Single isolated mobile homes set up outside mobile home parks are on the same basis as the conventional home of lumber or brick; that is, the usual permits amounting to \$10 or \$15 depending on size and value of the home, plus water

meter deposit of \$10. If water and sewer taps have not been made there is additional cost for taps, but if mains have been tapped this does not apply.

It is required that mobile home come off the wheels to put it on same basis as a conventional home, that it, taxable and permanent.
