Maudie Owens Writes Farewell as She Retires from Teaching

Now that I am officially retired, I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the many kindnesses extended by my superintendent, Mr. Keith Swim, my principal, Mr. James Elms, my fellow teachers, the members of the Board of Education, all of my students and parents—all those who have made my 12 years in the Iowa Park school system most happy ones.

Especially am I grateful for your evidences of affection and concern during my recent illnesses. I cherish the messages from far places from former students and friends as well as the cards, gifts, letters, flowers, visits from those nearer. Words cannot express my gratitude for all this, and especially for the prayers. As my brother says, I am the living proof of the power of prayer.

Truly, there is not a profession more rewarding than that of teaching. The love returned more than repays for long hours of labor and anxiety. My regret is that I may have unthoughtfully neglected to inspire some youngster to become the best possible for him.

Teachers have a grave responsibility. We touch many lives; and, consciously or unconsciously, influence many people. It behooves us to be ever conscious of our own behavior. That is the reason every teacher should be a Christian—for to love Christ is to love your fellow man; and certainly the successful teacher must have love.

Iowa Park is indeed fortunate to have teachers with high standards, moral precepts, and religious convictions.

That is one advantage of living in a small town. All of us, parents and teachers, hold check on one another's behavior. Sometimes we resent that, but perhaps it does make us think. And certainly any public servant can expect it. This check is also good for our children. One will refrain from actions which "Mrs. Gossipy" might run to tell Mother, for fear both of shame and punishment.

Parents and teachers alike must continue to instill in the growing child (you can't wait till he is 16 to do this) love for his family, love and pride in his community, and pride and gratitude for his country. That child, too, will assume responsibilities in these institutions, responsibilities which are too often shirked by adults.

Again, the basic foundation for good citizenship is a Christian character. It's an obvious truth, but it bears repeating: Life is a continuous battleground. Therefore, the one who would survive its vicissitudes should have a constant source of faith and fortitude.

Perhaps we are mistaken in stressing to our children results: grades, games, etc. The important

thing is HOW the result was determined. Most of the parents of this community are devoted to their children. You evidence it in many ways. May I caution you about doing TOO much for them? May I urge you to be as concerned about the workable knowledge your child receives in a subject—English, for instance — as the grade? May I urge you to laud the student who brings honor to his school and community through study and perseverance as much as the one who does so by physical prowess?

If our facilities for teaching physical education exceed those of our science department (and you have EXCELLENT teachers in both fields), it is because the patrons desire such unequal expenditures. Back your superintendent and your Board of Education (theirs is often such a difficult and thankless task) in creating facilities for less crowded grade and junior high school classes and for high standards of achievements in ALL fields of activity.

Your athletic teams and your school band are indispensable, but your academic subjects are no less important. Let me illustrate from my own experience. I taught public school music for seven years. EVERYONE wanted his child to appear correctly, have a costume, and win honor for himself and the school. We received acclaim far and wide. In that same school, I taught junior high school English. SO FEW cared whether Johnny learned to say "I have no pencil" instead of "I ain't got no pencil." Attainment was not desired in this academic subject.

I cannot close this without a dream for the future—this expansion: Utilize the present classrooms for elementary and junior high—that would include grades one through nine. Then, on the property you already own, erect classrooms for tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades. Thus you could utilize for all grades the present cafeteria, shop building and your beautiful new plant which includes the band hall and gymnasium.

Further, aspire to a new auditorium which can be used for school AND civic purposes.

In looking over the brochure on Iowa Park, I am reminded of the VIGOR of our community as represented by its ten committees, nine churches, fourteen civic organizations, and its ever-growing school plant. There is no limit to the future of this town I love, whose citizenry now embraces many of "my" boys and girls. I shall always cherish you and pray for continued blessings to you.

Certainly I have been abundantly blessed by you.

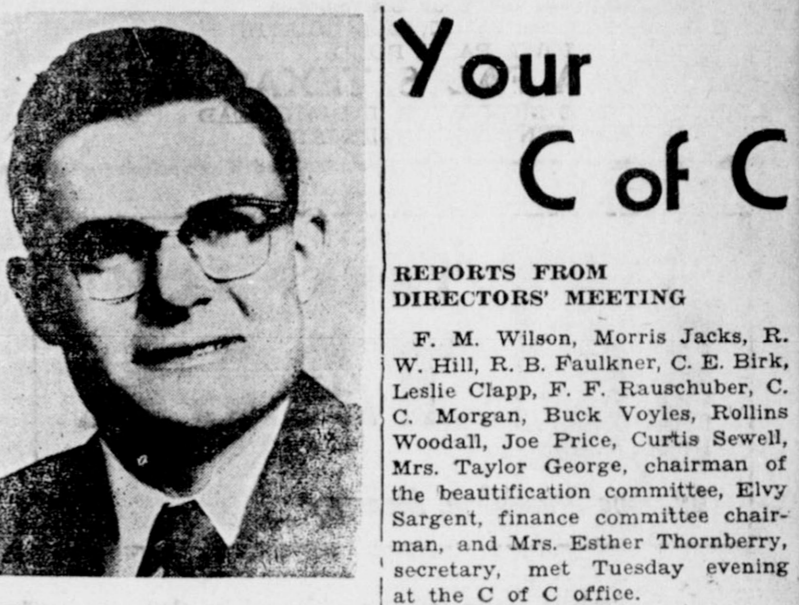

PROPOSED AMENDMENT to the State Constitution, which will be voted on November 4, was brought before the directors for discussion. The amendment calls for spending money for advertising Texas, regarding historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas. The following letter was sent our district senator Cotton Moffett, Chillicothe:

"Dear Senator Moffett:

"At our Chamber of Commerce Director's Meeting August 19th, most were opposed to the proposed amendment to the State Constitution which will be voted on November 4th.

"The discussion pointed out that since the Texas Treasury is in debt already, and since every Texan is the world's best promoter of Texas wherever he goes, Texas does not need to spend money to advertise its state.

"Texas' vast land, water and natural resources are known all over the United States. The moment you step out of Texas, you start advertising when they see you are from Texas.

"All were also in favor of cutting out unnecessary spending and getting Texas out of debt.

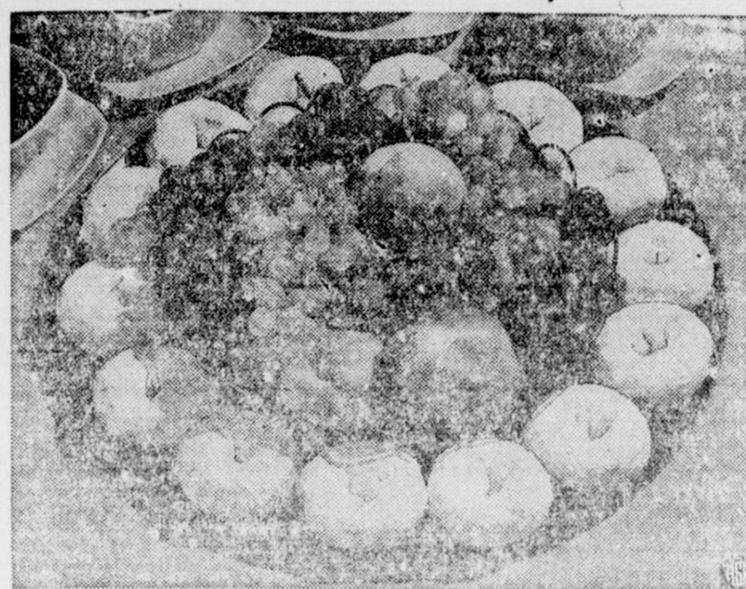
With most of the all-star games out of the way, it is now time to get in the mood for schoolboy football.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows: 'Section 5. (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two political districts, one to be coterminous with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries now exist or as they may hereafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coterminous with Wichita County.'

Don't Test Laws Of Other States

By Jeanne Smith, Dodge Safety Consultant. MOTORISTS who have an urge to treat lightly the traffic laws of states in which they are touring should think seriously of what could happen to them.

Most state and local police won't excuse your violation of their laws just because you are a visitor. And there still are 31 states in which you must pay a fee to the local justice of the peace for traffic violations.

In most of the states using the fee system the motorist must also pay court costs if found guilty. It is unlawful to park on the highway in all states except Georgia, Rhode Island and Washington, D. C.

You must dim your headlights upon meeting a car at night in all states. In Louisiana and Montana, the law requires that you dim lights when following a car as well. Spotlights are prohibited in Louisiana and Montana.

Motorists must come to a complete stop at a railroad crossing in Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Oregon, Tennessee and the District of Columbia.
