

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

The 12-page report of charts, graphs and text summarizes an exhaustive state-by-state survey. The survey's purpose was to esti-mate how much "each of the states shared immediately in the benefits from the \$1,221,350,000 worth of commodities exported by the United States to Japan in


Texas with \$105 million worth of commodities was the top ex-porter, but every other state made substantial shipments (see

The report points out that, al-though Japan is fairly well known as our best customer second only to Canada, not many Americans realize the nature and value of exports to Japan from

their own state.

The 10 chief commodities exported to Japan in 1957 were (in ported to Japan in 1957 were (in millions of dollars): Iron and steel mill products \$241.1, Raw cotton \$217.3, Industrial machinery \$121; Grains \$113, Soybeans & other oilseeds \$63, Petroleum & products \$59.1, Bituminous coal \$53.3, Copper & products \$49.4, Chemicals \$36.7, Inedible animal oils \$19.6.

In releasing these figures, the Trade Council made two important points: First, that Japan's U. S. purchases have shot up dramatically, by 200 per cent, since 1950 — and not simply in several but in all categories of products; second, that Japan in 1957 bought more than twice as much from, as it sold to, the United States.

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



Each of the boys, aged 14 to 18, participated in a driving test supervised by a state driving examiner and competed in a short economy run which dem-onstrated that careful driving is economical, too. They also took the standard California driver's written examination.

After scoring the tests, an examiner remarked, "These boys really know the motor vehicle code book. Only four per cent failed, and most of the errors were on questions dealing with recent changes in California driving laws."

A California Highway Patrol officer explained his interest in the program this way: "We're eager for any opportunity to work with prospective drivers. We like to get them young before they have a chance to develop incorrect driving habits or attitudes.

"There's another thing, too," he added. "After we spend the day working with these boys, they realize we're their friends. That's a healthy attitude which helps us tremendously in our work."

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
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
