Douglas Wilks Details Life at Texas Lions Camp Near Kerrville

Recent letter from Douglas Wilks to his parents Mr. and Mrs. K. G. Wilks will serve to remind Lions club members and the general public of the important place they are filling in our society.

Douglas is receiving training at Lions Camp for the Blind at Kerrville.

His letter describes briefly the training offered at camp, where he has been about two weeks.

Wilks, 27 years old, started losing his sight about a year ago due to diabetic retinopathy. He had been a route man for Rawson Drug Co. of Dallas in Vernon, Abilene and Mineral Wells areas. He is a graduate of Wichita Falls senior high. He has a four-year-old son.

Training for one day described by Douglas starts with home maintenance; then crafts in which he has made a link leather belt; then practice in mobility. After lunch he took techniques of daily cooking, manners, watching etc.

From there he went to typing,

which he especially enjoys. Last period of the day is devoted to braille class.

Before the first week had passed Wilks was scheduled to start learning to read braille and to go into town with the mobility. He said he had been swimming in the camp pool with two lifeguards on duty. Later the group will make trips to San Antonio every day for about two weeks for additional mobility training.

Douglas will be at Kerrville for about five months and then go to some other school for more training. The camp has about 500 acres and is located four miles from town on Highway 27.

Douglas praised the instructors, workers and trainees at camp.

The day he to his parents, he had learned the American Foundation for the Blind has Braille insulin syringes and that two different types of insulin can be used in them at the same time. He intends to have his physician order one for him in case he needs it later in life.

City Council

City Secretary K. G. Wilks says there is a rumor that the City is charging \$100 per mobile home or trailer home to set up in Iowa Park. This is not true. Single isolated mobile homes set up outside mobile home parks are on the same basis as the conventional home of lumber or brick; that is, the usual permits amounting to \$10 or \$15 depending on size and value of the home, plus water meter deposit of \$10.

If water and sewer taps have not been made there is additional cost for taps, but if mains have been tapped this does not apply.

It is required that mobile home come off the wheels to put it on same basis as a conventional home, that it, taxable and permanent.

Only one home to a lot may be permitted to avoid undue crowding. The \$100 charge is made annually for the Mobile Home Park of 10 or more homes; not the isolated mobile home.

To avoid confusion and erroneous reports, ask City Hall, or read the ordinance.

Mr. Wilks also said all building in the City must now be done in accord with Southern Standard Building Code as amended by the City Council. Any question in regard to the building code can be directed to the City Secretary and city office personnel.

Voters Reject Both Proposals

Iowa Park voters defeated the two special proposals in the election Saturday.

Neighborhood re-development agency was not accepted 404 to 245. The zoning ordinance was defeated 343 to 302.

"We're disappointed that the issues did not pass," said Donald Hill, chairman of the planning board. "I don't think our people ever fully understood what we were proposing."

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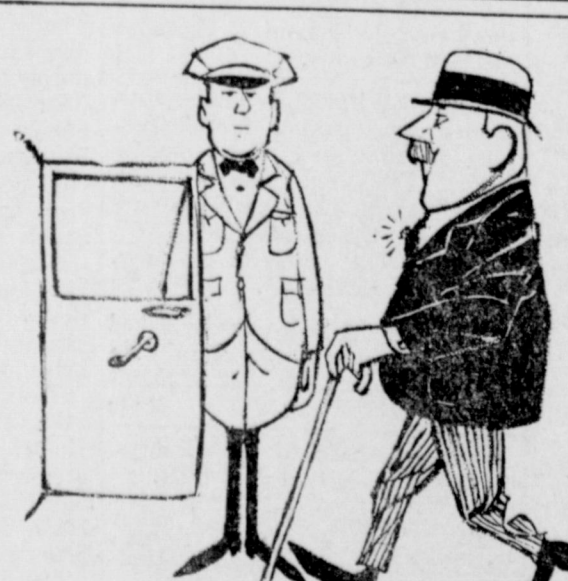

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Antiques, Collections, Home Arts Make Reaves Family Fun

Mrs. Reaves does not have to hide things behind doors because they are unsightly. The coffee pot decorated and filled with gerani-

ums, which serves as a door prop between living room and kitchen, suggests there are intriguing objects behind the door. And there are — brooms, not the ordinary kind because these have handles covered with papier mache; and a skillet which Buster's late grandparents used for frying eggs. They would hardly recognize it now, sprayed and decorated with permanent flowers.

In the cabinet area are a card file decorated and filled with colorful hors d'oeuvre picks; and an egg beater sprayed black and decorated with a cluster of grapes. There also are jeweled candy jars, wastebaskets, cheese boxes antique and lined with quilted materials, a tall candleholder fashioned from bedpost, nest flowers made from egg cartons and crepe paper.

Mrs. Cannaday gave program on "Safety in the Home."

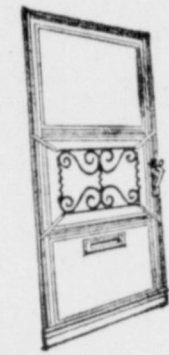

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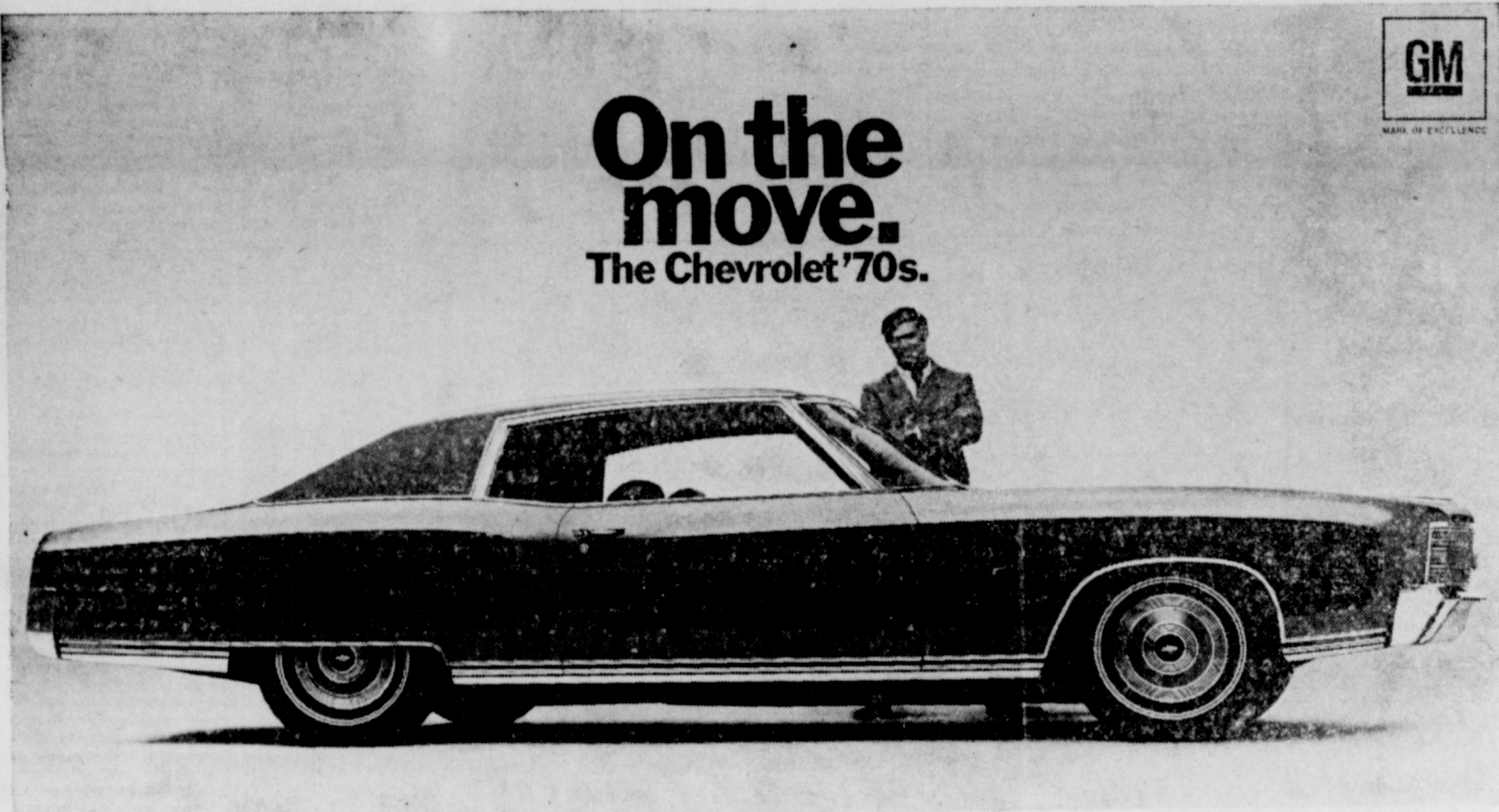
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
