Rev. L. Boriack, pastor of Trinity Lutheran church of Clara, opened his talk before the Lions club Tuesday by remarking of India: "It is so large—it is so different." Harold Dykstra, program chairman, introduced Mr. Boriack, who told of his experiences while in India serving as a missionary.

He said, "America and India have in common their love for liberty." On arriving in that foreign country, he said, they were given a list of "Don'ts," especially in their drinking water and their eating and protecting themselves from insects, snakes and other dangers.

There are 400,000,000 persons in India and most of them are extremely poor with incomes from 2c to 6c a day. Some are fortunate enough to earn \$4 to \$5 a month.

The people of India are afraid of their gods and have erected so many temples, idols and shrines that religious symbols are to be seen almost everywhere.

Mr. Boriack said people traveling always carry their own bedding, mosquito nets and frames, food, drink and dishes.

He related the way business is carried on between persons of two different casts. The pariahs cannot come within a certain distance of those of higher cast, so must bargain and close deals from that distance.

A husband is looked on as a god. A wife or women are considered as animals. When the husband dies, the wife prefers death to life as a widow.

The guest speaker closed his talk with, "India has a future. She needs the King of kings, the Lord of lords and the Savior of peace."

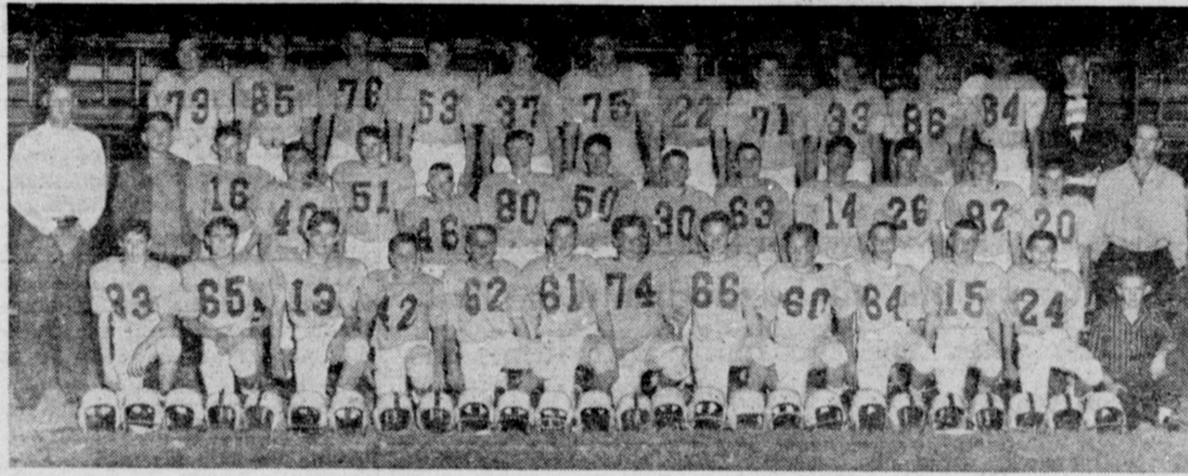
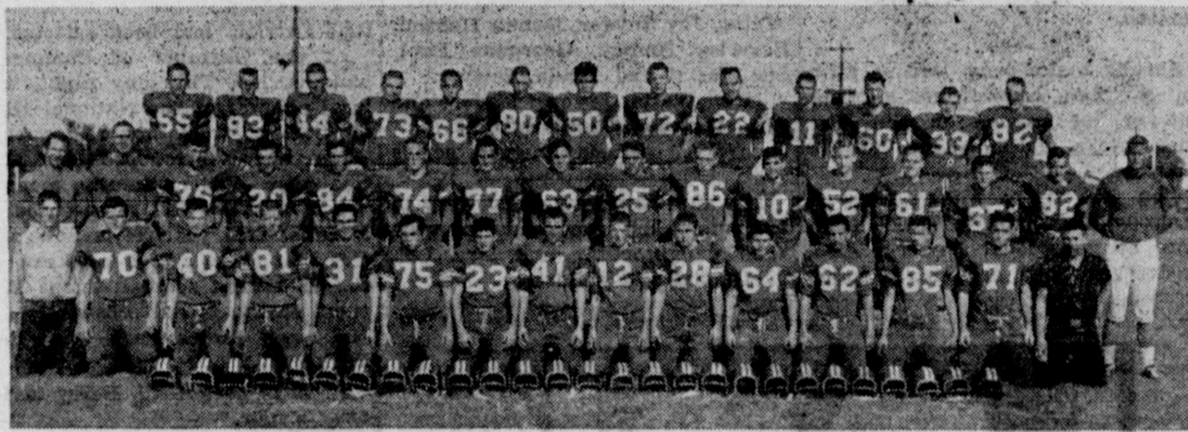

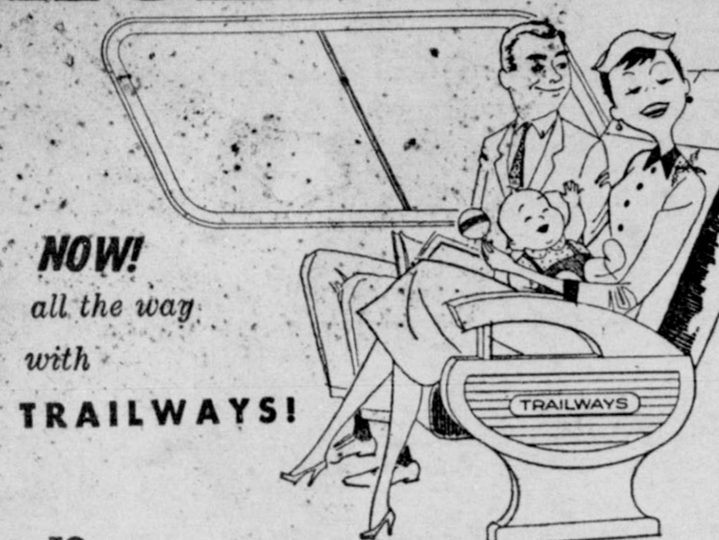

COUNTY AGENT SUGGESTS . . .

Wichita county farmers must be going after wild game, judging from requests received in the county home demonstration office. Mrs. Thelma D. Wirges says any wild game can be frozen for future use. She reminds that it must be dressed and frozen as soon as possible. Correct packaging is important. Birds should be wrapped individually in moisture vapor-proof materials such as cellophane, aluminum foil, pliffim or different kinds of laminated wrapping paper.

Wrap steaks of venison with 2 layers of material between each steak. This makes it possible to separate them and begin cooking without having to wait for complete package to thaw. However, for uniform cooking of the meat, each piece should be at least two-thirds thawed.

Wild game that is frozen and maintained at zero degrees Fahrenheit or colder will not lose any of its fine qualities for several months.

Shrubs make long lasting gifts for a young couple just starting out, or for anyone on your list who enjoys adding plants to the landscape.

You will find a wide variety of ornamental shrubs to select from now at your local nursery. Also, native shrubs of ornamental value

are found in all parts of Texas, according to Mrs. Wirges.

Native plants found near your home will be well adapted to soil and climate of the area. They will take less care than introduced plants. Rose plants make fine gifts too. Now is the time for transplanting woody plants. It is also a good time for adding new plants. Early winter is an excellent time to obtain full root growth.

Mrs. Gale Lowrance, landscape demonstrator and member of the home improvement committee, is doing just this.

Cut cannas down when frost has damaged the foliage. Give protection of a mulch if allowed to remain in the open garden. Mrs. Lowrance is trying this method with her candle tree.

OUR BILL OF RIGHTS

Dec. 15 is observed each year as "Bill of Rights Day" throughout the United States. What does this important document mean to us?

The American Bill of Rights, consisting of the first 10 amendments to our federal constitution, all adopted at one time in 1791, specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and zealously guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies today.

Among the most familiar of our constitutional guarantees are those relating to freedom of religion, of speech and of the press. The same article protects the rights of peaceable assembly and the privilege of petitioning the government for redress of grievances.

Another amendment secures our persons, house, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, and specifies that no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, and unless supported by oath or affirmation.

The due process of law amendment encompasses not one but several guarantees. Every American is secured against being placed twice in legal jeopardy for the same offense; against being compelled to be a witness against himself in a criminal case; and against having his private property taken for public use without just compensation.

He is also secured against being held for trial for a capital (death penalty) or other infamous crime, unless upon a presentment or indictment of a grand jury. And, of course, no person may be deprived of life, liberty or property without orderly court procedures, or due process of law.

The right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, in the locality where the crime was committed, the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and the rights to compel attendance of defense witnesses and to have the assistance of defense counsel in all criminal prosecutions are secured by another section of the Bill of Rights.

Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment 8. Other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time.

Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the underlying intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

Thus, that fundamental philosophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence, that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and that "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed," has been carried forward into the highest law of our land.

Lone Star Asks Up in Gate Rate

Lone Star Gas company has filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas an application for an upward adjustment of the company's authorized intra-company city gate charge.

Present charge of 30c per 1000 cu. ft. for gas delivered at the gates in Texas cities served by Lone Star for domestic and commercial use and unaccounted-for gas would be adjusted to 40c.

Approval of the adjustment will re-establish the charge that existed for a long period of years prior to 1942, when the charge was reduced from 40c to 30c.

The proposed increase is based primarily upon the increase in the cost of gas at the wellhead. This cost has risen approximately 8c per 1000 cu. ft. since Jan. 1, 1951. There also have been substantial increases in taxes, material costs, labor and other operating expenses.

Rates would not be immediately affected by the adjustment in the city gate charge, but a company spokesman stated Lone Star may be required at a later date to file applications for increases in residential and commercial rates.

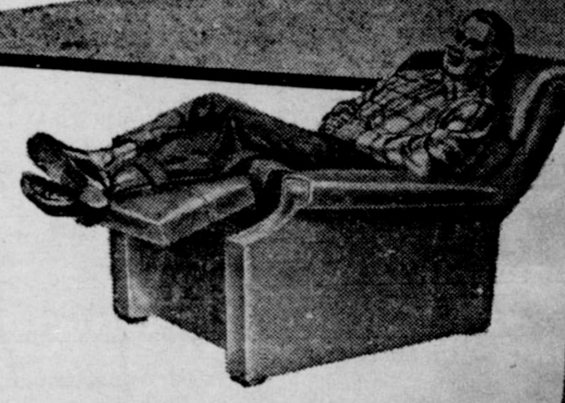

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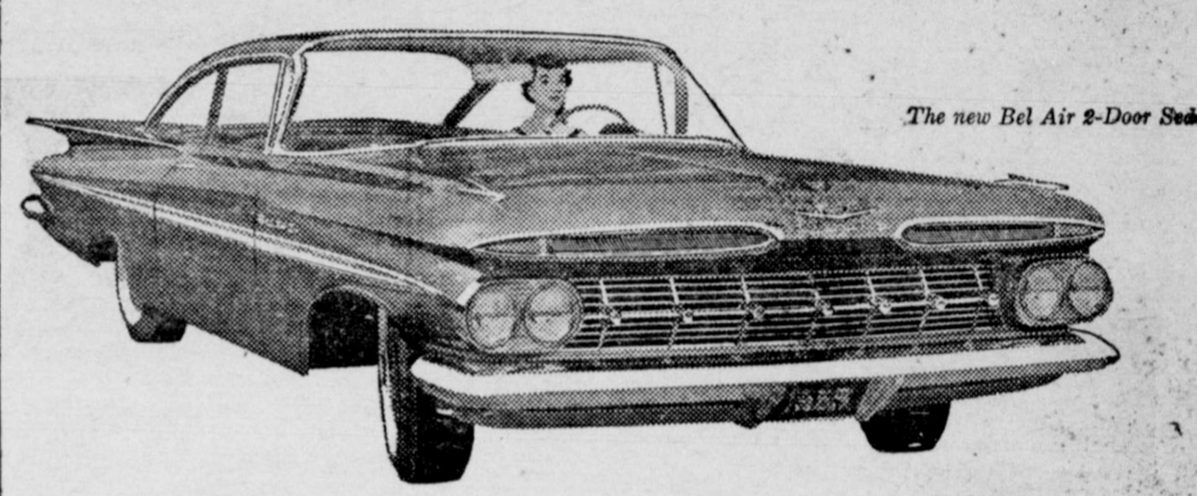
