Mrs. Quick Retires from Class Room Teaching after 25 Years

"From my earliest childhood my ambition was to teach school, and I don't remember ever considering any other profession." Mrs. J. Louis Quick stated when she made public her decision to retire after having taught for 25 years, with 23 of those being in Iowa Park.

Consensus of school administrators, fellow teachers, parents, students and friends is that it is extremely difficult to think of Agnes apart from the classroom. She loves children and her desire for each to do his best and develop his capabilities to the fullest has been reflected in her work and attitude each day she has taught.

Through the years, she has always been one of the first teachers at school each morning, and she would start getting her room in readiness for each new school term several weeks before the opening day. She always had lesson plans made out, report cards ready and papers graded ahead of time.

Many parents, observing her conscientious efforts, looked forward to having their children under her tutelage, and many who have not seen their dream realized received news of Mrs. Quick's resignation with great disappointment.

John Sibley, principal at Bradford school, paid tribute to her:



"Mrs. Quick is an outstanding Christian teacher dedicated to the profession. Her influence has helped to shape the lives of Iowa Park students for 23 years, and she has made a notable contribution to the school and community."

Mrs. Quick is daughter of Mrs. C. C. Fields and the late Mr. Fields. She was graduated from IPHS and received a BA degree from Baylor university.

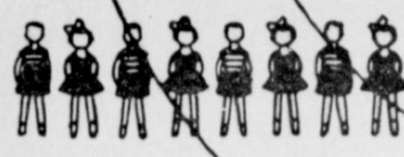
Party for Gerry

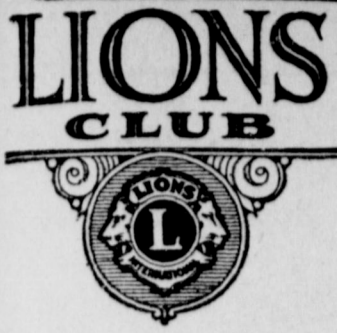

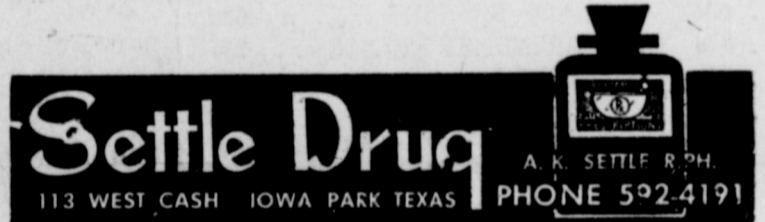

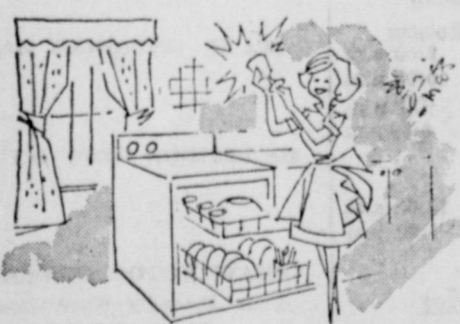
