community or state. The President's Committee for Traffic Safety has termed improvement of driver licensing standards as a prime target for action by women. On a com-

munity level Miss Smith women' en urged to campaign for the following program: driver education courses as a prerequisite to licensing; more rigid physical examinations, driving vocation authority by motor vehicle administrators so that repeat violators will be taken off the highway, and an adequate number of personnel to administer last year's seniors are planning examinations and driver improvefor the coming year:



REASON AND REVELATION

by GLENN OWEN

"Paul's Answer to Peter's Question"

Peter asks, "What shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God?" (1 Pet. 4:17). Paul says, "And to you who are troubled, rest with us, when the Lord Jesus shall be revealed from heaven with his mighty angels, in flaming fire taking vengeance on them that know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ: who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of his power" (2 Thess. 1:7-9).

That is a plain answer to a plain question. No one can be in doubt about now he stands with God if he does not opey the gespel. Peter did not ask what would be the end of those who did not get religion. That might suggest that God is at least half responsible for man's failure to be saved. Peter puts all the responsibility on man, and asks, "What shall be the end of them that obey not the gospel of God?" Obedience to the gospel removes a man's guilt, puts him into Christ, and prepares him

Man cannot neglect with impunity anything that God commands. Paul asks the question, "now shall we escape, if we neglect so great a salvation?" There is something to escape, what is it? It is punishment and it cannot be escaped by alsobedience. What is the penalty of disobedience? Paul says it is "everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord and the glory of his power." That sounds like severe penalty for doing nothing, but it is as the Lord has directed. The greatest thing that a man has to do in life is to get ready to meet God in the judgment. And the only way to do it is to obey the gospel. Men have offered a lot of substitutes and short-cuts, but not a single one of them will work.

What then is the gospel? It is the good news of Jesus the Son of God. It is the thing that Jesus told his apostles and disciples to preach (Mark 16:15-16). The gospel is the truth. It is the word of God. Men can only be saved by obeying the truth. God is a Spirit and must be worshipped in spirit and in truth. The creeds and manuals of men can only lead to eternal destruction. The gospel is to save and only it has the power to do that. You cannot escape if you con't obey the gospel. The terms of gospel pardon are simple: Hear (Rom. 10:17); Believe (mark 16:10); Repent (Acts 2:36); Confess Jesus as Lord (Acts 8:37); Be Bapuzed (Acts 2:38, Rom. 6:3-4; Acts 10:48). 
