Highlights of '58

This week as everything is buzz-
ing with talk of our new bank
building, a missile station near
Iowa Park, election, church and
school and civic activities, let us
look back and see what Our Town
has accomplished in 1958.

Miss Dossia Smith, city secre-
tary, reports 100 building permits,
45 of them being new homes. The
permits represent \$590,976 worth of
building.

There were 76 new water con-
nections and 86 sewer connections.
Expansion of facilities was ac-
complished with 1600 feet of 2-
and 6-inch water mains; 3200 feet
of sewer mains; 2200 feet of pave-
ment.

The City also purchased a new
emergency siren and finished the
filter plant. Now there are two
employees on the police force.

Lone Star Gas company made
75 new installations; 4000 feet of
new mains and service lines; and
2000 feet of replacement.

Texas Electric Service company
since 1937 has been in the process
of converting primary voltage in
Iowa Park from 2400 volts to 4160
and 12,000 volts. This work will
continue through 1959. The com-
pany had a gain of 66 new meters
in the city limits.

Following a storm this fall,
the electricity was off six hours,
the longest time Iowa Park has
ever been without electricity.

Southwestern Bell Telephone
company had an increase of 96
phones from Jan. to November,
going from 979 to 1073. In the year
1958, approximately 114 new phones
were installed in Iowa Park.

Volunteer Fire Department had
61 fire runs in the city limits
and 64 in the country. The firemen
held 1 special meeting, 12 regular
business sessions, 23 practice ses-
sions, making a total of 151 meet-
ing and alarms.

Not only have we grown in the
use of utilities—the state highway
folk estimate the present popula-
tion of Iowa Park to be 3941.

We have had much joy and
happiness in marriages, annivers-
aries, births, and newcomers. We
also have had sadness from deaths
and loss of several homes by fire,
and good friends moving away.

A good number of our boys have
gone into the armed services, and
several have received discharges.

Most of the churches have re-
modeled or built additions. The
Christian church completed a new
sanctuary, classrooms and fellow-
ship hall, which were dedicated
Oct. 8-12 last year.

Southwestern Bell Telephone
company completed a large brick
building and the first telephone
call on direct line in Wichita Falls
was put through by Mayor R. E.
Van Horn. Iowa Park became the
first town with 7-digit dialing di-
rectly into Wichita Falls on Sept.
21. Jiffy Food Store built a new
building on East Highway and was
opened for business in Septem-
ber, with J. W. McLemore as
manager.

Several other new businesses
began operation in our community
during the past year.

The Methodist and First Baptist
churches had dedications of new
additions. The Methodists held a
formal opening for their fellowship
hall, classrooms, offices of the pas-
tor and church secretary. The Bas-
tists dedicated their children's
building.

Church of Christ added more
classrooms to their new building.

April 1 was not so funny. At
10:00 p.m. the fire alarm sounded.
A fire had started in the pool hall
and spread rapidly to other build-
ings. Seven businesses were lost
in the fire. Our neighboring fire-
men responded to the call for help.
The fight went on all night. The
people of Iowa Park came to their
aid in the form of helping fight
the fire, serving hot coffee and
sandwiches and cookies.

Several of the businesses moved
to new locations or stayed in the
same location after rebuilding.

All in all, our Heavenly Father
has been good to us, and we should
pause for a few minutes to thank
him for our good community.

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
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Baptist News

Soil Conservation

Stable outlets for terraces is the most limiting factor in terrace construction, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist.

A recent survey of waterway needs in the Iowa Park work unit area, revealed that approximately 250 waterways will be needed to complete terracing of lands in Wichita county needing terraces, Sargent stated.

Natural drains should be considered first when locating waterways. After determining a location, necessary shaping should be done, followed by establishment of a dead cover before seeding to permanent grasses. Buffalograss and KR bluestem have been most often used. Western wheatgrass and vine mesquite are other grasses now being added to the mixtures.

Farmers are requested to contact the Soil Conservation Service for engineering planning and construction of waterways. Federal cost sharing can be had by making application to ASC office here. About 70 per cent of cost will be paid by ACP.
