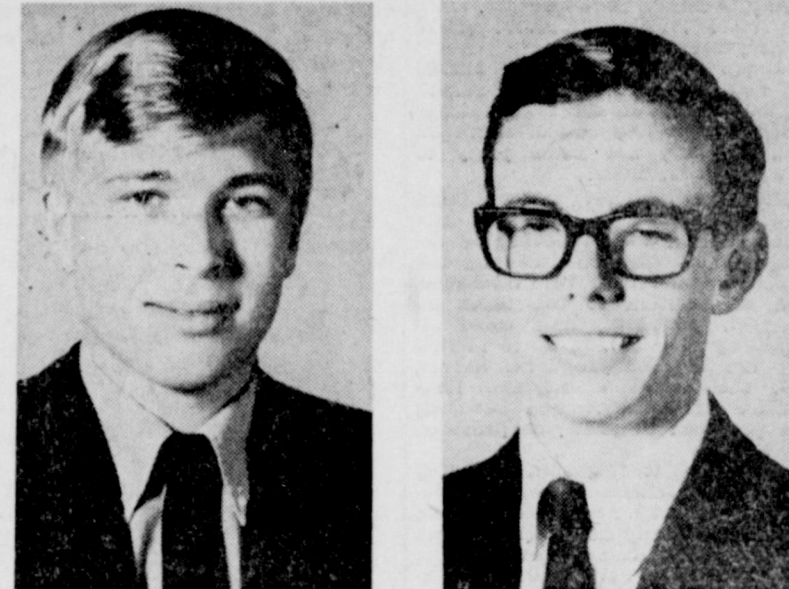

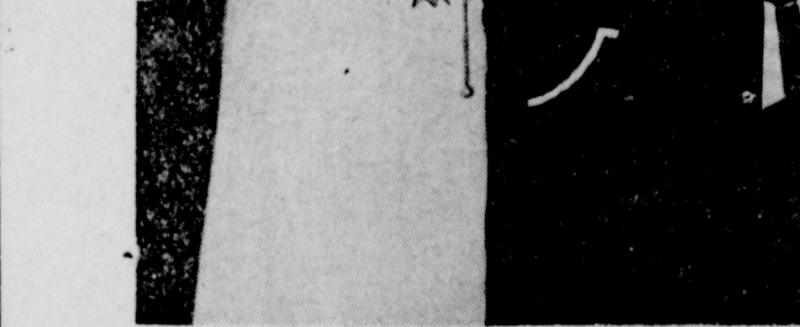
People from Florida, Missouri and Colorado visited the cemetery last week, attracted by the lavish display of bluebonnets.

City Council

Mayor E. F. Soell and city aldermen discussed briefly the budget and possible pay raises for city employees during the next fiscal year, at a meeting of City Council, Monday night.

The mayor requested the group to project studies for capital outlay items.

Action taken included adoption of an ordinance abandoning 37.5 feet on each side of the street on East Park from Block 74 east to the city limits and back to Block 81; passing of first reading of ordinance dealing with correcting erroneous house numbers in use to eliminate confusion in city and post office records; and final passage of the ordinance providing a penalty for violation of the anhydrous ammonia ordinance.

The council approved an agreement between Lone Star Gas Co. and the state highway department to run a gas line under Highway 237 west of the city.

A letter was read from Texas Water Quality Board in Austin proposing to give Iowa Park a free survey of the sewer system and plant.

It was voted to extend the curfew hour to 1:00 a.m. May 29 in compliance with a request of IPHS junior class; and to lift the curfew for members of the senior class only May 30, at the same time reserving the Youth Center for their use exclusively that night.

Mayor Soell announced meeting of Planning Commission on May 16 and urged attendance.

Warning Issued to Builders

In view of some buildings exceeding the cost of \$25 having been moved into or to another section of the city without permit, City administration deems it advisable to call attention to a City ordinance regarding the above.

This ordinance states that any building above \$25 built, added on, or moved in requires a permit from the City. This applies to new buildings, additions or buildings moved in or to different sections of town.

A surveyor's certificate must be presented to the city secretary along with application for building permit.

The ordinance is available at City Hall to any person who would like to read it. A builder or mover who violates the ordinance is subject to a fine not to exceed \$100.

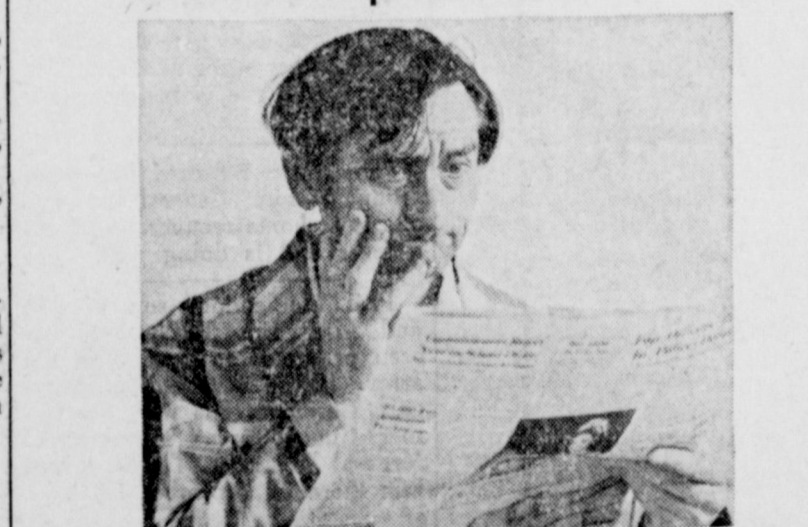
