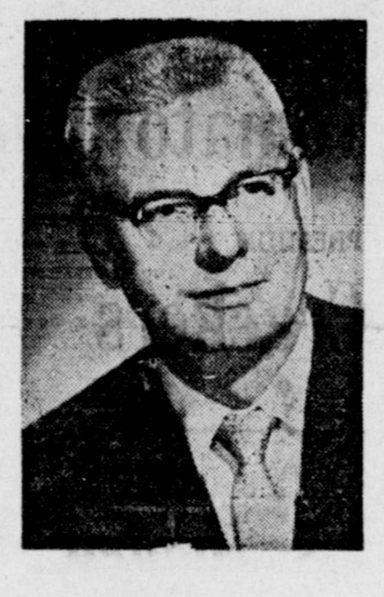
Mr. Cutter will direct the congregational singing.

Mrs. Anna May Richardson, 93, mother of Mrs. Ada Curry, died in a rest home in Elk City, Okla., Sunday afternoon, March 8. She died unexpectedly of a heart attack. Her health had been exceptionally good for her age.

Funeral services were held here Tuesday afternoon in the First Baptist church with Rev. Homer Thompson, pastor, in charge.

She was married to John Burge in 1887 and soon afterward they moved from Kansas to Missouri. In 1908 they moved to Roger Mills county, Okla., where Mr. Burge taught school and farmed. He died Dec. 25, 1935.

On Aug. 31, 1944, Mrs. Burge was married to J. A. Richardson. He died in November 1957.

Mrs. Richardson resided most of the time in Vineta and Hammon, Okla. She lived a short time with Mrs. Curry and family here. The last three years she had resided in the McKinney rest home in Elk City.

Survivors besides Mrs. Curry are two step-daughters: Mrs. Maude Lambert of Hammon, Mrs. Ollie Thompson of Joplin, Mo.; a foster son R. D. Garrison of Knights Landing, Calif.; 12 grand, 20 great-grand and 11 great-great-grandchildren.

Election Set for School Bonds

Board of education of the Iowa Park Independent School district has called an election to be held Tuesday, March 24, from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. in the high school building. This special election is for the purpose of voting a \$125,000 bond issue for a new elementary school to be located at the corner of Third and Louisa streets.

The building will include eight classrooms, a cafeteria, covered walkway and play area, and two separate driveways for buses and parents and teachers.

Eight acres have been bought from the S. B. Burnett estate at a cost of \$1,960. An additional 4 1/2 acres has been placed at the disposal of the school district, with option to buy at a later date.

The school treasury already contains \$65,000 for this purpose, left from a previous bond issue.

An elementary school will also be maintained at the present location.

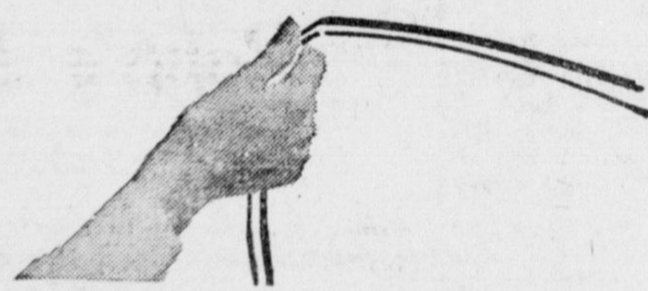

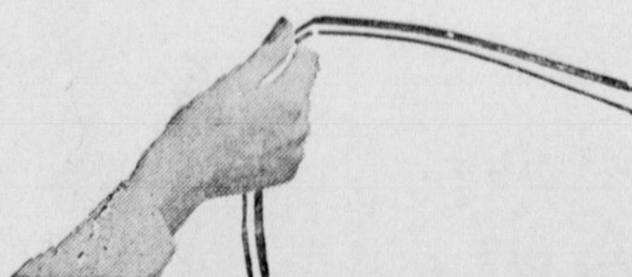

Dead-Of-Winter Driving Tips

CLOUDY SKIES may give you the blues now and then, but don't let them bring accident blues into your life. Ice, snow and rain are problems for every driver this time of year.

One basic factor can be pinpointed for increased driving difficulties in wet weather: Less Friction.

Friction between tires and pavement produces traction. Without traction we couldn't turn a corner, stop or start a car. So, safe winter driving requires extra friction.

HERE, THEN, are a few suggestions for deep-winter driving: When roads are slippery from snow or ice, many good drivers start in high gear with cars equipped with standard transmissions. This eliminates wheel spinning. With automatic transmissions it generally is best to feed the gas slowly for the same reason.

Stopping is even more of a problem in wet or icy weather. However, a few simple rules eliminate most danger. FIRST, begin to stop some distance from your destination. Release the accelerator pedal slowly. Press the brake lightly at first and release it almost at once. Repeat this operation several times. This eliminates the danger of locked wheels.

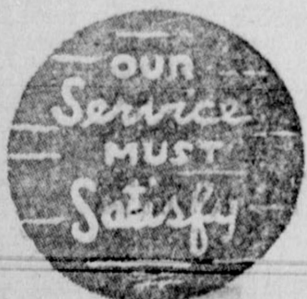

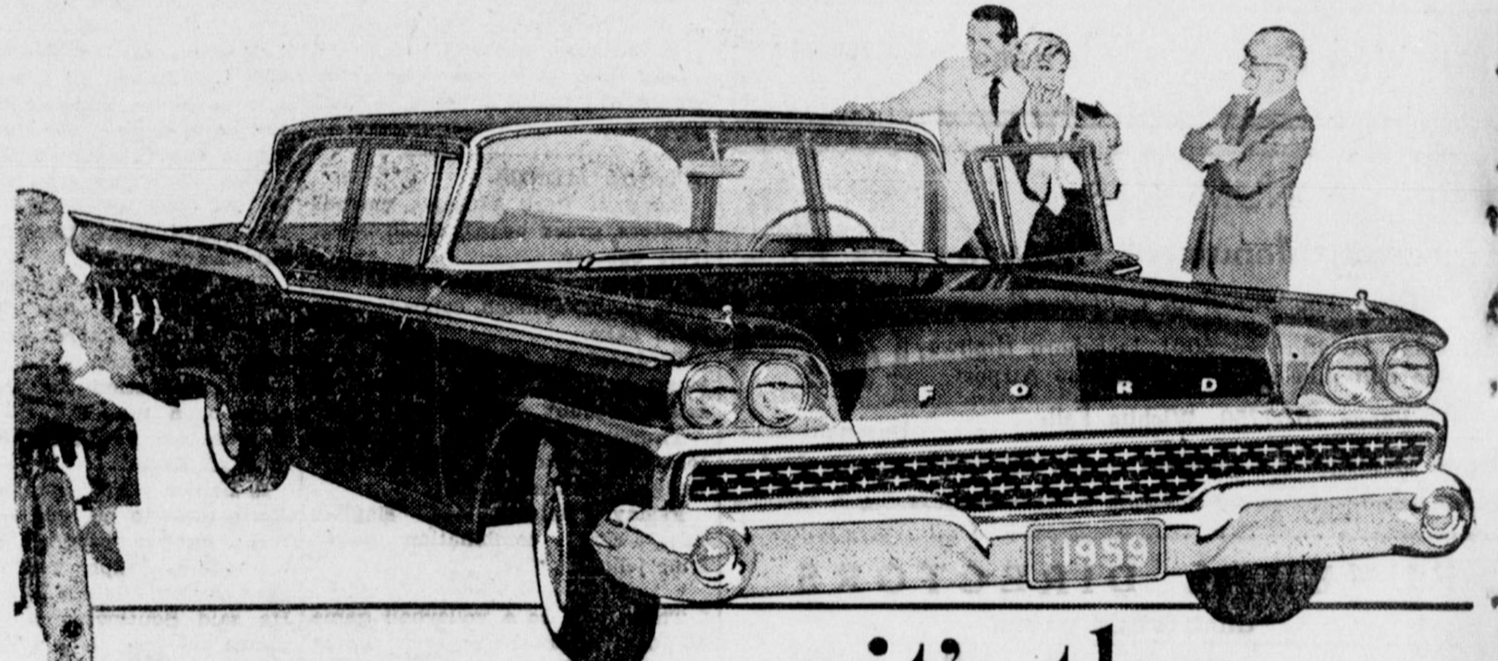
