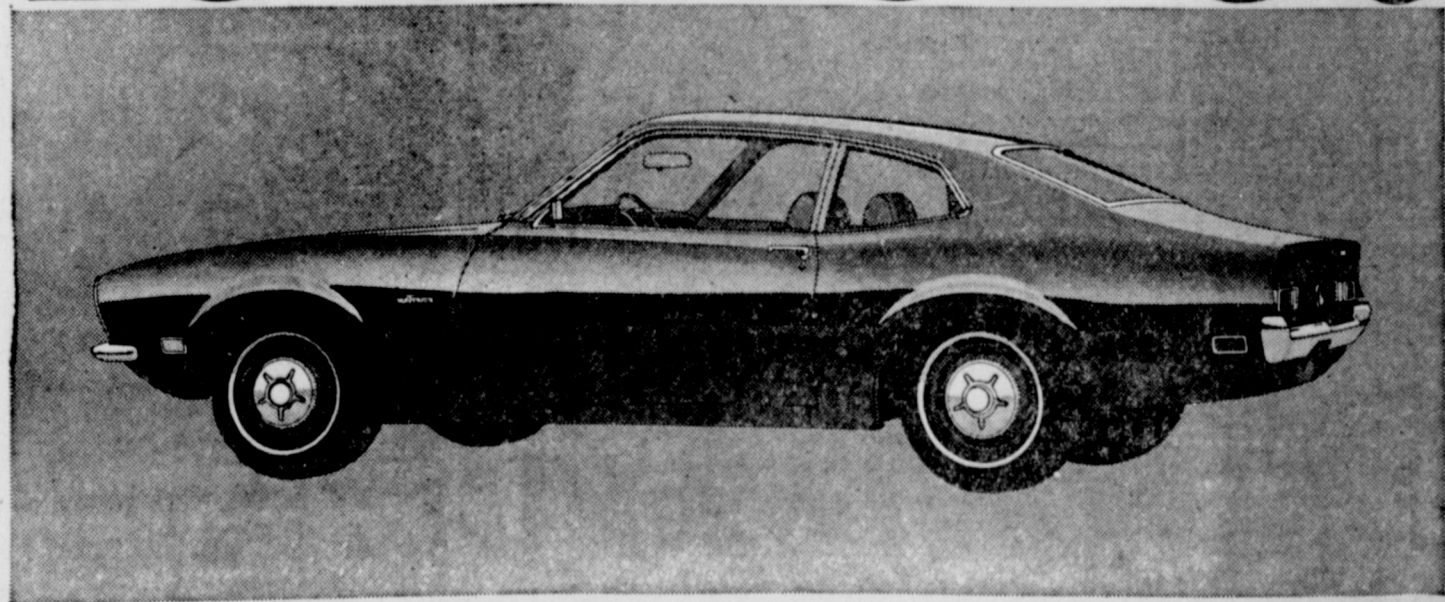

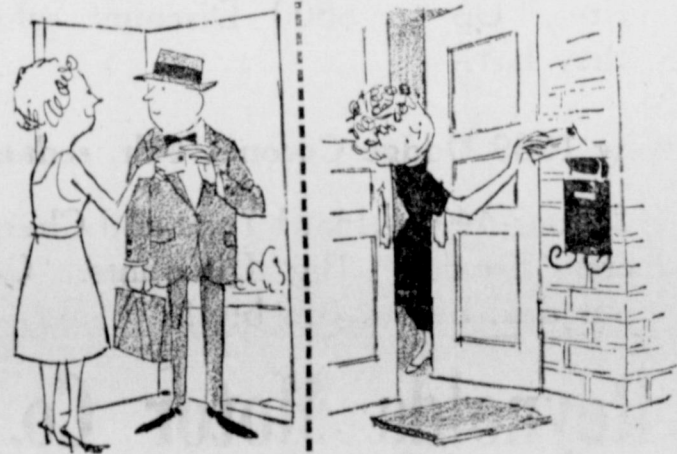

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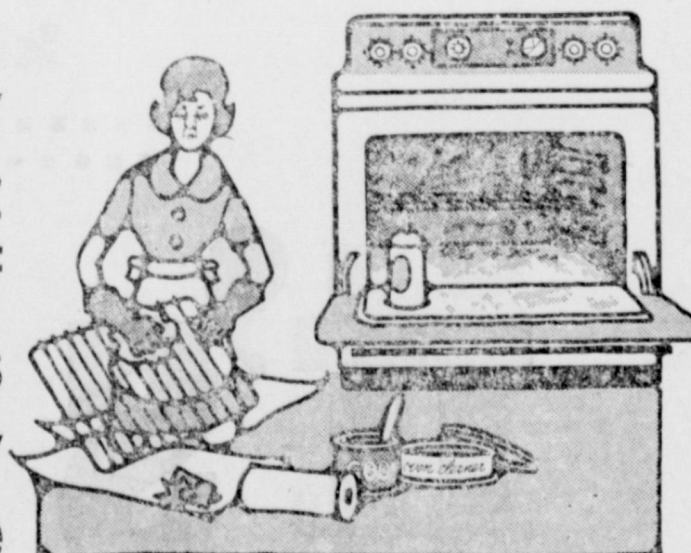
