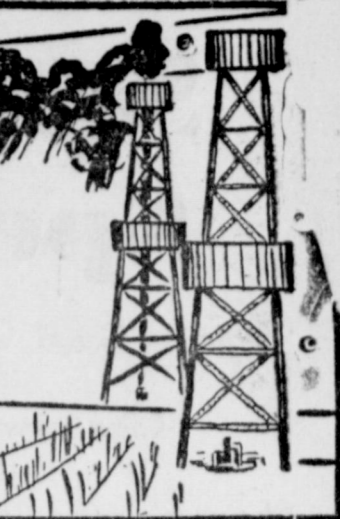

Iowa Park Youth Plan River Mission Trip to South Texas Churches

Eight adults and 23 young people of First Baptist church will leave Iowa Park on Saturday, May 31, at 6:00 a.m. for South Texas to participate in the Rio Grande Ministry. They will return June 10.

Following a devastating hurricane which hit the South Texas area in 1967, Texas Baptist convention set up a department to co-ordinate work of Baptist churches in helping Rio Grande ministry in helping build structures, conducting Vacation Bible Schools, assisting with Literacy Training, and giving medical attention.

The Iowa Park group chose to give up a trip to Gloria this summer and to participate in the River Ministry. They will work at Riviera and Ricardo and will stay at Riviera, camping in tents and cooking out of doors. The church will pay for cost of food and transportation.

The young people have been training for six weeks for the work they will do. They have studied the book "Witness, Take the Stand" by Ralph Neighbour, and have prepared themselves to conduct Vacation Bible Schools. In the primarily Latin American towns, the young people will conduct a door to door visitation program Sunday, June 1, and invite to the VBS, Monday thru Friday.

Both churches will participate in a youth-led revival at 8 p.m. June 3 thru 6. The Young People's Crusade Choir will be directed by Loyd Chumley, music director of First Baptist church.

Iowa Park young people will visit Corpus Christi and Padre Island on June 7, and sing at Retama Park Baptist church of Kingsville on Sunday, June 8, when Rev. Kenneth Flowers will deliver the sermon.

On the return trip they will eat lunch at San Marcos Baptist academy and visit the aquarena Monday. They will sing at Buckner's Boys Ranch at Burnet and visit Longhorn Caverns, Tuesday.

Plaintiff prays that Defendant be cited to appear and answer this petition that on final hearing the Plaintiff and Defendant's said marriage be declared null and void and of no force and effect and for such other relief, in law and in equity, to which Plaintiff may show herself justly entitled, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.
