As the Wichita county Home Demonstration program begins a new year, it seems a good time to look back and see what was accomplished in the year past.

Miss Thelma Wirges served as county HD agent. She works with adult homemakers of the county. When she came to the end of the year she found she had worked in 298 homes, received 359 office calls and 942 telephone calls, prepared 93 news articles, gave 21 radio and 2 television programs, and distributed 2,210 bulletins.

She conducted 260 meetings with a total attendance of 25,426. She also trained leaders who gave 142 demonstrations to 2,117 HD club and non-club women.

Miss Ethel Lynn Geeslin served as assistant county HD agent. Her work centers around Youth and 4-H club activities.

In this county are 19 organized 4-H clubs for girls and 2 community clubs of which girls are members. Of these clubs there are 9 in Wichita Falls, 5 in Burkburnett, 2 in Valley View, 2 in Friberg, 2 in Iowa Park and 1 in Electra. There are 5 high school clubs, 7 junior high clubs and 9 grade school clubs. Total enrollment for the year reached 587 with approximately 524 completing.

Main demonstrations carried by girls are meal planning and preparation, clothing, home improvement and poultry. 275 girls who completed foods projects prepared 6400 separate dishes and served 5900 meals. 175 girls who completed clothing demonstrations constructed 546 articles and 400 garments.

About 30 girls participated in the clothing workshops and entered the county dress revue. One of the girls also participated in District and State revues.

At the end of 1957 the County Achievement Banquet was held to honor 35 girls who had done outstanding work in home economics. Special recognition was given to the Gold Star girl who was selected as most outstanding girl of the county.

Mrs. J. L. Graham served as chairman of the county HD council. The council reports many and varied accomplishments: One new club was organized, delegates were sent to state and district meetings, 17 exhibits were put up for the Texas-Oklahoma Fair and a food booth was operated, National HD Week was celebrated with a luncheon, exhibits, community meetings and news articles, had a day camp, completed community projects, helped with 4-H activities and sponsored workshops for club and non-club members.

93 garments were completed as a result of basic clothing workshops for club and non-club members. 55 leaders were trained by Miss Wirges, 41 others were taught by the leaders. 33 non-club members were reached in clothing workshops.

Food preservation workshops were conducted for county homemakers. Miss Wirges trained 43 leaders, in 3 workshop groups. 13 of these were not club women. 32 leaders taught some 290 women, of which 106 were not club members.

A special landscape training was given for 24 leaders, by Miss Sadie Hatfield, state specialist in home-stead improvement. These leaders are now teaching others.

Each of the workshops was planned and arranged by a county program building sub-committee. Mrs. R. F. Krull, L. L. McHugh and J. L. Graham represent HD clubs on this committee.

A study of family economics was

completed this year with work on health insurance, managing the bank account, family security, in case of an accident, and cost of credit. As a result, 103 families improved the management of their bank accounts, 136 families had their accounts made into true joint accounts, 49 families studied their plan for security, 65 families studied their health insurance plans, 161 families do a better job of

planning, and 139 non-club members were given family economics information. 12 family economics demonstrators made and completed goals and plans for improving the business procedures of their farms and homes.

Kitchens improvement was started in 1958 with special work on: selection, use and care of large and small equipment; colors for

the kitchen; kitchen arrangement; and kitchen cabinets.

Eight kitchens were completed as a result. 60 homemakers used recommendations of the demonstrators when buying equipment; 32 improved kitchen arrangement; 28 improved their cabinets; 30 improved color schemes. 126 non-club women were helped with kitchen improvement.

As 1959 begins a new year of work will begin with the HD program. Mrs. V. C. Lamb will serve as chairman of the council. HD clubs, farm and home families, 4-H clubs and rural neighborhoods all look forward to a year that is even better than the one just ending.
