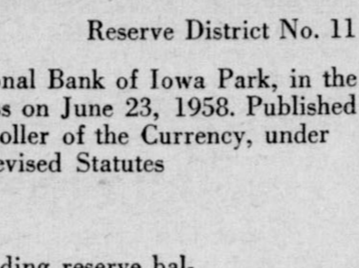

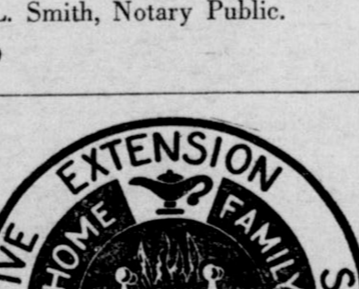

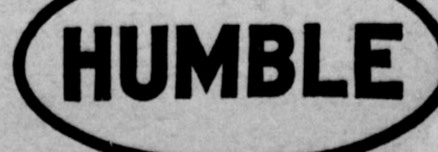

RODEOS may be nothing new out West, but a recent "Teenage Road-e-o" in Inglewood, Calif., involving cars instead of horses gave viewers an entirely new slant on young drivers. Safety officials, police and parents discovered that youngsters today are taking their driving seriously. As one parent put it, after witnessing 700 Los Angeles area Explorer Scouts demonstrate their driving skills, "Teenagers today really are being 'taught' to drive as opposed to the haphazard manner in which we 'picked it up.'"

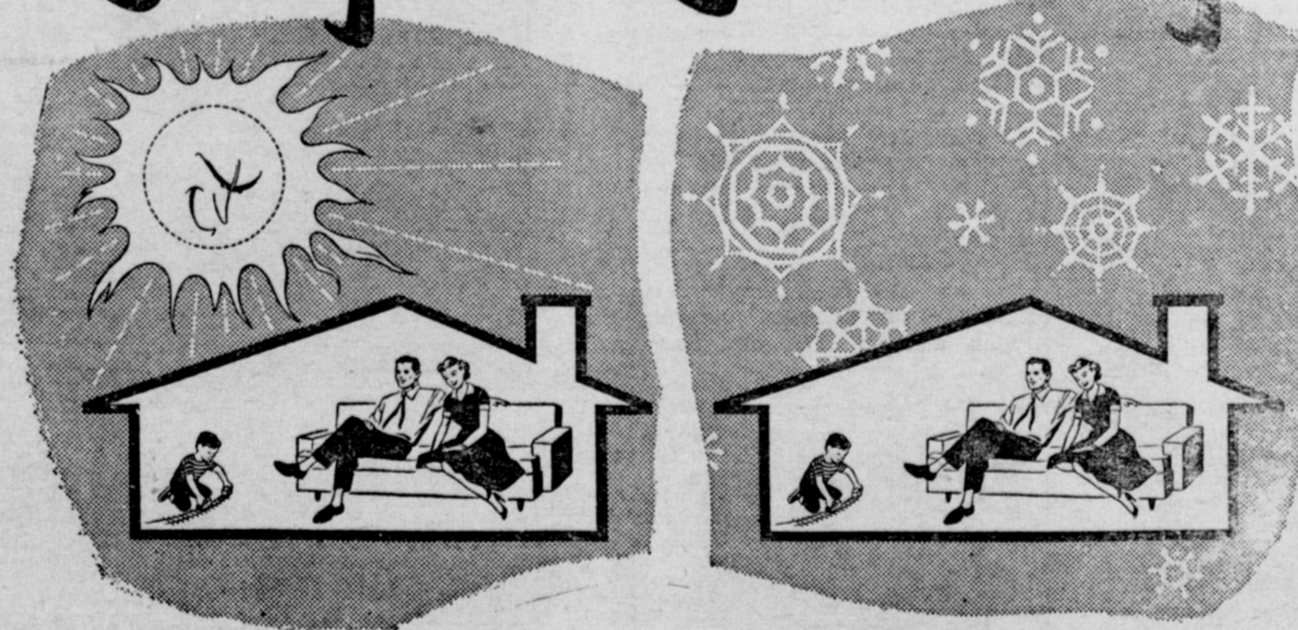
