He had been retired from the railroad several years.







Don't Test Laws Of Other States By Jeanne Smith, Dodge Safety Consultant

MOTORISTS who have an urge to treat lightly the traffic laws of states in which they are tour-ing should think seriously of what could happen to them.

Most state and local police won't excuse your violation of their laws just because you are visitor. And there still are 31 states in which you must pay a fee to the local justice of the



pay court costs if found guiltyso it's wise to check the laws in each state in which you plan to drive—and obey them. Speeding is the visitor's number one offense-and there are

only six states in which you can plead "ignorance of the law." All states now have posted maximum highway driving speeds except six where speed must be kept "reasonable and prudent." Here are a few other pointers

to remember when traveling from state to state. Coasting in neutral is prohibited in almost all states. It is unlawful to park on the highway in all states except Georgia, Rhode Island and Wash ington, D. C.

You must dim your headlights upon meeting a car at night in all states. In Louisiana and Montana, the law requires that you dim lights when following a car as well. Spotlights a prohibited in Louislana and Maine.

Motorists must come to a complete stop at a railroad crossing in Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky Louisiana, Oregon, Tennessee and the District of Columbia.

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:
"Section 5 (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries now exist or as they may hereafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (1500.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (1500.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the coundaries of the City of Amarillo.

"If such tax is authorized, no politicing of the city of th

lution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cents (764) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of their anticipatory character."

See 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tussday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all hellots shall have printed thereon:

WHERE TO FIND A HUSBAND

Alaska has been experiencing some phenominal growth, populationwise. Between the 1940 and 1950 censuses the population increased by 77%, five times the rate of the continental U.S.

About two-thirds of this increase was accounted for by natural causes-excess of births over deaths -and about one-third by net immigration. The birth rate is onethird larger than in the U. S., and the death rate is only a little more than half.

This, the A. C. of C. modestly concedes, is due not to the climate but to the fact that most people in Alaska are younger than in the U.S. The median age is 26 years, five years below that of the U.S.

There are no large cities in Alaska, mainly because three people live in the country for every city dweller, a reversal of the U. S. ratio. Anchorage is the largest city with a population of 32,000, and Fairbanks is second with 16,000. Juneau, the capital, and Ketchikan each have less than 10,000.

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
